THE DIRECTOR TO D. M. LADD FROM JAY DAVID WHITTAKER CHAMBERS, WAS SUBJECT: PERJURY; ESPIONAGE - R

At 11:25 a.m. today, Special Agent Kenneth Delavigne of the Wiss Gandy Washington Field Office telephonically advised that Jesse S. ABogers, an employee of the War Department who was interviewed for approximately two hours yesterday by Agents of the Washington Field Office, reportedly died in his sleep last night. Mr. Delavigne stated that Rogers was interviewed at his office in the War Department on the afternoon of January 12, 1949, by Special Agents Robert McCaslin and Paul Tierney. According to the Agents, Rogers was obviously not furnishing the information he had in his possession and to almost every pertinent question he would reply that he could not recall. The Agents, upon taking their leave, asked him to make every effort to recall the answers to the questions that they had asked him. He stated he would do so and arrangements were made to reinterview him today.

In connection with the interview of Rogers, it is noted that Whittaker Chambers was interviewed on December 8, 1948, at New York City. He advised that while functioning as a courier for the Communist Party underground he was introduced to William Ward Pigman, probably in 1936. Subsequent to meeting Pigman in the latter part of 1936 or early 1937, Pigman began furnishing Chambers' documentary material from the Bureau of Standards. This activity on the part of Pigman continued, according to Chambers, until April, 1938. William Ward Pigman was subsequently interviewed by Bureau Agents and denied engaging in any activity as alleged by Chambers and denied knowing Chambers. It is noted that Pigman is presently employed as a Research Chemist in the American Paper Institute, Appleton, Wisconsin-

Subsequent investigation of Pigman conducted on the instructions of the Department determined that Jesse S. Rogers was an employee of the Bureau of Standards and closely associated with William Ward Pigman in the early 1930's. One of the individuals interviewed to date in Washington, D. C., concerning Pigman's previous associates at the National Bureau of Standards advised that o he attended discussion meetings at Pigman's residence in Washington, D. C. the early 1930's, that Rogers also attended these meetings and that the view of both Pigman and Rogers were radical. DECORDED - 991 EX 1374-

The records of the Yellow Cab Company, 1408 W. Third Etreet, Los Angeles, California, contain one small photograph, front view, of JOHN L. SHERMAN which was taken in January, 1943. The original photograph was obtained and a copy of it in its original size and an enlarged copy were made. One small photograph and one enlarged photograph are being forwarded with this letter to the offices indicated below.

The records of the Yellow Cab Company reflect that when JOHN LOOMIS SHERMAN made application for the position of driver, he furnished the following personal background information:

During the interview with Duggan by agents of this Bureau on December 10, 1948, Duggan stated that he was approached by two individuals to furnish information for the use of the Soviets or the Communist International, when he was employed by the State Department. One of these persons was <u>Frederick Vanderbilt Field</u>. He stated that Field was a classmate of his at Harvard and he recalled that Field approached him for this information some time during the years 1936 or 1937. He stated he could not recall the words used by Field in this connection but stated there was no question in his mind as to the meaning of Field's words. He advised that he turned down the proposition made to him by Field.

On December 30, 1948, Frederick Vanderbilt Field was interviewed at New Hartford, Connecticut, and he stated that he desired to consult his attorney prior to making any statements. He advised that he planned to consult with his attorney early the following week and would then contact the New York Office of this bareau relative to discussing this matter.

Field was interviewed on January 3, 1949, at his office in the presence of his attorney, Harold E. Cammer, a partner of Nathanjiiltt. At the outset of the interview, Field requested to be furnished with a complete transcript of the interview made by agents of this Bureau with Laurence Duggan on December 10, 1948. When the agents refused to furnish him with this transcript, Field advised that upon advice received from his attorney, he had prepared a statement which reads as follows:

"On Sunday, December 26, 1948, Attorney General Tom C. Clark, during a television interview, stated, according to the press of the following day, that Laurence Duggan had informed the F.B.I. that he was approached ten years ago "by two persons" in connection with an alleged Communist espionage ring, but that he had repulsed them both. The Attorney General did not identify the two persons further. The matter of identification was left to Drew Pearson, who during his regular Sunday night broadcast that same night, alleged that Laurence Duggan had '19 informed the F.B.I. that some woman and myself were these two persons." This was the first I had even heard of these charges. After the information which Laurence' Duggan is alleged to have given the F.B.I. concerning me had thus been given nation wide publicity, necessarily with F.B.I. connivance, two agents of the T.M. (alled upon me at my home in New Hartford, Connecticut, on December 30, 1948, and indicated

that they wished to question me regarding the alleged information concerning me which had been attributed to Laurence Duggan. I arranged to meet the agents of the F.B.I. at my office in New York City on January 3, 1949, at 4:30 p.m. At that time I requested them to permit me to see a transcript of the alleged statements concerning me which they attributed to Mr. Duggan. This they refused to do. In view of my conviction that Mr. Duggan could not and did not make statements concerning me of the character and innuendo leaked by the F.B.I., in view of the refusal of the F.B.I. agents to disclose in context the statements concerning me which are attributed to Mr. Duggan, and in order to avoid any misunderstanding or distortion such as has apparently been generated in this case, I prepared this statement which I delivered to the agents at the meeting referred to. Laurence Duggan was for many years a personal friend of mine. We were classmates at Harvard, in the class of 1927, roomed in the same group and were both officers of our class. After college we kept up our acquaintance by seeing each other occasionally. Our relationship was one of long term friendship nothing more. I do not and cannot believe that Mr. Duggan made the statements concerning me which the F.B.I. has, by leaks and indirection, accused him. I deny categorically any implication that I was at any time involved in any form of espionage, that I violated or attempted to violate any official secrets, or that I attempted to obtain from Mr. Duggan confidential information of any sort. I regard the action of the F.B.I. in the circumstances as grossly improper and most unfair."

After the interviewing agents perused Field's statement, they advised Field that no leak had been made to Mr. Drew Pearson by this Bureau. Field advised that his prepared statement would be his only comment concerning this entire matter.

Two Men

Two men were being swept along last week by an onrush of events which were now well beyond their control—or the control of any other individual. They were two men of more than ordinary intelligence—well educated, quiet men caught in what one of them described as a "tragedy of history." Their paths first crossed



13 years ago; but their separate stories began much earlier: one in a commercial artist's household in Philadelphia, the other in a dry-goods merchant's respectable home in Baltimore.

The Profanist. Whittaker Chambers was born in 1901 in Philadelphia, the elder of two sons of Jay Chambers, who made a precarious living as a commercial artist. The family stock was a mixture of Dutch, Chambers and English. When young Whittaker was three, his family moved to Lynbrook, L.I., where Mrs. Chambers raised chickens and vegetables to piece out the family income. As a child, Chambers slaughtered fowl and peddled vegetables. He was a boy of insatiable curiosity who read Dosiger chys Camber of Lingston at eleven and the curiosity who

through the wind the head of t

Rockville Centre, and then, rather than go to college, which his mother wanted him to do, went south to look for a job. He got one in Washington working on the street railway tracks. From there he went to New Orleans, found no job at all.

Broke and hungry, he returned home, listened to his mother's advice and set out for Williams College. Already a cynical, worldly young man, he took one look at what he recalled later as "those young collegiate faces," stayed one night and decided to try Columbia University in New York. He was there two years. He wrote poetry, edited the literary *Morningside*, and shocked the campus by bringing out a blasphemous, so-called "Profanist" issue in which he wrote a story dealing "objectionably" with the Resurrection. A student committee invited the editor to resign. He left college and went off to Europe.

"Grease the Guillotine." He found Germany bankrupt, its economy collapsing. One night in Berlin he heard a Communist mob marching under his window singing: "Grease the guillotine with the fat of tyrants . . Blood must flow." It seemed to him that Western civilization was dying.

The U.S. to which he returned was celebrating the Jazz Age; and drinking bootleg gin. Chambers' brother Richard, to whom he was deeply attached, committed suicide. He visited Richard's grave one winter day and found it covered with ice. He wrote: "The cold earth holds him round, a sheet of ice is over his face. My brother has no more the cold rain to face."

Intellectually and morally frustrated, looking for a creed, he read the entire Socialist writings of Sidney & Beatrice Webb, discarded them as unpractical. One of his young Columbia friends put a copy of the Communist *Manifesto* in his hands. To Chambers, it was an awakening.

To Chambers, it was an awakening. "The Evil Thing." He was to explain later to the House Un-American Activities Committee how Marxism could appeal not only to the bitter young intellectual but to more or less sheltered middle-class persons as well. They were attracted, he said "by the very vigor of the project." They felt "a great intellectual concern—an almost Christian concern—for the underprovileged, for economic crises, for the problem of war. They say: "What shall T do? At that crossroad the evil thing... Communication for the will a simplified reser

means to a clear and simple end. In 1924, he joined the Communist Party in New York. For the next 14 years, as he admitted later, he lived a lie—a disloyal citizen plotting against his country.*

He was a find for the party—a taciturn, even secretive man, an awkward, fiery writer, a self-taught linguist who read and spoke German, French, Spanish and Italian. He wrote for the *Daily Worker*, became its foreign news editor, finally (while

of party discipline it out for the Midwest. He did not abandon Communism, however, and returned to New York. He had met and married a young labor organizer and painter named Esther Shemitz. They set up housekeeping in a poverty-stricken tenement on the East Side.

His great effort now was on proletarian fiction, published in the Communists' intellectual organ, the *New Masses*. His stories, full of romanticism and melodrama, were a summons to violence. Moscow was enraptured, cited him as "the first writer to introduce the Bolshevik into American writing."

The Man in the Linen Suit. In 1932 the party ordered him to go underground -in other words, wipe out his identity and become a secret agent, a spy. His wife cried; he himself was reluctant. But like any good Communist, he obeyed. The New Masses' Whittaker Chambers vanished. A man known simply as "Carl" appeared in the Red "cells" and in the innermost circles of the Communist underground. He buried his identity so successfully that some of his accomplices thought he was a Russian; one of them was positive that he was a Russian ex-colonel. The little boy who had peddled vegetables in Lynbrook became a skillful and consecrated agent of a Communist "apparatus."

One of the apparatus' assignments was to infiltrate the U.S. Government with Communist Party members. One day in Washington, in the summer of 1935, a dumpy little man, feeling self-conscious in the first white linen suit he had ever worn, confronted a tall, well-dressed young Government attorney. The little man was Whittaker Chambers; the other was Alger Hiss.

The Bright Star. Alger Hiss was born in Baltimore in 1904, the fourth of five children of Charles Alger Hiss, whose father had been a great admirer of Horatio Alger. Alger's father, a wholesale dry-goods merchant, committed suicide when Alger was three years old. Later, one of his sisters also took her own life.

The Hisses lived in a respectable Baltimore neighborhood. Young Alger peddled spring water to the neighbors and raised and sold squabs. He went to camp in Maine, attended P.S. 14, a city high school, and finally entered Johns Hopkins University.

There, a quiet, good-looking young man with an easy charm, he shone with a luster that is still remembered. He ran on the track team, headed the dramatic society, edited the campus daily, became colonel in the R.O.T.C., belonged to the best fraternity, won a Phi Beta Kappa key and was voted "most popular, best handshaker, best all around."

Said the yearbook: "Alger must be the most cultured and learned bozo in this neck of the woods. Many and various are the discussions that we have had with 1. in. Many and various the topics—they range from Soviet to style, from liberty to liquor, from guelphs to Goodnow [Frank J. Goodnow, then president of Johns Hopkins]. And like Socrates we admit our ignorance in the force of his irresistible logic and rhetoric."

After he graduated, Hiss went to Harvard Law School. There he was on the staff of the Harvard Law Review. Hiss's star continued to rise. He studied under Felix Frankfurter, graduated cum laude, and went to Washington to serve for a year as secretary to the late great Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes.

Poth of Honor. After three years of private practice in New York and Boston, Hiss went back to Washington as an as-

sistant general counsel in the AAA in Henry Wallace's Department of Agriculture. There he attracted the attention of Senator Gerald P. Nye, who was just starting his munitions investigations. Hiss served as a legal assistant through that sensational probe, then moved over to the Solicitor General's office.

By this time he was married and living quietly in Georgetown. His wife was <u>Pris</u>cilla-Pansler, a Quaker, the daughter of an insurance man. She was known as "Prossy." She had lived on Philadelphia's "Main Line" and had graduated from Bryn Mawr in 1924. She had worked as a copy

This was the path of apparent probity and honor which crossed Whittaker Chambers' path on that summer day in 1935. Chambers was to testify later that Hiss was already a member of a Washington Communist cell, that he and Hiss became fast friends, and that subsequently Hiss, with the help of Mrs. Hiss, began feeding secret Government documents into the Communist apparatus. Hiss was to deny the whole accusation with cold contempt. He and Prossy knew Chambers, he said, but only as a free-lance writer named "George Crosley" who had come to him to write an article on the Nye Committee.

General Secretary. Alger Hiss's ascendant star did not pause. In 1936 he went into the Department of State, where he worked under Assistant Secretary Francis B. Sayre, first on the Trade Agreement Act, then in the offices of Far Eastern affairs and special political affairs. In 1944 he served as executive secretary at the Dumbarton Oaks conference which laid the foundation for the United Nations.

In 1945, he went to Yalta with Franklin Roosevelt and helped draft the agreements which came out of that conference. Later that year he was general secreta at U.N.'s founding conference at Sar Francisco. Conferees unanimously commended him for the way in which he directed proceedings and managed the agenda. He was given the honor of carrying the U.N. charter to Washington for deposit in the Federal Archives.

Charges Denied. There were some vague stories about him. Secretary of State Byrnes was disturbed by reports that some Congressmen were going to accuse Hiss of being a Communist. Byrnes asked Hiss about it, told him the charges centered "from the FBI." Hiss went to the FBI and denied the charges categorically.

They cropped up again. In 1946 Hiss was proposed as president of the \$ro million Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, whose major objective now is informing the public about U.N. John Foster Dulles, Thomas Dewey's adviseron foreign affairs, and one of Hiss's backers for the Carnegie job, asked him again about the charges. Again Hiss categorically denied them. He was elected to the job, which was enough to cap any public servant's career.

munism. He had learned what all men learn sooner or later, that the agents of the Kremlin are assassins not only of men's bodies but of their minds and hearts. In fear and revulsion he quit the party. He was to testify later that he had tried to persuade Alger and Prossy to pull out with him, that Prossy indignantly rejected the idea, that Hiss had wept but, had refused.

Chambers and his family, his wife Esther and their children Ellen and John, went into hiding. "I was a faceless man, he said. He moved in a shadowy world of terror, carrying a gun. Finally he emerged cautiously from the shadows to begin a new life. In 1937 he had bought a small farm near Westminster, Md., which Hiss himself had once thought of buying.

As quietly as they could, the Chambers family settled into this haven. Chambers began his way back through the profession he knew best. He ventured into New York's literary world, did some research, reviewed some books and in April 1939 was hired to review books by TIME.

The Informer. To some of his colleagues, his fear of Communism seemed a morbid preoccupation, a kind of King Charles's head. He was valued, nevertheless, not only for his firsthand knowledge of Communism but for his outstanding skill in writing and his wide cultural background. He had also become a genuinely religious man: a Quaker.

In 1939, a little while after he came to TIME, he went to Adolph Berle, then Assistant Secretary of State, and disclosed to him the names of certain men who he said were Communists working in the government. He gave the same information, in two interviews, to the FBI. Last summer, he made his dramatic tale public before the House Un-American Activities Committee.

But on none of these occasions did he say anything about the packet of stolen State Department papers which he had stashed away after he broke with the Party. When he brought forward his dusty bomb from Brooklyn, he raised a whole new clamor.

In the midst of that clamor last week, Chambers resigned as a senior editor of

TIME. "When TIME hired me in 1939," he wrote in his statement, "its editors knew that I was an ex-Communist; they did not know that espionage was involved . . . After nine years of work done in good conscience, I have been called upon to expose the darkest and most dangerous side of Communism-espionage. This can be done only if a man who knows the facts will stand up and tell them without regard to the cost or consequences to himself. I cannot share this indispensable ordeal with anyone."

TIME accepted the resignation, neither judging nor pre-judging his recent disclosures. "Against the admitted disservice to his country of a decade ago," said TIME, "must be set the service we are convinced he is trying to perform for his country now."

The Final Lines. This week Alger Hiss resigned his \$20,000-a-year Carnegie post. Legal proceedings, he said, "will occupy almost all of my time for some weeks to come." The trustees tabled the resignation

Meanwhile Hiss clung staunchly to his impeccable role. If Chambers had lied, then Hiss had been incredibly maligned and made the victim of a monstrous slander. If Chambers spoke the truth, then Alger Hiss had led an almost incredibly clever double life. The two of them could do little more now than stand to one side. speaking their final lines, spectators more than actors in their own drama,

Three Rings

As if it were not complicated enough in itself, the Hiss-Chambers case had become a legal three-ring circus.

In the first ring was the House Un-American Activities Committee, which opened the case last summer when it subpoenaed Whitfaker Chambers, heard him confess his past complicity and charge that Alger Hiss had also been a Communist.

After weeks of examining witnesses, the committee had more or less dropped the case, without having developed sufficient evidence to prove whether Hiss or Chambers was lying. But Alger Hiss did not drop the case. After Chambers repeated his charges over radio's Meet the Press program. Hiss filed a \$75,000 libel suit against Chambers in Baltimore's Federal Court. This was the second ring.

In the third ring was a New York federal grand jury, sworn in 18 months ago to investigate spies and subversive activities.* It had paid little attention to the Hiss-Chambers case, although it had heard testimony from both men last summer. After Chambers had produced the stolen State Department documents and after the House committee had obtained the 'pumpkin papers," the grand jury moved in rapidly. On orders from Attorney General Tom Clark, U.S. Attorney John F. X. McGohey summoned Chambers and Hiss again, along with Hiss's wife, his brother,

The Nub of the Matter. The grand jury and the House committee each truculently proclaimed its authority, competed for witnesses. Committeeman Richard Nixon said angrily that a whitewashing was in the making in the grand jury.

But the public had a right to think that the case was getting somewhere; that it was now in appropriate hands. Everyone could hope and expect that the case would be tried and decided by due process of law and the first step in that process was action by the grand jury.

Beyond any shadow of doubt was one fact: that documents²⁰ had been systematically stolen from the State Department. By whom? And for how long? Over & above the questions of Chambers' truthfulness and Hiss's innocence or guilt loomed the still dark answers to these larger questions.

"Holy Cow!" At week's end new light had been thrown into some murky corners.

One witness who appeared before the

Together they went to Levine's mother's house at 260 Rochester Avenue, Brooklyn, where Levine had hidden the envelope on top of an unused dumbwaiter shaft. Levine testified that Chambers blew

Man in a Cocoon. Two more men entered the case. Both had been accused by Chambers as having given him papers from Government offices. One of them was William Ward Pigman, former employee of the Bureau of Standards, now a chemist with the Institute of Paper Chemistry at Appleton, Wis. He was questioned only by the grand jury; in a public statement he denied the charge.

The other was Henry Julian Wadleigh, <u>A. former. State. Department</u> economist. Tan, son of an Episcop. R. uster, father of three small children Widleigh lives in a still unfinished log a bar he is building in Vienna, Va. After questoning by the grand jury, the committee subpoenaed him, hammered him with questions but got nowhere. He said he was not a Communist, but he refused to answer almost all other questions on the grounds that it would "tend to incriminate or degrade me."

This week the jury's term would expire. But a new jury, already called, would take over immediately. If the old jury failed to reach any conclusions—*i.e.*, hand down any indictments—it would be the new jury's duty to press its search into the last and farthest corner of the mystery.

The Durable Herring

Repeatedly during the campaign, President Truman had charged that the House committee's investigation of the Hiss-Chambers case was nothing but a red herring to divert the voters' attention from campaign issues. But in view of the shocking new evidence, reporters trooping into Truman's press conference last week wondered what he would say now.

One of the first questions was whether the President thought that all arms of the Government should now be devoted to finding out who stole the "pumpkin papers" from the State Department. Why, certainly, the President replied, with an expression indicating that he thought the question was silly. Well, had he given any instructions to the Justice Department? The Justice Department, the President replied, had standing instructions to enforce the law. But it had no specific presidential instructions on the Hiss-Chambers case.

From a political standpoint, Truman's previous red-herring charges were understandable. They had been made at a stage when the Hiss-Chambers case was largely a debate between the two men as to

The truth is that this is not 'redherring' stuff and the country descrives to nave the Administration and the committee dealing with it seriously and soberly, and not with the back of the political wrist."

Reference is made to the attached teletype from the New York Field Office reflecting the results of an interview with Chambers on January 13, 1949, in which he referred to the original Underground Apparatus operated by Harold Ware and included, among others, Donald

Hiss. You inquired, "Is this correct? Does he mean Donald? H."

In the absence of ASAC Belmont this was discussed with Supervisor Al Tuohy of the New York Field Office who stated that he was positive the New York Office was correct in stating Donald Hiss was included by Chambers. To verify this Mr. Tuohy again discussed it with Chambers, who is now being interviewed in the New York Office, and he replied that he did mean Donald Hiss in the discussion of the group operated by Harold Ware. The case file reflects that Chambers previously has stated that Donald Hiss was included in the Ware group. He has also previously named Alger Hiss in connection with the same group.

I have received your letter with enclosure, postmarked January 2, 1949. While I am glad to receive your views concerning the work of this Bureau and my administration of it, your observations indicate that you do not clearly understand the specific nature of our responsibilities. The FBI is primarily a factfinding agency charged with the investigation of violations of laws of the United States, collecting evidence in cases in which the United States is or may be a party in interest and performing other duties imposed by law. Following a determination of the facts, complete information, uncolored by personal opinions or conclusions, is furnished to the appropriate prosecutive authorities for such action as is deemed advisable.

I can assure you that the FBI has not deviated one iota from its established operational policies which require that information in our files be held confidential and available for official use only. It should be noted that the work of the FBI and that of the House Committee on Un-American Activities follow different patterns as I pointed out in my statement before that Committee on Warch 26, 1947, a copy of which is enclosed.

You may be sure all matters within the scope of our jurisdiction are given prompt and exhaustive investigative attention. It has accurred to me that the material which I an sending you might be of some interest. After reviewing this data and considering my foregoing comments, I trust you will understand more fully the nature of our work.

That he was involved in espionage, directly or indirectly, and that he committed suicide; 2. That he was not involved but did commit suicide because his name had been mentioned by association; 3. That he was murdered and thrown from the window. There is still another possible assumption, namely, that he did not commit suicide nor was he murdered, but that he fell out of the window and that it all had nothing to do with the Chambers-Hiss affair or with his having been attached to the State Department.

Neither the police nor the FBI are helpful, but the FBI gives him a clean bill of health, yet does not explain the full nature of its investigation nor why he was investigated at all. The FBI has been silent in these esplonage matters for many years under instructions, it is to be presumed. At any rate, it would be more just to the memory of Laurence Duggan if the Department of Justice made itself clearer, so that no one would be suspicious that there is something on Duggan but that it is being suppressed.

The case of Sumner Welles is different. Here a man goes for a walk on Christmas night-very late in quiet country, across fields and not by road. He either had a heart attack or somebody tried to bump him off-or he simply stumbled on a root. Only Welles can describe the circumstances because he was alone. Immediately those who oppose the activities of the House Committee on Un-American Activities rushed into print or on the radio saying that Sumner Welles was made emotionally unstable by the death of Laurence Duggan. When they said that-on Sunday-they could not know it to be true.

Lots of people die of heart attacks-more than 40 per cent of all the deaths in this country. Therefore, it is possible to assume that Mr. Welles had a heart attack and collapsed upon frozen ground. Such an attack could be without relationship to politics—national or international. It might also have been due to indigestion, over-smoking, or a diabetic coma. Why must things not related to each other suddenly become related to each other?

In fact, those who use Mr. Welles's discomfiture for private revenge do him a disservice, for if they go far enough in their assertions, they may force a reopening of the Welles-Hull quarrel which resulted in Mr. Hull forcing Welles, an undeniably brilliant public servant, out of the State Department.

There is a danger that because of the certainty that spies were placed in the State Department by a foreign country, our enemy since 1917, every individual with a private grudge, a nasty mind, an unquenchable hatred, will point a vicious finger at the one he dislikes to call him a spy and a traitor. This is a dangerous business and so far as I can tell, and I have studied this problem with unremitting care for more than twenty years, those who are really guilty are pretty well known even if proof is unavailable and conviction well-nigh impossible.

The fact is that this was true in 1934 when the Harold Ware cells were organized; in 1938 when the Dies committee got its fingers on the data; in 1939, when Whittaker Chambers told his story to Adolf A. Berle; in 1941 when they gave it to the Department of Justice; in 1945-46 when the Prime Minister of Canada, Mackenzie King, personally gave it to the President of the United States. No matter how much more is discovered, the names are pretty much the same, with a little addition here and there.

And this must be understood: What we are dealing with is: 1. Espionage: 2. Neglect of duty; 3. Violation of the oath of office; 4. Condoning espionage and protecting sples to avoid exposure of error in high places. This country has not outlawed the Communist party and being a member of it is neither a misdemeanor nor a felony and can only be made so not by private judgment but by law. "Horsecars and Cobblestones" by Sophie Ruskay (The Beechurst Press. \$2.75) will probably rank as one of the pléasantest books of reminiscences to appear in several seasons. The following information was made available to the Bureau by D. Vincent Hurley who received the information from Mrs. Frances Fussell of Swarthmore, Pennsylvania. Agents of the New York Office today interviewed George Hewitt, who furnished the following information relative to Alger Hiss. Hewitt advised that he met Alger Hiss in 1937 or 1938 at a Party meeting, the purpose of which was to discuss the Negro question and the Communist Party infiltration into the West Indies. They met in an apartment house near West 21st Street, according to Hewitt. Present at the meeting were J Peters, Rose Wortis, Jack Stachel, Ter Bassett, Max Steinberg, Bill Lawrence and the two Hiss brothers, Alger and Donald. Hewitt said he could recognize either of the Hiss brothers now. Hewitt further said that he met both Alger and Donald Hiss on one occasion in Washington about 1940 on the occasion of an organizational meeting of the National Negro Congress held in the rear of one of the Congress balls on Pennsylvania Avenue. He said 35 or 40 others were present, including Max Yergen, James W Ford, Rose Wortis, Max Steinberg and Bob Campbell. In addition, Alger and Donald Hiss were at the meeting. Alger left after a very short time. Hewitt did not know either of them by name and had never spoken with them. He thought they were CI agents, that is, international agents of the Communist Party whose duty it is to observe at these meetings and report back to Moscow.

Following the interview with Hewitt, he was taken in the Bureau car to the vicinity of West 21st Street to locate the apartment house mentioned above. He advised that the apartment house at 8 West 16th Street is the apartment which he believes was the one where the meeting was held. He was taken into the apartment house and pointed out apartment F35 as the apartment in which the meeting was held. This apartment is presently occupied by R. P. Madge, who apparently moved into the apartment since that time. A further check is being made concerning this.

Hewitt advised that he furnished the foregoing information with the exception of the exact location of the apartment house to Stokes, a Negro investigator for the HUAC last week. He was told by Stokes to report to the Federal Court House on Friday, December 17, for an interview with HUAC representatives. When he arrived, Hewitt noticed the large number of newsmen and photographers and left the Court House but met Congressman McDowell later in the day at the Hotel Pennsylvania where he was interviewed. Hewitt says that by this time he was "fed up" and refused to be sworn in and would make no statement whatsoever to McDowell. He was supposed to meet Stokes again today to try to locate the house near West 21st Street but due to his interview with Agents, he was unable to do the form the state of the s

Hewitt advised that in 1937 or 1938 he was approached by Stachel and Steinberg, the latter at the time being organizational director of the New York State Communist Party. They told him they had an "organizational job" to do on somebody. Hewitt understood this to be a strong-arm job. They showed him a picture of this person and this was later identified by Hewitt as Whittaker Chambers, who, according to Stachel and Steinberg, was an undercover FBI agent working in the Communist Party. They told Hewitt that Chambers would be lured to Buffalo where the job would be done on him. Hewitt advised that later by pre-arrangement he met a girl whose identity is unknown to him at the Albert Hotel on University Place in New York City and was given an envelope which contained \$3,000. He was told to deliver it to Henry Wright, a leader of the Communist Party in Buffalo's Fifth Ward. Hewitt described Wright as an individual with a long Buffalo and Detroit police record, a Negro about 40 years old; grayish eyes, about six feet tall, with slightly protruding teeth. Hewitt had thought he was to deliver instructions but when he found the envelope contained money he would not carry out the job, returned the money to the girl and shortly thereafter broke with the Communist Party.

Hewitt refused to furnish a signed statement without talking to an attorney. He plans to talk to a Mr. Foster of the Civil Liberties Union tonight and will advise tomorrow whether he will furnish a signed statement. A subpoena was served on Hewitt for appearance before the Grand Jury at 11:00 a.m., December 21, by the U. S. Marshal.

Relative to Mr. Fletcher's call of December 19, setting forth that Mr. Alex Campbell of the Department had informed that Hewitt appeared before an INS hearing and had stated that he attended many Communist meetings with Alger Hiss, Hewitt was questioned regarding this statement. He advised that he had completed his testimony before INS hearings prior to the time the Chambers-Hiss case arose. Hewitt said he did not know Hiss by any name at the time of his INS testimony. He advised that he does not recall any such testimony concerning Hiss at INS hearings. He advised further that the meetings described are the only ones where he remembers seeing Alger or Donald Hiss.

MAX YERGEN

Max Yergen was interviewed by Agents of the New York Office today. He advised that he first met George Hewitt in Madison Square Park in August, 1948. At that time, Hewitt introduced himself to Yergen as Tam Holmes and congratulated Yergen on his break with the Communist Party. Yergen advised that he next saw Holmes last Friday when they both appeared before representatives of the HUAC.

Yergen advised further that he first saw Alger Hiss in April, 1945, at

the San Francisco conference when Hiss was secretary to Stettinius. He advised that he does not know whether Hiss is connected with the Communist Party and does not know the background of Hiss. He stated that when he was interviewed by Congressman McDowell, a Mr. Mandel and Mr.Stokes of the HUAC last Friday he told them that he did not know anything about any connections with Hiss and the Communist Party. He advised that he was not served with a HUAC subpoena but was merely told to stay in readiness.

Yergen advised that in the fall of 1946, Paul Robeson brought into his office at the Council of African Affairs a woman named Kleiner (phonetic). Robeson recommended her for employment. At that time she said she was the sister-in-law of Alger Hiss. She was employed from September, 1946, to early 1947 as a representative of the Council of African Affairs. Her duty was to go to the U.N. each day and write up the happenings for the benefit of the Council. She left to go to work for the Woodrow Wilson Foundation, according to Yergen. Yergen recalled that she lived at 10 Mitchell Place, New York City, with a woman named Edith Atwater. Yergen had no information regarding the background of Miss Kleiner except that he recalled she stated that during the war she was coordinating information for the War Department on information relative to the Balkan States. Therefore, she may have been employed by the War Department. Yergen had no information indicating that she was a Communist.

Jack Carlisle called from Detroit. He said he was somewhat disturbed over an editorial The Detroit News ran which in effect asked if the FBI was being hampered, why further didn't it do something in the spy cases, that he wanted to run further a column pointing out what the Bureau's responsibility is, that it is not a policy-making agency, that in the period when Chambers was securing secret documents there were a group of individuals in the K State Department and in the Government trying to smear the Director, that obviously anything the Director did would be thwarted by this group. Carlisle stated he did not want to embarrass the Director by such a story.

I told him I saw no basis for embarrassment. He reminded me of the fact that William E. Scripps sent Carlisle to Washington several years ago for the purpose of securing stories on Communists in the Government, that he had a long visit with the Director, that he had never violated any confidence. I told him I did not see where he would be violating any confidence running a story along the lines he discussed, pointing out that the files of other Government agencies are replete with information furnished by the Bureau if the Bureau has not departed from its well-established policies.

A copy of the editorial which appeared in The Detroit News on January 3, 1949, entitled ["Did Anybody Hold Back the FBI?" is attached.

Did Anybody Hold Back the FBI?

The House Un-American Activities Committee has left to its final report the disclosures:

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1 That, not two but at least 52 lots of secret State Department papers were stolen for Russia during the five years of Whittaker Chambers', connection with the Red spy "apparatus."

2 That a successor to this apparatus remained active at least as late as 1945.

3 That the committee has "no evidence" that the spy ring is not still operating.

On the face of these statements the committee has left its job far from done. It

has left unanswered the main question emerging from them, which is:

Where was the FBI during all this time?, $\star \star \star$

The FBI is now, as in 1935-39, the agency on which the country relies for safety from espionage. The statements in the committee's report can not help but shake confidence in its past and present alertness.

We know from the few samples published by the committee that documents stolen in the pre-war period were not fakes "planted" to fool the spies. They were the real thing, some so secret that they still can not be published.

We know now that the spying was not a case of a single isolated success, which, being discovered; led to effective counterespionage measures.

We are told that the apparatus operated, during Chambers' connection with it, like "a veritable espionage production line out of the State Department and other Government departments."

We know it operated within two blocks of the FBI's Washington headquarters. We know that, so far as the testimony shows, the FBI first learned of it when Elizabeth Bentley's conscience at last prompted her in 1945 to go to the Justice Department with a voluntary confession.

Indeed, the surface facts suggest that all now known to either the FBI or the committee came to them in the first instance through unsolicited confessions by those involved.

The picture is hardly one to inspire confidence that the spy danger has been licked or will stay licked.

 \star \star \star There is an inference, which appears believable, that the FBI was prevented from presenting to the New York grand jury all of the evidence it collected after the Bentley confession. The inference is that the Administration acted to save itself embarrassment.

By extension, it may be theorized that similar influences were at work in 1935-39 to keep the FBI from cracking down on the spy ring. Kiccoloff 2791

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ASAC Belmont of New York called at 11:15 A.M. today and stated that the New York Office is of the opinion that Special Assistant Attorney General T. J. Donegan and the other attorneys working on this case should have a complete report setting forth all information which the Bureau has on Hiss. In connection with this suggestion, Mr. Belmont advised that a question arose as to whether the New York or Washington Field Office should prepare such a comprehensive report. Mr. Belmont explained that if New York does it, it will for the most part be quoting information contained in reports submitted by the Washington Field Office since Washington Field has . been origin in the Hatch Act and has conducted most of the other investigation of Hiss. Mr. Belmont said that New York has copies of these documents but the Washington Field Office handled the correlation of these reports with information contained in the State Department records and as a result identified practically all of the documents. Mr. Belmont said that the New York Office has no detailed report or information reflecting this identification and in order to have a complete picture of this he suggested that the Bureau might desire to have the Washington Field Office set forth these documents, together with the identification with State Department affecords, in a report with copies included for the New York Office.

With regard to the microfilm which was loaned to the Bureau by the HCUA Mr. Belmont stated that the New York Office has photostatic copies of this film. However, he has been advised informally that as a result of the FBI Laboratory examination of this film, the Laboratory was able to bring out some indistinct prints. New York would like the result of the Laboratory's work in this regard in order that information concerning these films might also be included in a report. HECORDED 12 JAN 24/949

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Mr. Belmont said that if these suggestions are concurred in by the Bureau, the New York and Washington Field Divisions should be advised by teletype.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is suggested that the recommendations of the New York Office be placed in effect and that appropriate instructions by teletype be issued to the Washington and New York Field Offices.

Reference is made to the telephone call of ASAC Belmont at 11:20 a.m. today taken by Inspector Laughlin.

In following up the State Department documents and records, I had Mr. Roach check with Mr. Nicholson of the State Department who advised that photostatic copies of pertinent documents were turned over to Mr. Peyton Ford shortly before Christmas. I checked with Mr. Ladd, secured his authority and phoned Mr. Peter Brown of the Department. I outlined our problem briefly and in a few minutes received a phone call from Mr. Ray Whearty who explained this material had already been taken to New York and Special Agent Spencer of the New York Office had made some comparisons of the documents with the material received from Chambers. He stated if the material was not in possession of the New York Office and in Mr. Donegan's possession it could be secured from him.

I phoned ASAC Belmont, New York, and advised him of the information. He checked and found the documents had been seen by Special Agent Spencer and were in possession of Mr. Donegan. He stated they probably would be available on Monday. He stated he would have copies made of the State Department documents and have them forwarded immediately to the Bureau. <u>I told him when they were received they would be made available to the Washington Field Office so that the necessary report could come through</u>. I also told him that we would forward prints of the HUAC film as developed by the FBI Laboratory. I further told him I would instruct the WFO to prepare a report on the available information on Alger Hiss.

At 5:00 p.m. I phoned Supervisor Delavigne who is handling the investigation in the Washington Field Office and instructed that they prepare the report on Hiss.

UBIECT:

Reference is made to Baltimore teletype to the Bureau and the k ton Field Office dated January 6, 1949.

Pursuant to suggestion in referenced teletype, Special Agents PAUL J TIERNEY and ROBERT W. McCASLIN arranged an interview with Mr. JESSE S. ROGERS, an employee in the Safety Branch of the Chemical Corps, War Department, Temporary Building K, Room 2310.

At approximately 3:10 P. M., January 12, 1949, Special Agents PAUL J. TIERNEY and ROBERT W. McCASLIN entered Mr. ROGERS' office at the above listed address and arranged with him to meet in a vacant office adjoining his for an interview. The purpose of this interview was to ascertain Mr. ROGERS' connection with WILLIAM WARP PIGMAN, a principal in instant case.

Mr. ROGERS stated he became acquainted with WILLIAM WARD PIGMAN and his brother, GEORGE PIGMAN, at the time they were employed in the Cement Section at the Bureau of Standards. He felt this was approximately 1930. He said he worked directly with GEORGE PIGMAN and that he knew him better than he did WILLIAM-WARD PIGMAN. Mr. ROGERS said he visited their homes and that he recalled visiting GEORGE PIGMAN's home subsequent to the war. He said he had no contact with WILLIAM IGMAN subsequent to WILLIAM PIGMAN's return from Germany where it is known that he studied at the University of Leipsig.

ME: ROGERS stated he was not sufficiently aware of WILLIAM PICMAN's background to know definitely of his activities at the Bureau and added he was shocked when he read in the papers the information indicating that PICMAN might have been involved with CHAMBERS.

It seemed at this point in the interview that Mr. ROGERS' comments were less casual and that he was searching more deeply for answers to the questions put to him concerning his relations with the PIGMANS. It was noted on numerous occasions that in answer to questions he stated it was difficult for him to recall; that he was interested in knowing if the Bureau had any specific information which might refresh his recollection.

Again in going over the contacts that Mr. ROGERS had with the PIGMANS he remarked that he wanted it understood that his meetings with them were of a social nature; that he never met the family other than in the presence of his wife; that he personally did not like WILLIAM PIGMAN; that he felt he was a RECORDED 29 174-1333 - 000

"sneery" type of person; however, he added that PIGMAN's wife was very gracious and that his wife was fond of her. Mr. ROGERS stated to be exact as to the number of times he contacted the PIGMAN's home he would first prefer discussing the matter with his wife, he felt she would be able to refresh his memory.

Mr. ROGERS was asked if he visited WHLLIAM PIGMAN after the latter's return from Germany. He stated he had not and that he had learned of PIGMAN's return only through a friend by the name of CONGER who he stated lived as a neighbor to him in Maryland. Mr. ROGERS did not know CONGER's present address but felt he was connected with some sanitary commission which is presently working in South America.

Mr. ROGERS then mentioned he did recall visiting GEORGE PIGMAN subsequent to the war; however, he could not recall the exact year. He was asked about meetings he might have attended at the PIGMAN home and he replied he could not recall having ever attended any meetings. It might be noted at this point that this question was put to Mr. ROGERS because Dr. HERBERT INSLEY of the Bureau of Standards stated ROGERS had urged him to attend secret meetings which were held at WILLIAM PIGMAN's home in Washington.

Mr. ROGERS hesitated unnecessarily in answering questions about meetings that he was alleged to have had with the PICHANS. He then said he did recall having meetings at the Bureau of Standards but he explained these meetings as purely get togethers in connection with union activities in which he was interested on behalf of the engineers at the Bureau of Standards. Mr. ROGERS said it was his aim and the aim of several at the Bureau of Standards at that time to raise the status of professional engineers to the elevation of the medical and legal profession. He said he attended no more than three or four of these meetings for this purpose and again stated all these meetings were at the Bureau of Standards. He mentioned speaking at two of these meetings and jokingly remarked that he perhaps at that time looked upon union organizations more liberally than he does today. Mr. ROGERS felt that these above mentioned meetings occurred sometime during 1932 or 1933; however, he could not remember exactly what time of the year. He was asked if he could recall the gentlemen from the Bureau of Standards who were in attendance at these meetings and he said it was difficult but he felt that Dr. INSLEY and the PIGMANS must have been there and said that the only other person he could recall was a Mr. LACY WAGNER who, he stated, was employed by some cement company in the State of Missouri.

Mr. ROGERS was asked if he recalled ever having attended any study groups or discussion conferences such aswere alleged by Dr. INSLEY. He replied that he could not. He again asked if the interviewing agents could assist him by citing instances or times and when informed that it would be impossible for the agents to do so, he stated he could not recall; that he didn't want to say anything unless he was certain; that he was willing to cooperate, but he felt it would be better if he talked the matter over with his wife; that perhaps she would be able to bring to his recollection some meetings he might have had at the PICMAN home.

At approximately 4:45 P. M., January 12, 1949, Mr. ROGERS was still as indefinite and uncertain about his associations with PIGMAN as he was in the initial stages of the interview and it was deemed advisable to terminate the interview. It was then agreed by Mr. ROGERS and the agents to continue the interview the following day after he had had an opportunity to discuss the matter with his wife. Arrangements were made for Mr. ROGERS to call the Washington Field Office on the morning of January 13, 1949.

At 11:00 A. M. this date and after not having received a telephone call from Mr. ROGERS, the interviewing agents telephonically contacted Mr. ROGERS' office and were advised at that time that Mr. ROGERS had passed away in his sleep at 11:00 P. M. January 12, 1949. This information was furnished by Miss GRABENKAM, a secretary in the office formerly occupied by Mr. ROGERS.

The Washington Field Office subsequently ascertained from the Coroner's Office of Dr. FRANK BRASHART, Gäithersburg, Maryland, that Mr. JESSE S. ROGERS died of a heart attack, coronary occlusion, natural causes, on the evening of January 12, 1949. It was determined further that Mr. ROGERS' wife reported this fact to the Coroner's Office at 7:05 A. M., January 13, 1949.

Your attention is directed to Bureau teletype to all SACs dated January 10, 1949, in the above captioned matter.

Ań exhaustive investigation is being made in neighborhoods where ALGER HISS resided in Washington, D. C. to determine whether any of his former neighbors have any information indicating that HISS was associated at any time with WHITTAKER CHAMBERS. It should be observed that AIGER HISS alleges that he knew WHITTAKER CHAMBERS under the name of GEORGE CROSLEY. These neighbors are being interviewed to determine whether they can furnish information corroborating CHANBERS' allegation concerning HISS in this case. Photographs are being displayed to determine if they can recall having seen CHAMBERS in the neighborhood.

THOMAS SWANN resided at 1237 - 30th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. and was a neighbor of AIGER HISS who resided at 1245 - 30th Street. N. W. from July 1, 1936 through January 4, 1938.

Rebulet to Richmond dated August 5, 1947, regarding SWANN. A review of the indices of the Washington Field Office reflects that SWANN was an applicant for the Central Intelligence Group in August, 1947, and as of that time was residing at City Point Inn, Hopowell, Virginia.

You are requested to locate and interview Mr. SWANN for all information in his possession concerning this case.

SUBJECT: J. D. WhiTTHKER ChAMbers

For record purposes former Special Agent Louis J. Russell, now associated with the House Un-American Activities Committee, called on January 12 to advise that a story appeared concerning him in the Washington Daily News, that the news story stated that he was on leave of absence from the Bureau. Russell stated that this, of course, was not true and immediately after noting it, he wanted to call to state that he had not given out the information. I told him we understood this and appreciated his call. He then stated that also he had been instructed by Congressman Nixon to pass, the word on to me that he, Nixon, had heard that there was a Sumpli rumor being circulated that Nixon was after the Director and the Bureau. Nixon says that there is no truth to this, that he is on the side of the Bureau and the Director, and if we ever want proof we should ask him for it. I told Russell we appreciated his comments but that I also recall very distinctly Nixon calling me on the phone recently late at night, re-questing that I advise nobody but the Director about the call, and I also recall that a couple of weeks later Nixon issued a statement to the press wherein he had said that the FBI was cognizant of certain developments in the Hiss-Chambers case because he, Nixon, had personally told the FBI. I told Russell that he could tell Nixon for me that actions speak louder than words.

Russell further told me that there was a great deal of tugging from down there on who would make up the new committee and there was a very good possibility that former Agent Velde would for on the committee. You will recall that he was the findividual who asked to be heard by the committee to testify that he was head of the second-story squad.

It was noted therein that what business PRISCILLA HISS has had in the past concerning the policies of her father, under which she is a beneficiary and receives an annuity, has been conducted through the general agents of that company in Philadelphia. When PRISCIILA HISS had occasion to communicate directly with the company, she has done so in her own handwriting. There are at least two letters in the file from her in her handwriting. These handwriting specimens were not obtained as it does not appear at this time that the handwriting of PRISCILLA HISS is involved in instant case.
