1. [redacted] called at 9:30 this date to advise that he has obtained information on a contact we might be interested in. He learned of the contact at [redacted] while he was looking into other projects there and advised that from the background information he has been able to pick up this man is highly recommended for certain aspects of the project.

3. The man is young, aggressive and is considered by his associates to be highly qualified in his field.

4. Since [redacted] had previously advised [redacted] that [redacted] should contact [redacted] was informed of certain difficulties in this connection. It was recalled that [redacted] had appeared lukewarm on the subject from the beginning and this coupled with certain difficulties in connection with vouchers and minor details since, may have completely soured him on the subject. Difficulties in attempting to reach [redacted] by telephone make it appear that this is the case. We want to do everything we can to restore [redacted]'s confidence in our project but if this cannot be done we should recognize it immediately and go along with someone else.
