> Civil Service Commission files reflect WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN, born March 5, 1910 at Chicago, Illinois. received grammar and high school education in Chicago and BS degree at George Washington University and Ph.D. degree at Maryland University. Files further indicate he received probationary appointment on May 28, 1930 with National Bureau of Standards and that he was employed there until August 6, 1938 when he resigned to accept a research fellowship at Leipzig University in Germany. It is further shown that he was reinstated on September 27, 1939 as assistant chemist with the Bureau of Standards and remained with the Bureau of Standards until his resignation on August 20, 1944; Supervisors and associates state they have no concrete information indicating he was disloyal to the United Two of his former associates from the Bureau of Standards state they attended meetings in his home at which meetings his brother, GEORGE PEGMAN, was present. These associates, HERBERT INSLEY, Ph.D. and L. A. PAIMER, said they felt the discussions in

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and L. A. PAIMER, said they felt the discussions in these meetings at PIGMAN'S home were becoming radical that they withdrew from further attendance. Neither INSLEY nor PAIMER heard of CHAMBERS or HISS during their contact with the PIGMANS, they said, and that the newspaper accounts of the PIGMANS were shocking to them. GEORGE PIGMAN, according to Civil Service Commission files, was born February 22, 1912 at Chicago, Illinois, educated in the public schools there. He received an MS degree in 1935 from George

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Washington University. His employment was shown to be with the National Bureau of Standards from August 1, 1930 to October 16, 1940 at which time he was transferred to the Civil Aeronautics Administration where he is presently employed in Indianapolis, Indiana. GEORGE PIGMAN'S supervisors and associates in the National Bureau of Standards and Civil Aeronautics Administration speak highly of him and state they have no information which would indicate disloyalty on his part to the United States. They inform that they never heard the name CHAMBERS or HISS in any of their dealings with GEORGE PIGMAN.

DETAILS:

AT WASHINGTON, D.C.

WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN

The Civil Service Commission record on WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN was made available by Mr. JOE CHANDLER, December 16, 1948. It reflected that WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN was born March 5, 1910 in Chicago, Illinois, the son of J. W. PIGMAN, 1617 South Lombard St., Oak Park, Illinois. It was indicated that PIGMAN attended grammar school in Chicago and the Grane Technical School from which he graduated in 1927.

It was further indicated that he received a BS degree in chemistry from George Washington University, Washington, D.C. in June, 1932 and Doctor of Science degree from Maryland University in June, 1936. It was noted that PIGMAN reads and speaks German fluently. His employment was reflected as being with the National Bureau of Standards, as a laboratory assistant in engineering research, grade Sp. 2, salary,

\$1260 per annum and that he received an appointment in May, 1930. In August, 1931 it is reflected that he was moved to the Polarimetric Section and that he remained in that section in the Research Department from that date until July, 1938 at which time it is reflected he resigned to accept a fellowship from the Lalor Foundation to study at the University of Leipzig, Leipzig, Germany.

On September 27, 1939, the file indicates that PTGMAN was reinstated as assistant chemist with the National Bureau of Standards, classification P-2, salary \$2600.00 per annum. On November 16, 1940, it is shown that he was promoted to associate chemist, classification P-3 rating and that he remained in this classification until August 20, 1944, at which time he tendered his resignation to accept employment in private industry.

PIGMAN listed as relatives who worked in the government service:

His father, J. W. PIGMAN.

His uncle, ROSS CHAPPLE, 4513 North Magnolia St., Chicago, Illinois.

His brother, GEORGE L. PIGMAN, Washington, D.C.

At the time of filing his application, PIGMAN listed his residence as being 1736 G St., N.W. He indicated that he was married and that his wife's name was Mrs. W. W. PIGMAN.

DR. F. J. BATES

49 Harvard Street

Dr. BATES retired Bureau of Standards employee, advised on December 16, 1948 that he felt that he was well acquainted with WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN. He stated that PIGMAN worked under him in his section at the National Bureau of Standards. He said that he considered PIGMAN one of his most brilliant men, that in addition to performing exceptional work at the Bureau of Standards, that PIGMAN attended night school in Washington and received his Bachelor and Doctor's degree while here.

Dr. BATES stated that he first noted PIGMAN'S ability when the latter asked to be transferred into the Carbohydrates Division of the Bureau. At that time he said there were approximately 60 physicists and 40 chemists working in that division. Dr. HERBERT ISBELL was directly in charge of the research of the chemists who were in that section, he said.

The quality of PIGMAN'S work was so good that it received world wide recognition. Much of his work was published in Europe.

Professor HELFRICH, the German chemist, recognized PIGMAN as an outstanding student of chemistry and assisted in obtaining for PIGMAN the fellowship under the Lalor Foundation.

Dr. BATES stated that he was in Germany at the time that the Nazis were setting out on their drive to dominate Europe. PIGMAN at that time realized the personal danger that might befall him if he remained in Germany. He felt that it was necessary for his own safety to escape. He did so by driving from Germany through Poland in a circuitous route and through the lower portion of the Russian border thereafter going to Sweden and subsequently returning to the United States.

After PIGMAN'S return to the United States he was again appointed to the Bureau of Standards. He was given a commission, Dr. BATES said, to do independent research. It was noticed that he was a bit too enthusiastic in his work and the Bureau found that it was necessary to turn down some of his work in order to maintain a proper check on him, PIGMAN.

Dr. BATES said that he felt that PIGMAN was one who would be most restive under any kind of restraint and that he was one who needed absolute Liberty and freedom in his research. He said that PIGMAN'S personality was not such that he would win friends immediately and that he had found among PIGMAN'S associates at the Bureau of Standards few close friends. Dr. BATES said today PIGMAN is regarded as one of the ten top chemists in the carbohydrate field.

Dr. BATES said that he had no way of knowing what views, political and otherwise, PIGMAN might have had or his underlying characteristics however he said he felt that he was honest and that as far as his work indicates, it was always found to be scientifically correct.

Dr. BATES said that he regarded PIGMAN as being a liberal and because of that fact, he stated that he could not always agree with PIGMAN in his discussion on economic theories. About this time Dr. BATES said, "We in the United States were hearing a lot about pinks and more about Nazis." He said that he heard rumors among some of his friends at the $^{
m B}$ ureau of Standards that there were employees who were attending union meetings. This he said never caused him any concern because he felt that only the poor type employees would be interested in such activities. He said he never knew definitely that there were any meetings or organizations from a union standpoint at the Bureau of Standards and accordingly he could not say whether or not WILLIAM PIGMAN ever attended such meetings. Dr. BATES did say that he never heard PIGMAN express himself in any way that would be considered a disloyal nature. He stated he never heard PIGMAN express any unsatisfactory comment about the working conditions at the Bureau of Standards. Dr. BATES said the only incident which happened during his association with PIGMAN that caused him to reflect about PIGMAN after reading the newspapers was the fact that PIGMAN seemed to be enthused about his trip into Russia when leaving Germany in 1939. Dr. BATES said that he did not know any of PIGMAN'S friends outside the Bureau and that on the two occasions that he visited PIGMAN'S home, there were no parties present whomhe did not know.

Dr. BATES said that he knows definitely that none of PIGMAN'S work was of a classified nature and he is very much concerned about any information that PIGMAN might have obtained which would be considered confidential and which, as is alleged, he might have turned over to CHAMBERS. Dr. BATES, in summing up his comments on WILLIAM PIGMAN, stated that the information which he had was only favorable and that through no rumor or personal knowledge was he able to say that PIGMAN was disloyal in any way to the United States.

Dr. F. P. PHELPS

Room 2031, Industrial Building National Bureau of Standards

Dr. PHELPS stated that he worked with WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN when PIGMAN first entered the National Bureau of Standards. He stated that he had only casually met PIGMAN'S brother, GEORGE LA PIGMAN.

Dr. PHELPS said that Dr. ISBELL, PIGMAN'S supervisor in Carbohydrates Research at the Bureau, would be more familiar with PIGMAN and his brother than any other man at the Bureau at this time.

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Dr. PHELPS said that he was never aware of PTGMAN having worked on any confidential or classified work, that his work in the carbohydrate field was publishable in every respect and that as far as he knew, most of the research was published regularly in the National Bureau of Standards publications.

Dr. PHELPS stated that he personally did not like WILLIAM PIGMAN and that this dislike was due to the fact that he felt PIGMAN had too radical views regarding labor union organizations. He stated further that PIGMAN constantly advocated unionization in government as well as private industry. Because of this Dr. PHELPS said, "I tried as much as possible to leave him alone." However, he said he would not consider this serious enough to be considered as disloyalty on the part of PIGMAN.

Dr. PHELES said that the only other criticism which he had concerning PIGMAN was that he, PIGMAN, had a tendency of being overpositive and that he was such without having sufficient data to back up his remarks. "However," he said, "in the field of chemical research, I must admit I have great admiration for his ability."

Dr. PHELPS said he had never met PIGMAN'S family and that he was not familiar with any of PIGMAN'S close friends. Dr. PHELPS said that never had any information come to his attention which would indicate concretely that PIGMAN was disloyal. He said that he had never heard any reference to the name of CHAMBERS or HISS from PIGMAN or anybody else in the Bureau of Standards until the information came out in the papers.

DR. HERBERT S. ISBELL

West Building, National Bureau of Standards

Dr. ISBELL stated on December 21, 1948 that he was in charge of carbohydrate research in the Chemistry Division at the National Bureau of Standards. He stated that he first became acquainted with WILLIAM PIGMAN in 1930. At that time PIGMAN was an assistant laboratory technician in the Cement Section of the laboratory. He stated that PIGMAN showed great energy at that time and a keen interest to move from the inorganic chemical research field into the organic division which was under Dr. F. J. BATES, who was head of the division known as the Optical Division

of the National Bureau of Standards.

At that time, according to Dr. ISBELL, PTGMAN was studying nights at George Washington University and that as far as he knew, PTGMAN obtained his degree from George Washington University and later his Doctor's degree from Maryland University. Dr. ISBELL said that PTGMAN was a laboratory assistant up until the time that he received his Doctor's degree from Maryland University. At that time he said laboratory assistants received poor salaries and that it was practically impossible for one to move into any better classification. Friends of PTGMAN urged him, Dr. ISBELL said, to do added research and as a result of the encouragement, WILLIAM PTGMAN accepted the Lalor Foundation fellowship to study at Leipzig University.

Upon PIGMAN'S return from Leipzig, he was given the permission of Dr. BATES to do independent research. Dr. ISBELL said that he felt that PIGMAN warranted the liberty of individual research at that time. He indicated that PIGMAN'S work was of sufficient quality that he should not be impeded by unnecessary supervision. Throughout this time Dr. ISBELL said, he had close working associations with WILLIAM PIGMAN and because of these close connections, he and his family frequently visited the PIGMAN home. He said that never on any occasion that he can recall was there any indication on the part of the PIGMANS of anything that could be construed as being disloyalty to the United States. Dr. ISBELL said that he knew that PIGMAN was interested in union organization of the Bureau of Standards employees but that he did not consider that of a detrimental nature in any way. He said that PIGMAN was also interested in other activities at the Bureau of Standards particularly any planned athletics or social functions that were sponsored by the Bureau. Dr. ISBELL said that he never agreed politically with WILLIAM PIGMAN because PIGMAN, in his mind, was entirely too much of a New Dealer. He said that PIGMAN was known as a man who was defending the underprivileged class.

He said that he can remember PIGMAN saying, "I prefer looking out for the forgotten man."

Dr. ISBELL said that he felt that PIGMAN, like many other young men, had "the feeling of youth to better world conditions for man and the reformation of the world" rather than a political philosophy of government.

Dr. ISBELL said that he recalled that PIGMAN also was extremely anti-Nazi when he returned from Germany but that he had never recalled hearing PIGMAN make any comment other than the good people in Germany

objected as much to the Nazi type government as did others throughout the world. He said PIGMAN told him that the great scientists in Germany thoroughly objected to the Nazi domination of their country but that they feared to raise their voice for fear of persecution. Dr. ISBELL said that he felt PIGMAN'S interest in foreign economic systems of government was more of a scholastic interest than it was of a political desire to see other forms of government established.

Dr. ISBELL said that he had only a speaking acquaintance with PIGMAN'S brother, GEORGE, and that he recalled meeting GEORGE on a couple of occasions at WILLIAM PIGMAN'S home. Dr. ISBELL indicated that since WILLIAM PIGMAN'S departure from Washington, he has visited him twice, that he recalls visiting him at his parent's home in Chicago.

Dr. ISBELL made available a book entitled "Chemistry of the Carbohydrates" by W. W. PIGMAN and RUDOLPH MAXMILIAN GOEPP, JR. This text, said Dr. ISBELL, is the outstanding text on carbohydrates today in the world.

Dr. ISBELL concluded his remarks by stating that he could not believe that WILLIAM PIGMAN would be disloyal to the United States, that he felt that he knew PIGMAN sufficiently well to have determined if he was engaging in any of the alleged activities as reflected by the recent newspaper articles and he said he did not believe that PIGMAN had any connection with CHAMBERS knowingly. Dr. ISBELL said he had never heard PIGMAN make any mention of HISS or CHAMBERS.

DR. HERBERT INSLEY

Chief of the Mineral Products Division Room 2042, Industrial Building National Bureau of Standards

Dr. INSLEY stated that he gained the acquaintance of WILLIAM PIGMAN in 1930 when PIGMAN was in the Gement Section of the Bureau. He stated that he left that section in 1931 and went to the Carbohydrates. Division of the Bureau. PIGMAN, he said, was his assistant at that time. Dr. INSLEY indicated that he had little contact with PIGMAN after he changed to the Carbohydrates Division other than through meetings which PIGMAN held at his home for a select group of Bureau of Standards men.

Dr. INSLEY said that approximately in 1934 he was invited to go to the home of WILLIAM PIGMAN to engage in a discussion group. He said that JESSE S. ROGERS, another employee at the Bureau, came to him and suggested that he, INSLEY, enter the discussion group that was meeting approximately once a month at PIGMAN'S home. Dr. INSLEY stated that he cannot recall at this time where PIGMAN lived but he said that he felt it was near Dupont Circle and that he does know that it was actually in WILLIAM PIGMAN'S home that they met. He said he recalled meeting PIGMAN'S wife and PIGMAN'S brother, GEORGE, while in the home.

Dr. INSLEY said that he thinks that he must have attended four meetings at PICMAN'S home. He said that the other men from the Bureau who attended with him were Mr. ARTHUR J. THEUER, Mr. E. P. FILINT, Mr. L. A. PALMER and Mr. JESSE STROGERS. Both FIGMANS would be present at these meetings. He said, "We would generally start the meetings in a very informal manner and someone in the group would discuss some new book on economic theory which would be assigned to him to read by either the FIGMANS or by ROGERS. At first and when we started out in these informal meetings, "he said," a great deal of interest was shown by the men present because it was a challenge to keep abreast of the various theories propounded by the authors who we were assigned to study." Dr. INSLEY said as the discussion continued, it had a tendency to become more extreme and the radical views of the PIGMANS and ROGERS were more clearly expressed by them as they became serious in the discussion which they presented. Their views, according to Dr. INSLEY, definitely were on the radical left wing side. However, he said that neither he, PALMER, FLINT or THEUER felt that the views presented by the PIGMANS or ROGERS were such as to indicate a Communist Party line. At least not until the last meeting which they attended and at that meeting, according to Dr. ISBELL, a discussion arose about totalitarian discipline and in this discussion he said the PTGMANS brought out so clearly the Communist Party line that he, Mr. PAIMER, FLINT and THEUER, after the conclusion of the meeting, decided that they had no further business attending such meetings at FIGMAN'S home. Dr. INSLEY stated that he could not recall anything specific which he could report this date that definitely would reflect membership on the part of either the PICMANS or ROGERS, in the Communist Party. Neither does he recall any comment on the part of either the PIGMANS or ROGERS which would indicate that they were engaged in any activities of a disloyal nature. He said he never recalled hearing the name of CHAMBERS or HISS or any of their pseudonyms mentioned during the meetings that he attended at WILLIAM PIGMAN'S home.

Dr. INSLEY said that there was nothing specific that he could put his finger on which caused him to revolt against attending further meetings but that it seemed to be a gradual dissatisfaction with the trend of events that took place in the meetings and that extreme dissatisfaction seemed to culminate on the night that they discussed totalitarian discipline. He said as he recalled the impression left by the PIGMANS that night was that if any one was asked for anything, under the totalitarian discipline form of government, one would have to perform. Dr. INSLEY said this thought was not clearly expressed and that no one present asked for further discussion on the topic. He said he decided never again to attend any more of their meetings. He said he did this because he felt that the next proposition that might be put to him would be for him to join the Communist Party. However, he said he cannot say that the PIGMANS were actually Communist Party members. This he said was only the impression they left on him, namely that they were able to recruit membership in the party.

Dr. INSLEY said that these meetings did not concern union organization among the Bureau of Standards employees. In fact he said no discussion was ever had at WILLIAM PIGMAN'S home which involved any work or any activities at the Bureau itself. The meetings in brief he said were aimed at discussing various national and international problems particularly economic problems as they affected world society.

Dr. INSLEY stated that he had never heard of any other meetings at PICMAN'S home, that he knew of no other associates—that PICMAN might have had who attended meetings at PICMAN'S home and that as far as he knew, the meetings which he attended were the only meetings or activities on the part of PICMAN which could be construed in any way as being activities of a possible disloyal nature. If PICMAN was at that time engaged in passing on information to any outside source, Dr. INSLEY said, he was not familiar with it. He added he could not believe that PICMAN would perform any act knowingly to the disadvantage of this country as serious as that alleged in the newspaper, namely the passing on of confidential documents to CHAMBERS.

MR. L. A. PALMER

Bureau of Yards and Docks

Mr. PALMER advised December 20, 1948 that he first became acquainted with WILLIAM PIGMAN in 1931 and that at about that time

he met PICMAN'S brother, GEORGE. He said that he had never heard any information reflecting derogatorily against either of the PICMANS. He indicated that the only information in his possession which indicated a communist tendency on the part of the PICMANS was the fact that they held meetings in their home in which meetings they discussed the communist economic theory and the communist ideals and aims for world occupation.

Mr. PAIMER stated that he believes that these meetings which he attended along with Dr. INSIEY and Mr. FIING AND Mr. THEUER covered a period of approximately three or four months and that he believes they were some time during 1934. He said he felt the meetings were held approximately once a month. He admitted that his recollection in this regard was very hazy.

Mr. PAIMER stated that the meetings started out on a rather informal basis, that he was asked by Dr. INSLEY if he would care to attend a discussion group at the home of WILLIAM PIGMAN. He stated that. after learning the identity of the parties who would be present, that he consented. He said he admired the ability of those men whom PIGMAN had invited to his home. In fact, he added "I greatly admire the ability of PIGMAN not only from the standpoint of his ability in research but also from the ability shown in his understanding of the philosophies of governments of the various countries in the world." PIGMAN, he said, clearly indicated by his expressions on economic theories that he was a student of political philosophies, that he was well read and that it was possible for him to express himself freely on theory which he felt should be put into practice in the world for the betterment of mankind. Mr. PAIMER said that those who attended the meetings in WILLIAM PIGMAN'S home were keenly impressed by PIGMAN'S understanding of the political forms of government of the various countries. "Indeed," he said, "PIGMAN had a liberal philosophy of government but at that time such a philosophy was not looked upon as strange, in fact it was a fad during and shortly after the depression to be considered a liberal." He said that he recalls that it was common talk that the United States should consider changes in its economic system. This view, he said, was held by both the PIGMANS.

Mr. PAIMER stated that he recalled that on the first meeting which he attended at the home of WILLIAM PAIMER, that he was requested to review the book entitled "The Coming Struggle for Power." He stated that he could not recall at this time the author of that book but that he did recall it treated rather liberally the new philosophy that was prevailing at the time.

Mr. PAIMER said that he could not recall the exact number of times that he attended meetings at WILLIAM PIGMAN'S home but that he thinks it must have been at least three. He said he recalled at one time going to the home of JESSE ROGERS who, he said, seemed to be as keenly interested as were the PIGMANS.

PALMER stated that he recalls at the last meeting that he attended at WILLIAM PIGMAN'S home, there was present an outsider and stranger to him and FIINT, THEUER and INSLEY. He said that this man discussed the new philosophy of liberalism and that he explained in contrast the philosophy of Marxism. He said that this person seemed to be steeped in communist philosophy, that he was not a personable man and that he and the other mentioned friends of his formed such a dislike to him that they decided that they had enough of the meetings with the PIGMANS, particularly any guest speakers that PIGMAN might bring in to inform them on political philosophies of government. Mr. PALMER said he recalls that this man was particularly interested in determining the full names of those present beside the PIGMANS.

Mr. PAIMER said he felt that nobody gave this man their name. "In fact," he said, "we walked out when he suggested that we give our names to him." Mr. PAIMER said he could not say that this man was a communist but that from his every action, he indicated that he was and he indicated further that he would be interested in determining more completely their background and interests. Mr. PAIMER said he recalled that this man said, "We should look into things and compare the different isms before we consider disregarding them."

Mr. PAIMER said that he felt that in that statement the fellow included communism.

Mr. PAIMER stated that JESSE S. ROGERS seemed to be more interested in recruiting new members for the so-called study group at PIGMANS than he was in the nature of the discussion which ensued. Mr. PAIMER said that he felt that ROGERS had socialistic views and that he typified the new dealer of that year. He said that he recalls that ROGERS suggested during one of the meetings that he was in favor of the government owning public utilities and railroads. "Of course," Mr. PAIMER said, "many people at that time felt likewise."

Mr. PAIMER said that he recalled ROGERS urging him to bring in more men to the meetings and he definitely recalled that ROGERS once said "Everyone present should bring in a new member the next meeting we have."

Mr. PAIMER stated that he recalled on one occasion that the PIGMANS passed out publications to study during the meeting. He said that he could not recall definitely the nature of the publications but that he feels certain that the Daily Worker was among some of the material given them on that occasion.

Mr. PALMER said that the PIGMANS proselyting of the communist philosophy was very subtle however he said he had no feeling or belief that they were engaging in any other activities which could be considered disloyal to this government. He said that the PIGMANS philosophy of government was more liberal than the average persons. "Unfortunately," he said, "I was liberal enough at the time to allow myself to attend some of these meetings." He stated that he has regretted it and that he is certain Dr. INSLEY, Mr. FLINT and THEUER have also regretted it.

Mr. PAIMER said that he never heard the name HISS or CHAMBERS mentioned nor did he ever hear any indication in any way that the PIGMANS were working with anyone or in any nature such as has been reflected by the recent articles in the newspapers alleging that WILLIAM PIGMAN passed on confidential documents to CHAMBERS.

MISS MARY L. HUBBELL

Section Chief, Chemical Division, National Bureau of Standards

Miss HUBBELL advised on December 21, 1948 that she recalls having met WILLIAM PIGMAN when he was employed in the Bureau of Standards. She believes that she visited at his home on at least two occasions and she says from her knowledge of Mr. PIGMAN she feels that he is an innocent victim. Namely, that his alleged associations with CHAMBERS could not have been voluntary on his part.

Miss HUBBELL said that she actually knew nothing of PIGMAN'S activities outside the Bureau and that her previous statement was based on her knowledge of him and her admiration for him which was formed in her associations with PIGMAN while he was in the Bureau.

She said that PIGMAN was a hard worker and that he turned out outstanding work in the field of carbohydrates. She stated that she is amazed now to read the articles in the paper reflecting so dangerously against him. She said that she is amazed because she never even recalled

him ever having mentioned a political view or expressing himself in any way concerning politics.

Miss HUBBELL said that she had heard the rumor that PTGMAN was sympathetic toward the "underdog" and that perhaps in this regard he did have a radical tendency in his defense of the under-privileged class.

Miss HUBBELL said that she has heard since the paper's report on PIGMAN that he was a member of a local union in the Bureau of Standards known as the Federation of Architects, Chemists, Engineers and Technicians. She said that she personally was not familiar with any views that he might have had in regard to labor organization within the government.

Miss HUBBELL said that she had never heard the name of HISS or CHAMBERS mentioned before she read about them in the newspapers. She said it had never been brought to her attention that PICMAN had had any association with those two mentioned parties.

JAMES B. SAUNDERS

Physicist, Instruments Section National Bureau of Standards

Mr. SAUNDERS stated on December 22, 1948 that he had met WARD PIGMAN whom he knows now as WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN, about 1930. He stated that they worked in the same section. However, he said that PIGMAN was a chemist and that he himself was a physicist. He said at the time PIGMAN was interested in the local organization of the Federation of Architects, Chemists, Engineers and Technicians, a local which existed in the Bureau of Standards. Mr. SAUNDERS said he attended a meeting which was for the organization and promotion of this local in the Bureau. As he recalls, the meeting was held at the YMCA. Present at this meeting he said was a labor organizer whose identity he does not definitely know but who he believes from what he has read subsequent is a Mr. COLLINS (ph.). This man he said spoke on the advantages of organization within the government. Mr. SAUNDERS said he personally formed a dislike to this man and accordingly he did not have any more to do with PIGMAN in connection with meetings in behalf of the local that PIGMAN was working for in the Bureau.

About this time according to Mr. SAUNDERS, he had developed an exposure meter which he desired to get patented. He said he needed some

financial assistance. PIGMAN he said suggested that he, SAUNDERS, come to his home and that PIGMAN would arrange a meeting between him, SAUNDERS, and a party who would be able to finance the exposure meter's development. SAUNDERS said he went to PIGMAN'S home and there he met this party whom he believes to be COLLINS, the same party that was present at the meeting sponsored by the Federation of Architects, Chemists, Engineers and Technicians at the YMCA. SAUNDERS said that this party asked entirely too much cut on the profits expected from the patent and accordingly he, SAUNDERS, never sold an interest to him.

SAUNDERS said that he had little to do with PICMAN after that time in connection with his work but that he did occasionally visit PICMAN at his home. He recalls visiting PICMAN shortly after the latter returned from his studies in Leipzig, Germany. He recalls too he said that PICMAN displayed numerous snapshots which he took in his travels about Europe. SAUNDERS recalled that PICMAN displayed snapshots that he took in Russia.

Mr. SAUNDERS said that he could not recall any indication on the part of PIGMAN which would indicate that he was engaged either before or after his return from Germany in any activities which would be considered disloyal.

GEORGE L. PIGMAN

Mr. JOE CHANDLER made available the Civil Service Commission file on GEORGE L. PIGMAN. It reflected he received a probational appointment on August 1, 1930 as an under laboratory apprentice. This file further reflects that he was promoted on May 1, 1936 to junior material engineer in which capacity he served until October 16, 1940 at which time he was transferred as assistant aeronautical engineer to the Civil Aeronautics Administration, Department of Commerce.

GEORGE L. PIGMAN'S birth was reflected as being at Chicago, Illinois on February 22, 1912. He further indicated that he was educated in the public schools of Chicago and that he received a Master of Science degree from George Washington University in 1935 in engineering. At that time his residence was reflected as being 3102 Rodman St., N.W. He listed his wife's name as VIRGINIA W. PIGMAN and in a later questionnaire which appeared in the file he listed his residence as being 1255 New Hampshire Ave., N.W. He subsequently listed his residence again as being 2127 P St., N.W., Apt. 308,

which was also shown to be the residence of his brother, WILLIAM W. PIGMAN, and his brother's wife, ALICE PIGMAN.

JOHN TUCKER, JR.

Cement Section, National Bureau of Standards

Mr. TUCKER advised on December 21, 1948 that he met GEORGE PIGMAN through the latters brother, WILLIAM PIGMAN, who was also employed at the National Bureau of Standards. He stated that GEORGE turned out to be a close personal friend of his and that he felt that he knew him rather well. He said he never felt that he was as close to WILLIAM PIGMAN as he was to GEORGE. Mr. TUCKER stated that he is rather skeptical of the allegation that the PIGMANS passed on confidential information to unauthorized persons. However, he said that during the war he was not acquainted thoroughly with their activities and he supposed that he could not be sure of his estimation of them in view of that. However, he said he never heard any comment nor observed any act on the part of either of the PIGMANS which would indicate any disloyalty in any respect. Mr. TUCKER said he had never heard the name of HISS or CHAMBERS mentioned before he read about them in the newspapers.

Mr. TUCKER said that he had noted in his acquaintanceship with WILLIAM PTGMAN that he was rather outspoken in his views. He stated that both of the PTGMANS were interested in a local union at the National Bureau of Standards known as the Federation of Architects, Chemists, Engineers and Technicians. He stated that in this regard he had never heard any unfavorable comments about them. It was his impression that the PTGMANS joined the union to promote better working conditions for the employees as a whole.

He said they were both interested in the sports program at the Bureau and that he recalls them both as being good athletics. He stated that he never knew of any other societies or organizations that either might have been a member of.

Mr. TUCKER said that of the two he felt that WILLIAM took life more seriously than did GEORGE. He said that GEORGE seemed to have a more normal sense of values than WILLIAM.

Mr. TUCKER commented about a newspaper man who contacted him with a desire to write an article reflecting on the background of the PIGMANS with

the aim of developing a long standing resentment in the hearts of both the PIGMANS toward society because of their poor start in life. Mr. TUCKER said he denied the newspaper correspondent an interview for he said he felt that such a thought was ridiculous. Never, he said, did he hear the PIGMANS make any comment that would reflect they had been handicapped by a lack of financial status in early life.

Mr. TUCKER said he would have every confidence in both of the PICMANS and that it was hard for him to believe what he read in the papers about them. Mr. TUCKER said he has been puzzled ever since he read about WILLIAM PICMAN passing on confidential papers. He said that he is at a loss to understand where PICMAN might have obtained them, "for," he said, "I know that the work he was working on in the Bureau was not of a classified nature." Further, he said, "I feel that he would not go beyond his position to obtain any information for anyone."

MR. CARSON CULP

Personnal Administrator Civil Aeronautics Administration

Mr. CULP made available on December 23, 1948 the personnel file of the Civil Aeronautics Administration on GEORGE LEROY PIGMAN. This file reflected an application filed by PIGMAN on August 12, 1940. It reflected his residence as being 1907 North Kenmore St., Arlington, Virginia. He stated that he had resided at that address since 1936, in this application.

His file further reflected that he was born February 22, 1912 in Chicago, Illinois. He listed his wife's name as VIRGINIA W. PIGMAN. He listed as references on this application, Mr. JESSE S. ROGERS, 4 Clermont, Garrett Park, Maryland; Mr. FLOYD B. HORNBROOK, 4803 11th St. North, Arlington, Virginia; Mr. PAUL A. FISCHER, 6136 22nd St., North, Arlington, Virginia; Mr. D. D. MEHAFFY, 6313 16th St., N.W.; Mr. WALTER W. BRANNOCK, 1509 Greenbrier St., Arlington, Virginia.

In this application GEORGE L. PIGMAN listed his relatives in government employment as being his wife, VIRGINIA PIGMAN and his brother, WILLIAM W. PIGMAN, 2006 North Stafford St., Arlington, Virginia.

On a recent application PIGMAN reflected his current address as being 602 West Maple Rd., Indianapolis 8, Indiana. He listed his home phone as being Hu 4512 and his office phone as being Be 5190. At that time he

reflected his position as that of grade P-6, salary, \$7432.00 per annum. He indicated that his supervisor was Mr. A. L. MORSE, CAA, Indianapolis, Indiana.

In this application he also listed Mr. JESSE S. ROGERS, Garrett Park, Maryland, as a reference and a Mr. H. KENDALL KING, Rural Route #1, Box 199, Bridgeport, Indiana.

MR. JOHN EASTON

Civil Aeronautics Administration

Mr. EASTON stated that GEORGE PIGMAN came to the Administration in 1940 and that he had made steady progress in the Administration since that time. He stated that more than a year ago he was transferred with the Materials Engineer Experimental Station to Indianapolis, Indiana.

Mr. EASTON said that PIGMAN was in to see him a week ago after he returned to Washington from the New York Grand Jury. He said that PIGMAN told him that as far as he could determine the Grand Jury was interested in him only insofar as his brother was involved in the case. Mr. EASTON said that those in charge of PIGMAN at CAA had no reason to doubt him. In fact, he said that he personally checked into the case and talked with Mr. A. L. MORSE, GEORGE PIGMAN'S immediate supervisor. He said that MORSE had nothing but favorable comments on GEORGE PIGMAN.

Mr. EASTON said that he, in speaking as he did, was only speaking of PICMAN'S work, that he knew nothing of PICMAN'S social life and activities outside of work. He commented too that the file which they had in the Washington office on PICMAN was only a skeleton file and that the main personnel file was maintained in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Never, Mr. EASTON said, did PTGMAN work on any classified matter while with Civil Aeronautics Administration but PTGMAN has worked on very important matters and they have found his work to be entirely satisfactory. He is considered one of their best engineers. PTGMAN, he said, is serving as Section Chief in the Experimental Station at Indianapolis and that his work with the other men has proven to be very satisfactory.

Mr. EASTON stated that there are no union activities within the Civil Aeronautics Administration and accordingly he does not know what

views PIGMAN might have along these lines however he said that in talking with PIGMAN recently, he asked him about any union activities he might have had while in the government service and that he was informed by PIGMAN that he, PIGMAN, belonged to a local of the Federation of Architechs, Chemists, Engineers and Technicians at the Bureau of Standards. From what PIGMAN mentioned, Mr. EASTON said he felt that this was an informal group in the Bureau of Standards and that it had no national affiliation.

Mr. EASTON stated he was never aware of PIGMAN having a brother until the matter was brought out in the paper. However, he said that since that time, he has been told that WILLIAM PIGMAN, the brother, is an outstanding chemist.

GEORGE C. VIETHEER

Assistant Director of Personnel Department of Commerce

Mr. VIETHEER made available the Department of Commerce file #598 on GEORGE PIGMAN of the Civil Aeronautics Administration on information concerning subpoena before the Grand Jury.

In this file there appeared a memorandum dated December 14, 1948 which reflected that GEORGE PIGMAN, brother of WILLIAM PIGMAN, formerly of the Bureau of Standards who is now an aeronautical engineer, chief of the Structural Section, had testified before a New York Grand Jury.

In this file there also appeared excerpts from a report of Special Agent R. P. Lewis dated August 17, 1948 at Indianapolis, Indiana. This excerpt concerned chiefly a comment made by GEORGE PITMAN'S supervisor, Mr. A. L. MORSE, who stated that PIGMAN was a close associate of PELLEIVA KANGAS, also an employee of the Civil Aeronautics Administration. MORSE further stated that PIGMAN and KANGAS both had similar views although he had no information pointing to any disloyalty. MORSE further stated that PIGMAN had some years ago, visited Russia and had travelled extensively in that country. However, MORSE said he was unable to furnish information that either PIGMAN or KANGAS had a disloyal trend.

Another excerpt from above cited report reflected that confidential informants I.P.S. 2856, 2855 and 2860, who were regarded as reliable informants, on communist activities in the Indianapolis area, had no information concerning PIGMAN or KANGAS.

For the information of the Bureau and the offices receiving copies of this report, it might be noted that the Commerce Department file on PELLEIVA KANGAS, Materials Engineers in the Experimental Station of CAA, Indianapolis, Indiana, was reviewed and it was noted that the loyalty board reported "that reasonable grounds do not exist for belief that KANGAS is disloyal to the Government of the United States. The board recommends the case be closed."

It should be further noted by the Bureau and offices receiving copies of this report that the names of the parties who attended meetings at the PIGMAN home, namely ARTHUR U. THEUER, E. P. FLINT, L. A. PAIMER and Dr. HERBERT INSLEY were searched through the Washington Field Office indices and no derogatory information was reflected regarding them.

This is to advise that I received a telephone call from Mr. C. S. Forster, Chief of the Investigation Division of the Department of Agriculture, at 4:00 p.m. on January 3, 1949.

Mr. Forster stated that he had noted in the December 20th issue of the "Newsweek" an article entitled "National Affairs - Is America Safe from Spies." This article stated in effect that Whittaker Chambers had advised Mr. Adolph Berle of the State Department in September, 1939 of the facts in his possession regarding a Communist espionage group operating in the Federal Government. The article continues by saying that Chambers in 1942 took his story to the FBI and that on the basis of the information he had supplied, the FBI in paturn had made reports to those departments wherein individuals mentioned in the Chambers testimony had been employed.

Mr. Forster stated that since Alger Hiss had worked for the Department of Agriculture, he would appreciate knowing whether or not this data was ever supplied to the Department of Agriculture, and, if so, to whom in that Department. Mr. Forster stated that, according to the records of the Department of Agriculture, Hiss resigned in 1935.

I advised Mr. Forster that, in view of the fact that Mr. Hiss was not employed by the Department of Agriculture at the time the Bureau allegedly received the information from Whittaker Chambers and made its reports available to the various interested government agencies, it was unlikely that any information in this matter was supplied to the Department of Agriculture. I advised him, however, that a check would be made to determine whether or not such information had been sent to his Department.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that this matter be referred to the Internal Security Section in order that it can be determined whether or not any data of the statements given by Chambers have ever been sent to the Agriculture Department. On completion of this check if the Internal Security Division will advise me as to the results thereof, I will advise Mr. Forster by telephone.

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Addendum: 1-6-49

Alger Hiss was employed in the Department of Agriculture from May, 1933 to April, 1935. The first information appearing in the Bureau files concerning Hiss is dated September 25, 1941. He was the subject of a Hatch Act inquiry authorized on December 24, 1941, at which time he was employed in the State Department. In view of the foregoing, no distribution of information on Alger Hiss was made to the Department of Agriculture so far as the records reflect.

It is recommended that Mr. Forster be advised that no information was furnished to the Department of Agriculture since Hiss was not employed there subsequent to April, 1935.

Reference New York teletype to San Francisco dated January 3, 1949, requesting that efforts be made to obtain any specimens of typewritten material emanating from the HISS family and in the possession of JACK SUTRO, attorney in San Francisco and former classmate at Harvard Law School with ALGER HISS.

JACK SUTRO (true name, JOHN ANSUTRO) of the firm of Pillsbury, Madison, and Sutro, 225 Bush Street! San Francisco, made available the following specimens of typewritten material received by him from ALGER HISS. Mr. SUTRO stated that to the best of his knowledge, these are the only specimens of typewritten material received by any member of his family from any member of the HISS family. The specimens received from Fr. SUTRO are described as follows:

1. Letter dated November 23, 1940, on stationery of the Department of State, addressed "Dear Jack," commencing, "I have been asked by our former law professor...," signed "Sincerely yours, ALGER HISS," and with the notation in the lower left-hand corner that it was addressed to Mr. JOHN A. SUTRO, Standard Oil Building, San Francisco, California.

2. Letter dated November 29, 1940, on stationery of the Department of State, addressed to "Dear Jack," commencing "Many thanks for your very helpful letter..." signed "Very sincerely yours, ALGER HISS," and with a notation in the lower left-hand corner that the letter was being directed to JOHN A. SUTRO, Esq., Standard Oil Building, San Francisco, California.

3. Letter dated September 26, 1946, on stationery of the Department of State, addressed to "Dear Jack," commencing "I appreciated your note several weeks ago.." and signed "Yours ever, ALGER," with a notation in the lower left-hand corner indicating that the letter was directed to Mr. JOHN A. SUTRO, Hotel Pierre, New York, New York, New York, 1333-267

4. A two-page letter dated January 17, 1947, with the return address at the top, 3210 P Street, N. W., Washington 7, D. C., and with a printed address form pasted in the upper right and corner bearing the words, "Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, 405 W. 117th Street, New York 27, New York." This letter is directed to "Dear Jack," and commences, "It was very

thoughtful of you to write..." The first page of the letter ends, "I assume that he is back..." A notation in the lower left-hand corner indicated it was being directed to Mr. JOHN A. SUTRO, Standard Oil Building, San Francisco 4, California. The second page of this letter begins, "..back in Los Angeles again," and concludes, "Thank you from Priscilla and me, Yours ever, /s/ ALGER," and the typewritten signature, "ALGER HISS."

- 5. A typewritten letter dated December 30, 1948, bearing the return address at the top, "22 East 8th Street, New York, New York," addressed to JOHN A. SUTRO, Esq., 3598 Jackson Street, San Francisco, California, "Dear Jack," and commencing "My step-son, TIMOTHY HOBSON..." and signed, "Ever sincerely, ALGER."
- 6. Envelope bearing the typewritten address, JOHN A. SUTRO, Esq., 3598 Jackson Street, San Francisco, California, with the typewritten return address in the upper left-hand corner, 22 East 8th Street, New York, New York. This envelope, according to Mr. SUTRO, was the envelope in which Item 5 was received by him.

The above-described documents have each been initialed on the reverse side by Mr. JOHN A. SUTRO, who placed the date, January 4, 1949, and his initials on each document in the presence of Special Agents DAVID E. TODD and CHARLES F. BRUSCH in Mr. SUTRO's office at 225 Bush Street, San Francisco. It should be noted that Items 1, 2, 3, and 4 have each been punched in the upper left-hand corner and Item 2 bears a pencilled notation in the upper right-hand corner appearing to be "#30-H." The punch marks and notation were made in the process of filing these documents in Mr. SUTRO's office.

Mr. SUTRO when furnishing these documents explained that while he had been a classmate of ALGER HISS at Harvard University from 1926 to 1929, they had not been intimate at that time. The only definite association other than the attendance of classes together, which Mr. SUTRO could recall, was that he and HISS each were members of the Lincoln Inn Eating Club while attending the Harvard University Law School. When first contacted, Mr. SUTRO could recall no contact with ALGER HISS between the date of their graduation from law school until the time of the United Nations Conference for International Organization at San Francisco in early 1945. However, upon examining his file containing correspondence from HISS, Mr. SUTRO located the documents described above as Items 1 and 2. Mr. SUTRO advised that after

meeting ALGER HISS at the UNCIO Conference, he invited HISS to his home on several occasions. During this period, ALGER HISS was residing at the Fairmont Hotel, San Francisco, and was acting as Secretary-General of the UNCIO Conference. Since meeting members of Mr. SUTRO's immediate family, ALGER HISS has on various occasions written longhand letters to Mr. and Mrs. SUTRO and in one or two instances, notes to the Sutro children. In no instance, according to Mr. SUTRO, did HISS or Mrs. HISS direct any type-written communications to any member of the SUTRO family other than those described above.

The FBI Laboratory is requested to immediately compare the items being transmitted herewith with known specimens of typed material in the possession of the Bureau. Upon the completion of this examination, these items should be returned to the San Francisco Office in order that they may thereafter be returned to Mr. SUTRO.

The following information concerning Mr. SUTRO is being set forth for the consideration of the Bureau in the handling of the specimens and information received from Mr. SUTRO:

JOHN A. SUTRO during World War II was a Lieutenant Commander representing the Office of Naval Intelligence at the Naval Air Station, Alameda, California. While active in that capacity, Lt. Commander SUTRO was always most cooperative with any Bureau representative who contacted him and took considerable pains to assist the Bureau in whatever manner possible. In addition, Mr. SUTRO is a personal friend of numerous agents whose acquaintance he made during the period of his naval service, and has frequently volunteered his services if in any investigation it might appear that he could be of assistance.

JOHN SUTRO is presently active as an attorney in the firm of Pillsbury, Madison, and Sutro, which firm represents the Standard Oil Company of California, and Mr. SUTRO is general counsel for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, with whom the San Francisco Office enjoys excellent relations. Mr. SUTRO explained that he is personally strongly anti-Communist, and his activities while representing ONI at the Alameda Naval Air Station would confirm this. He therefore is embarrassed by having associated with HISS, whom he now feels was probably active as a member of the Communist underground at the time HISS was in San Francisco at the United Nations Conference. Accordingly,

Mr. SUTRO has requested that his name be retained in confidence in the event the Laboratory examination of the enclosed specimens fails to produce an identification of such value as to necessitate the use of these specimens in evidence. Further, he requested that no dissemination of the fact that he possessed these documents be made outside the Bureau unless it becomes necessary to introduce them into evidence. Mr. SUTRO stated that in the event an identification is made such as would warrant the introduction of these documents into evidence, he would be a willing witness if subpoenaed, and would have no hesitancy about revealing anything and everything that he knows about ALGER HISS and about this correspondence.

In view of Mr. SUTRO's past and potential future cooperation, it is suggested that the Bureau give every consideration to his requests.

Reference is made to your memorandum to the Director relating to efforts to secure typewriting specimens emanating from Alger Hiss which might be of value in this matter. A quick check of material available on the current investigation was negative as to the Director's inquiry as to what had happened as a result of the lead set up relating to the Home Life Insurance Company, New York City.

The Washington Field Office was checked and they were unable to locate a communication addressed to the New York Office relating to this lead and so I placed a call to Supervisor Tuohy of the New York Office at 11:00 a.m., in the absence of ASAC Belmont. The records of the New York Office were checked rapidly with negative results and I instructed that they be certain this lead was covered by a check with the Home Life Insurance Company, New York City. Mr. Tuohy called back at 12:35 p.m. and stated that a check had been made at the Home Life Insurance Company and there were no typewriting specimens relating to Donald Hiss, Alger Hiss or Mrs. Priscilla Hiss. There was a record of an application for an insurance policy on the part of Donald Hiss but the policy was refused because of Donald Hiss' physical condition. A memorandum in response to the Director's inquiry is attached.

I explained to Mr. Belmont that these documents were used on a day to day basis for comparison of typewriting specimens and the Bureau desired to utilize the documents so long as possible and also wished to save the time of the Laboratory expert.

Reference is made to the teletype from the Director to Boston and New York dated January 4, 1949, advising that ALGER HISS gave an address before the Commercial Club of Boston, which he reported in his 1946 federal income tax.

For the information of the Bureau, this speech was arranged by STUART C. RAND, 30 State Street, Boston, Massachusetts, who was then a member of the Executive Board of the Commercial Club. Mr. RAND believes arrangements were made by letter but neither he nor his secretary has been able to locate it and believe that it was destroyed some years back.

Mr. RAND in searching through his files relating to the Commercial Club located a letter from ALGER HISS dated September 3, 1948, which is being enclosed herewith. In the event the Laboratory ascertains this letter is not identical with specimens Q6 through Q69 in instant case, the Laboratory is requested to return the letter forthwith to Boston so that it may be returned to Mr. RAND.

Mr. RAND, who is a member of the firm of Choate, Hall and Stewart, stated he regarded the enclosure as a personal letter and manual terms. contents of it be maintained confidential by the FBI. He said that unless the typewriting in this letter is identical with the questioned specimens at the Bureau, he requested that the Bureau keep this matter in an entirely confidential status. Mr. RAND said that the letter is innocuous, relating to a contemplated speech by ALGER HISS at Boston and he wanted to be definitely sure that it would not be turned over to either the United States Attorney's office at New York City or the House UnAmerican Activities Committee. He stated that with the names of General Eisenhower and Harvey Bundy being Entrioned he was concerned lest the enclosure in the hands of the wrong forganization be made the subject of unnecessary newspaper publicity.

Reurlet dated December 23, 1948, requesting reinterview with HORACE AN INGRAM, Cartersville, Georgia.

INGRAM was located at Route #1, Cartersville, Georgia, on the afternoon of December 30, 1948, and requested to go to the City Hall, Cartersville, Georgia, where he was reinterviewed, and furnished the signed statement set out below which clarifies some points which were covered in signed statement previously obtained from him. All nine items requested in referenced letter are believed fully covered in this statement, or in the statement previously furnished by INGRAM.

"Cartersville, %...
Pecember 30, 1948

"I, HORACE ALTON ANGRAM, make the following voluntary statement to JOHN E. DAVIS who has identified himself to me as a Special Agent of the Federal Eureau of Investigation, United States Department of June 1990 Justice.

"I was born in Bartow County in or near Cartersville, Ga., July 12, 1909. At the present time I reside at R.F.D. 1, Cartersville. From Harch 31, 1942, to February 12, 1945, I was in the Army, and had serial number 35400135.

"When I was a boy I helped my father on the farm, but have always been sort of restless and like to travel, but not so much now as when I was younger.

"The following information is given to help clear up some of the points in the statement I made in Atlanta to Special Agent SYLVESTER on December 15, 1948.

"As I told Mr. SYLVESTER, I worked at various jobs in cities and farms in the Eastern part of the United States during the 1030's. I worked for Timben Roller Bearing Company in Canton, Ohio three or four different times during 1926 to sometime in the 1030's. I recall quitting Timber and working several months for Florida Power & Light Company in Liami, during or about 1927. I broke my arm in Miami, and then after it healed went back to Chio and worked awhile. I recall being in the CCC camp at Blue sidge, Georgia, about 1933 for about a year, then after being discharged I ran a hamberger joint in Cartersville with my father JAMES, and brother, RAYMOND INGRAM. We ran this place about a year and I think made a crop for oither one or two years after this on a farm my father rented from BOB MAXWELL near Cartersville. About 1936. I think I worked a little bit for the County here, and then decided to take off again. I hitchhiked all through Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Pennsylvania, and possibly other states I don't remember.

"I always kept myself clean, and paid my own way. I would stop and work two or three weeks on a farm or in a restaurant as a short order cook, or counter man until I got a few dollars ahead, and then would go somewhere else. If I got too hard up I would wire home and my folks would send me a little money. Part of the time I worked under the name of JACK INGRAM, since that is what nearly everyone around Carterwille calls me, but I alwas sign official papers and things like that by my true name, which is HORACE.

"I recall going by the Thompson-Weinman plant in Morristown, Pennsylvania, twice along about them, and worked for them once. I knew some of the boys who worked there because Thompson-Weinman also operate a plant at Cartersville and some of the boys from here go there to work. I recall RHODY MELSON, COTTON MELSON and ED BIDDY

were some of the Cartersville boys working for Thompson-Weinman when I worked up there for them. I believe I sent RHODY NELSON to the foreman to see about getting me a job, and I imagine he told him that JACK INGRAM from Cartersville wanted a job. I believe FRED CHAPPEL was the foreman who was my boss. I'm not sure whether it was this time I worked the few weeks for Thompson-Weinman, or the other time I just hitchhiked by there and talked to some of my friends, but I did go from Norristown, Pennsylvania to dashington the morning of the day I met the two men I described to Agent SYLVESTER. This was the only time I had been to Washington up to then, and I have never lived or worked there.

"I can't recall any better description of the two men then I gave before, but the tall man whose picture I saw in the paper and which I picked out of the group of photographs shown me by Agent DAVIS, represented himself to be a lawyer and showed me a card that had a name, "Attorned At Law" and some address written on it. I don't recall the name or address. It seemed to me that the ball man was representing the short fat man in some cort of divorce action, and the papers they gave me were supposed to be something about alimoney payments.

"I got the impression the tall man was taking the little man for a ride, because when the tall man gave me the 200 he said to the short fat man, "See, that's how each just a little thing costs".

"As I said before, I went to New York City on a coach train. They told me to take the first train I could get to New York City, and I believe it was a Pennsylvania train, but I'm not sure. I did not talk to a single person in How York, but the taxi driver who took me to the address. I went to there and back to the railroad station, and the short man who met me and took the same package they gave me a few hours earlier in New York.

money as I did delivering their packages I decided to ride the train.

"I did not return to Washington until 1942, when the Army sent me there.

"I never mentioned this incident to anyone after I returned to Georgia, and forgot all about it until I saw the picture of ALGER HISS in the paper and recognized him as the tall man who gave me the packages and money in the spring of 1937 or 1938.

"I told my father about going to the F.B.I. the other day with this information, and he and my cousin, Judge INGRAM, who knows about it, both said I did the right thing. These are the only two people in Cartersville who know about this. I did go to the Police Station in Atlanta before going to the F.B.I., and some detective there told me the F.B.I. was the people I wanted to see. He called the F.B.I. office for me, and I talked to some man there who told me an Agent would see me the next morning.

"I have read this statement of six pages and it is true.

After INGRAM furnished this statement, he was interviewed as requested, but no discrepancies between the statement furnished and statements he made at that time were noted.

One copy of photograph of ALGER HISS furnished by Bureau as enclosure in referenced letter was exhibited to INGRAM, along with six other photographs of similar make-up, and he picked the phogograph of HISS from this group as being the person he contacted in Washington. He said that he did recall that the house he went to in New York City where he delivered the package seemed well furnished, and he recalled sitting in what appeared to be a small library when he talked with the individual who received the package and whom he had seen a few hours earlier in Washington.

Chief of Police, MCCAL, and Assistant Chief, DAVIS, at Cartersville, both said they had known INGRAM as JACK INGRAM some twenty five years, and although he had been arrested several times for drunkenness, he came from a good family, and had a generally good reputation for truthfulness. To was ascertained that his father was Tax Collector of Bartow County, 'eorgia, several years ago. His first cousin, WILLIAM A. INGRAM, is a prominent Cartersville attorney, and a former City Court Judge who is prominently known as Judge INGRAM.

INGRAM related that after seeing the picture of HISS in a newspaper, he immediately went to the Atlanta Police Department and told his story to a detective, the detective telling him he should call the FBI, and then dialing the FBI number for him. He then talked to the night clerk on duty as previously reported. He said he did not go to a newspaper office, and this was confirmed through Mr. CLARK MCMALL, JR., reporter for the "Atlanta Constitution", who said information his paper received from INGRAM came from the reporter on duty in the press room in the police department.

INGRAM said that after being interviewed by Agent SYLVESTER of the Atlanta office, he returned to Cartersville, and told his story to his father and Judge INGRAM, but no one else there knew of it. This was confirmed by interview with Judge INGRAM who is considered to be a reliable individual.

INGRAM's divorced wife, LACY HEAD INGRAM, RFD, Cartersville, said he had never told her about delivering packages from Washington to New York, although she knew he had travelled a great deal when he was younger.

INGRAM said he was not working at the present time, but living on a Government pension of \$96.00 per month received for service connected disabilities. He claims he intends to go to school under the G.I. Bill of Rights during 1949.

The picture INGRAM claims he saw in some paper is undoubtedly an Associated Fress wire photo dated December 8, 1948, in New York, showing ALG_R and DOMALD HISS walking up the steps to the Federal Court House in New York. This particular picture was not published in Atlanta papers, although other pictures of ALGER HISS have been published from time to time for the past several months.

The picture referred to of DONALD and ALGER HISS together was published in the December 20th issue of "Life Lagazine", and no doubt was published in other publications all over the country.

It is noted there are several news stands handling out of town and out of state newspapers in the vicinity of the Kimball House, Atlanta, where INGRAM could have obtained papers.

Mr. W. LEWIS BROWN, RFD, Cartersville, who is now a prominent farmer and factory representative of Savage Arms Company, and who was formerly an employee of the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, said he had known HORACE INGRAM as JACK INGRAM some twenty five years, and considered him very erratic and untruthful.

It is noted that report of SA JAMES L. KIRKLAND, dated December 25, 1948, at Philadelphia, verified the fact that JACK INGRAM worked for a short time between 1931 and 1936 for the Thompson-Weinman Company.

On reviewing this letter, there are several points in regard to which this office desires to make suggestions that may be helpful. Philadelphia does not have detailed information regarding all of the investigative activities in the instant case. Accordingly, some or all of the suggestions may already have been utilized or considered and discarded.

l. The Washington Field Office was instructed in the last paragraph on page 11 to reinterview informants who were active in the Communist Party, in Washington, D. C., during the years 1933 to 1940.

Special Agent HUBERT H. FINZEL, now assigned to Philadelphia, was formerly assigned to the Washington Field Office. It is his recollection that WFO Informant C-203 was not only active in the Communist Party during the period in question, but was actually very closely associated with. WILL ALIEN, ELEANOR NELSON SOYRING, HENRYARHINE and JESSICA BUCKTRHINE. Q-203 is also personally acquainted with FRANKLIN VICTOR RENO and PHILIP ENO and should be able to furnish valuable information regarding them. This Informant likewise knew that ELEANOB NEISON, JESSICA BUCK and HELEN MILLER shared an apartment on "P" Street in Washington, D. C. before JESSICA married HENRY RHINE on September 13, 1934. This Informant should

likewise know about affairs carried on by ELEANOR NELSON, including her residence with DAVIDXZIMMERMAN, was, while her divorce from PAULXPORTER was pending.

Former Philadelphia Informant PAC 20 was active in the A. F. of L. Union that preceded the United Federal Workers of America - CIO, at Washington, D. C., and claims to have been very friendly and associated with JESSICA BUCK RHINE about 1935. This Informant was never questioned in great detail by Philadelphia regarding his knowledge of Communist Party activities at Washington, D. C., in the middle 1930's. The Informant is presently in Chicago and it is understood that the Chicago Office has interviewed him in connection with IGE investigations. It is suggested that considera-

tion be given to further interviews at Chicago.

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According to JESSICA BUCK RHINE and HENRY RHINE worked with ELEANOR NELSON in recruiting Government workers into the Communist Party. RHINE himself was employed by NRA in Washington, D. C., from November 6, 1933, to March 31, 1936, and by the WPA in the National Research Department from May 13, 1936, to March 10, 1937. He also had employment with one or more Congressional Committees.

WHITTAKER CHAMBERS was employed at the NRA at the same time as HENRY RHINE, although it is not known whether they were acquainted.

RHINE moreover was a National representative of the United Federal Workers of America - CIO, from 1936 to 1937, and International representative of that Union from 1937 until about 1942. RHINE is an International Organizer for U.E.R.M.W.A. - CIO, in the Philadelphia area at the present time. His wife, JESSICA BUCK RHINE, who is separated from HENRY, is, so far as is known, in Indianapolis, Indiana, at the present time.

It is suggested that consideration be given to interview with both RHINES in an effort to determine whether they are acquainted with CHAMBERS or HISS. HENRY RHINE continues membership in the Communist Party locally and so far as is known, JESSICA RHINE is a member in Indianapolis.

3. It is the recollection of Agent FINZEL that WILL ALIEN was in New York City in 1946 or 1947 at the Albert Hotel, and while there attempted to contact JOHN WILLIAMSON at CP Headquarters. He was denied permission to contact WILLIAMSON. WILLIAMSON's secretary thereafter made the remark, "ALIEN has gone to pot."

It is suggested that consideration might be given to interview with ALLEN.

has said that JACOB BAKER, the first President of the United Federal Workers - CIO, was forced out of office by the Communists under the leadership of ELEANOR NELSON. It is believed that BAKER is now in New York and that he is very bitter against ELEANOR NELSON and the people who worked with her. It is likewise believed that he can furnish much valuable information regarding the activities of the Communists within Government circles during the period 1933 to 1940. BAKER has been contacted by Agents of the FBI in the past and has been cooperative to the extent of the previous interviews.

It is suggested that consideration be given to further interviews with BAKER in an effort to elicit information regarding the instant case.

The right shift key of this typewriter has a printed insert under the glass portion of the key with the following wording: "Purvin Typewriter, Chelsea 3-3600, Navaare 8-0672."

It is requested that the submitted known typewriting speciments be compared with the questioned letters previously submitted to the Laboratory in connection with this case. Upon completion of the examination, the submitted evidence may be retained in the files of the Laboratory.

In accordance with instructions received in this office from Inspector HOWARD FLETCHER on this date to the effect that as a result of a conference between Mr. JOHN PEURIFOY and Assistant Attorney General PEYTON FORD that SAM BOYKIN of the State Department had in his possession documents which were to be turned over to the Bureau, Mr. BOYKIN was contacted in his office at the State Department and there was received what Mr. BOYKIN explained were photostatic copies of material that had been furnished to the State Department by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

In addition to the photostatic copies there was one plain typewritten page setting forth the typewritten results of documents in longhand, which Mr. BOYKIN explained had not been photostated and which he believed that the Department already had possession of.

Mr. BOYKIN further explained that there were three additional documents which were to be photostated but inasmuch as they were out being searched they would not be photostated until the morning of December 10, 1948, and requested the agent to re-contact him at approximately 10:00 o'clock on the morning of December 10, 1948, at which time he would be furnished the copies of these other three documents.

No knowledge of the material or the circumstances surrounding the disposition of the State Department to turn over this information was made by the agent and it was explained that the agent was merely picking up material which PEYTON FORD had arranged to secure through Mr. PEURIFOY.

This will be done unless the Bureau advises to the contrary.
