Pazuck wanted to know whether  
this info could be given to WC or  
whether C/S should be given to WC  
regarding a lot of other info  
discussed in report. He discussed it  
w/ Helms & other members of staff.

CIA had message to the same effect

On 5 Dec. Papick was <sup>1111837</sup> advised that  
CIA polygraph operator had arrived  
in Mexico & the plan was to have  
the Legat attache Clark Anderson,  
pick up Alvarado, a Mexican ~~officer~~ <sup>officer</sup>  
would accompany them to the inter-  
view site & American would be the  
sole interviewer get conversation  
between our polygraph operator & Alvarado

Subj: O'LH

O'neal advised Papich that O'neal conferred w/ Helms, Angleton & Whitten & said was a matter to be decided by the Director (re Alvarado polygraph). O'neal inquired of Papich that it was an official request that we handle the further interview & polygraph. Papich said it was, that he was getting considerable pressure on the question & that Hoover wanted a response as soon as possible.

memo for record 29 Nov 63 (1/5/63)

O'neal advised Papich that CIA was not turning Alvarado over to the Mexicans. No decision had been reached on this subject.

at Helms' instruction Papich told that CIA hadn't turned Alvarado over to the Mexicans, certainly in the absence of a request from the FBI. O'neal said that it was not his responsibility to decide what action should be taken & said that they must make a determination. Papich said he thought we would all make

Papert called back later & said that Alvarado was a CIA source; O'neal denied this

Papert called back and said that FBI had rendered <sup>official</sup> decision that Alvarado be turned over to Mex. authorities & that Mexican interrogate & polygraph Alvarado

Papert called back & asked what CIA had decided in regard to FBI request & O'neal advised that CIA was complying w/ the request. Cable went out ~~thereafter~~ thereafter. In the interim Helms was informed & he instructed that the FBI request be carried out immediately.
