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SUMMARY

The CIA-sponsored research project with the Texas Research Institute for Mental Sciences (TRIMS) was conducted to improve the usefulness of physiological measurements as indicators of emotional stress. The subjects were volunteer medical students who were both willing and consenting. Measurements were made of such things as heart and breathing rates of the students during final exam week when they were presumably under more tension than at other times during the semester. For comparison purposes, similar measurements were taken during periods of non-stress. During one phase of the work, stimulants and depressants (barbiturates and amphetamine) were administered to 7-8 student volunteers to determine the effects of these drugs upon the baseline measurements being made. At no time was LSD or any other hallucinogen used.

1. Dr. Burch's statement concerning Agency-sponsored research is true.
2. No LSD was used in any CIA-sponsored activity with TRIMS. We were not involved with LSD work for the Air Force that is mentioned in the AP wire story. The contractor's proposal included an experiment in which LSD might be used. That work was not done.
3. Stimulants and depressants (Amphetamine and barbiturates) were administered to willing and consenting subjects to investigate the effects of such drugs upon the rates of physiological measurements, such as heart rate, breathing rate, and skin moisture.

(1964-1968) The studies were funded through the Air Force for the first three years. Agency association with the activities was classified, however, the Director of TRIMS was totally aware of the source of funds. Subsequently, research was (unclassified association) directly with Dr. Burch through TRIMS (1968-69). <sup>four</sup>

5. The studies had as their purpose the improvement of our understanding of physiological measurements as indicators of emotional stress (the polygraph problem). Another possible application is determination of evasiveness or deceptiveness--as indicated by observable physiological changes--at meetings between U.S. and foreign officials.

6. The presence or absence of stress was inferred, in the first study, by making measurements of medical students during final exam week and comparing the measurements with those taken at other periods during the semester. In the latter studies, stress was produced by having the volunteer students participate to varying degrees in a mock crime situation in which subjects pretended to steal an object and then attempted to deceive a polygraph operator about their "guilt."

7. Only in the last phase <sup>of the activity funded thru the Air Force.</sup> were any drugs administered and then to only about 7-8 subjects (all willing and consenting).

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AUSTIN, TEX. (AP) - A Texas legislator released a report Wednesday saying a state mental health institution had performed lie detector research for the CIA that might have involved giving LSD and other drugs to undercover agents. The researcher's report was prepared by State Rep. Lane Denton and one of his aides.

Denton, a Democrat from Waco, sent a copy of the report to Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, chairman of a Senate committee that is investigating the Central Intelligence Agency.

The CIA successfully assured Denton that their research on mental health and mental retardation projects to keep CIA financing of these projects from the state Human Resources Board, Denton said.

The report resulted from a study by Denton and his chief aide, Paul Alleshire, of grants to the Texas Research Institute of Mental Sciences in Houston.

The institute, an arm of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (DHMR), is limited by law to research, training and education in treating mental illness, the report said.

The report said none of the CIA-funded research was related to that goal.

Dr. Kenneth Gavett, state mental health and retardation commissioner, said the institute had been directed to cooperate with Denton's study. He said the lie detector work tied in with research by Dr. Neil Burch in measurement of physical changes that might occur in emotional disorders.

Burch denied that institute researchers had misused state funds - and played a role in CIA's efforts to help the CIA design a perfect lie detector or had given any drugs - including LSD - to unsuspecting persons.

He added that Denton may have confused two separate research projects.

Burch said that from 1961 to 1968 he coordinated a project funded by the U.S. Air Force to study the effects of LSD. It had nothing to do with lie-detector tests, he said.

He said the Air Force was concerned that LSD might be used against the United States in chemical warfare modalities. That a great deal of LSD might be dumped in the waters and could poison entire communities. And our task was to determine the effects. A second major study started in 1964 also was funded by the Air Force and later by the CIA, he said.

THE INSTITUTE, AN ARM OF THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH AND  
MENTAL RETARDATION (MHMR), IS LIMITED BY LAW TO RESEARCH, TRAINING AND  
EDUCATION "IN TREATING MENTAL ILLNESS," THE REPORT SAID.

THE REPORT SAID NONE OF THE CIA-FUNDED RESEARCH WAS RELATED TO THAT  
GOAL.

DR. KENNETH GAVER, STATE MENTAL HEALTH AND RETARDATION COMMISSIONER,  
SAID THE INSTITUTE HAD BEEN DIRECTED TO COOPERATE WITH DENTON'S  
STUDY. HE SAID THE LIE DETECTOR WORK TIED IN WITH RESEARCH BY DR. NEIL  
BURCH IN MEASUREMENT OF PHYSICAL CHANGES THAT MIGHT OCCUR IN  
EMOTIONAL DISORDERS.

BURCH DENIED THAT INSTITUTE RESEARCHERS HAD MISUSED STATE FUNDS - OR  
PLAYED A ROLE IN "COVERT" EFFORTS TO HELP THE CIA DESIGN A PERFECT  
LIE DETECTOR OR HAD GIVEN ANY DRUGS - INCLUDING LSD - TO UNSUSPECTING  
PERSONS.

HE ADDED THAT DENTON MAY HAVE CONFUSED TWO SEPARATE RESEARCH  
PROJECTS.

BURCH SAID THAT FROM 1961 TO 1968 HE COORDINATED A PROJECT FUNDED BY  
THE U.S. AIR FORCE TO STUDY THE EFFECTS OF LSD. IT HAD NOTHING TO DO  
WITH LIE-DETECTOR TESTS, HE SAID.

HE SAID THE AIR FORCE "WAS CONCERNED THAT LSD MIGHT BE USED AGAINST  
THE UNITED STATES IN CHEMICAL WARFARE MODALITIES . . . THAT A GREAT  
DEAL OF LSD MIGHT BE DUMPED IN THE WATER AND COULD PARALYZE WHOLE  
COMMUNITIES . . . AND OUR TASK WAS TO DETERMINE THE EFFECTS."

A SECOND MAJOR STUDY STARTED IN 1964 ALSO WAS FUNDED BY THE AIR  
FORCE AND "LATER BY THE CIA," AND THIS INVOLVED RESEARCH ABOUT THE  
RELIABILITY OF THE POLYGRAPH OR LIE DETECTOR TEST, HE SAID.

"THE CIA HAD ABSOLUTELY NOTHING TO DO WITH THE EARLIER LSD STUDIES,  
AND ONLY ENTERED THE POLYGRAPH PROJECT IN ABOUT '67 OR '68," BURCH  
SAID.

THE GOAL, BURCH SAID, WAS TO FIND OUT IF THE DRUGS ALTERED THE  
SUBJECTS' RESPONSES AND COULD, INDEED, BE USED IN "DOING THE LIE  
DETECTOR TESTS."
