Reference is made to my memorandum to you dated December 13, 1948, which set forth the results of the FBI Laboratory report concerning an examination of the documents produced by Whittaker Chambers in Baltimore, Maryland, on November 17, 1948. These documents were designated as Q-1 through Q-69.

The FBI Laboratory report reflected that the typewriting, which appeared on specimens Q-6 through Q-69 compared most closely to standards for Woodstock pica type spaced ten letters to the inch. The FBI Laboratory's files reflect that this style of type was made by the Woodstock Company in 1929.

During the course of a reinterview with Claudie Catlett, a former maid of Alger and Priscilla Hiss who worked intermittently from 1935 to 1939, she stated she recalls that Alger Hiss gave her family a typewriter which Hiss' attorneys now have in their possession and which may be the typewriter upon which the Chambers' documents were typed. Claudie Catlett streed she was unable to recall the information concerning this typewriter until she was interviewed by Hiss' attorneys recently, at which time an old typewriter was exhibited to her and she agreed that it looked like the typewriter which was given to her family by the Hisses.

Investigation which is currently being conducted has distioned that this typewriter has been in numerous hands among the colored eliment in Washington, D. C., and thus far the exact dates that it was in the possession of some of these persons has not been established.

The typewriter was recovered on April 16, 1940 from Ira 7. Lockey, Sr., colored, by Edward McLean, representing Alger this and a Washington colored attorney, Charles H. The HORTONS had been interviewed by Special Agent PAUL R. BIBLER and the writer, and previous interviews were reported in reports of the writer dated 1/28/49 and 2/24/49.

They were again interviewed on 3/14/49. ROBLET and LOLA FORTON stated they had visited long View Farm in Accokeek, Laryland on a few occasions and that they were slightly acquainted with LENGARE STRAUS and SALLY RINGE. The HORTON'S stated they had never known the HISSE.S. to visit the Farm, nor could they state whether ALGER and PRISCILLA HISSES were acquaintances of LENGRE STRAUS or SALLY RINGE. They could offer no additional information.

THE OWNLRSHIP OF 1934 FORD SEDAN, LOTOR NO. 18-1011772:

Report of Special Agent FRAME G. JOHNSTONE, at Baltimore, Maryland, dated 3/30/49, contained a lead for Albany to check the car registration on the above car for its ownership prior to August, 1937. This lead had been previously received by teletype from Baltimore on 2/23/49.

The records of the lotor Vehicle Bureau, State of New York, are not maintained prior to 1947, and consequently this item cannot be checked. This was reported by teletype from Albany to the Bureau, New York, and Philadelphia on 3/3/49.

MAAIM LIEBER:

Letter from New York to the Bureau dated 3/9/49, requested a check of the appropriate New York State records in an attempt to identify the full name of the girl "CHARLOTTE", who was employed by MAXIM LIEBER, 545 Fifth Avenue, New York City, as his Secretary in approximately 1935.

The records of the New York State Division of Placement and Unemployment Insurance are not maintained to cover the above period of time. They maintain available records for approximately two years.

A check of the Resident Income Tax Returns for the State of New York shows these returns are only maintained for approximately five years.

There are no other available sources of records in the State of New York presently maintained which would indicate the identity of "CHALLOTTE", employee of MAXIM LIEBER.

ABRAHAM GEORGE SILVERMAN:

MULLIN, an Attorney in the State Tower Building, Syracuse, New York, be interviewed inasmuch as MULLIN had been the Lieutenant Colonel who was the superior of ABRAHAL GEORGE SILVERMAN while SILVER-MAN was an employee of the Army Air Forces Material Command, Washington, D. C.

Inquiry in the State Tower Building, Syracuse, New York, reflected that MULLIN is presently an officer of the Cleveland Pheumatic Tool Company, Cleveland 5, Ohio, and that he maintains his home somewhere in Cleveland.

FELIX AUGUST INSLERIAN:

Mr. HENRY ERBEN, Vice President, General Electric Company, Schenectady, New York, has advised that INSLERLAN'S leave of absence expired 3/7/49, and no appropriate work had been found for him during that time.

Mrs. MILDRED HORNING, Argyle, New York, advised that INSLERMAN had secured a job at a Valve Company in Troy, New York.

Inquiry at personnel offices of Valve Companies ascertained that as of the first of April, 1949, INSLERMAN became an employee of the Rensselaer Valve Company, Green Island, New York. He is presently employed there as a Draftsman. This company has no Governmental contracts.

A review of the mail cover results since the submission of the last report has failed to disclose any information of value.

INSLERMAN continues to reside on his farm outside of Cambridge, New York.

The FBI Laboratory has examined the typewriting appearing in the prayer which was typed on the recovered machine by Bertha Mall, and the results of the examination are as follows:

The typewriting on the evidence. (prayer) was compared with the typewriting appearing on the Chambers' documents, Q-6 through Q-69, but a definite conclusion could not be reached due to the fact that the known typewriting encomes were not sufficiently comparable. All of the letters making up the prayer are in capital letters and do not contain the necessary defective letters which have been used in making provious identifications.

The FBI Laboratory also compared an additional specimen taken from the recovered typewriter which was submitted by Ira V. Lookey who it is known had possession of the typewriter from sometime in 1945 to January, 1949. This typewriting specimen was examined by the FBI Laboratory and it was concluded that the typewriting appearing thereon contained only a frewords and the letters making up the words are too limited in number to exhible the reaching of a definite conclusion. However, a few typewriting characteristics were noted in the known typewriting that are in common with letter characteristics appearing on the Chambers' documents, Q-6 through Q-69.

A report covering the investigation with receptot to the recovery of the typewriter is being prepared and it will be made available to you inmediately upon its completion.

Reference is made to Boston teletype to the Bureau dated April 22, 1949, which advised that Mrs. Lucy Elliott Davis, Hancock, New Hampshire, telephonically advised the Boston Office on April 21, 1949, that an attorney named Richard M. Field of Weston, Massachusetts, had called on her to obtain the register of the Bleak House at Peterborough, New Hampshire. This register had previously been examined by the FBI laboratory and the results of the examination were negative concerning the handwriting of Alger Hiss and Whittaker Chambers. Mrs. Davis advised that she furnished the register of the Bleak House to Mr. Field and notified the Boston Office since she had previously furnished the register to Bureau agents.

It is interesting to note that the defense attorneys requested to examine the guest register of the Bleak House since it may be reasonably assumed that they will claim in defense to Chambers' allegation concerning the trip by Chambers and Priscilla and Alger Hiss to Harry White's summer home in the summer of 1937, that Hiss did not accompany Chambers on that trip. If this assumption is true, then there would be no reason for Hiss's attorneys to examine the guest register of the Bleak House or any other hotels or tourist homes in New England in connection with this alleged trip.

The New York Office is instructed to bring this matter to the attention of Messrs. Donegan and Murphy who are preparing the government's case in New York City.

There follows the report of the FBI Laboratory on the examination of evidence which was received from the Security Investigative Division on March 29, 1949. This evidence is described as follows:

> Small piece of paper bearing typewriting beginning: 0167 "KARL - If you have given up playing around with ... ", signed "H", dated "3-4-38".

Specimen Q167 was a piece of white bond paper measuring 8" by 5.01" by .0030" and contained typewriting. The specimen contained no watermark and it was not possible to determine the age of Q167. The style of type employed to type Q167 corresponds most closely to the standards maintained in the Laboratory for Royal standard elite type spaced twelve letters to the inch. This style of type was placed on Royal machines after January 30, 1920.

It was concluded that the machine which typed Q167 was not. used to type Q5, Q6 through Q69.

Specimen Q167 is attached and is to be returned to the Security Investigative Division. Photographic copies are retained in the Laboratory.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the above information be brought to the attention of Mr. Lish Whitson of the Security Investigative Division and that the evidence Q167 be forwarded to him.

Reference is made to New York teletype dated April 13, 1949, advising that Special Assistant Attorney General THOMAS J. DONEGAN contemplates subpoending HENRY AHINE and his wife, JESSICA BUCK AHINE before the New York Special Grand Jury. Mr. DONEGAN had requested a background summary on each of them. This office was requested to supply the New York Division with all data indicating activities of these two individuals.

There is transmitted herewith to the New York Division a copy of a report by Special Agent ROBERT L: HEALD, dated at Washington, D. C., January 2, 1943, entitled HENRY RHINE, Internal Security - C. There is also enclosed for New York a copy of the report of Special Agent T. HAWTHORNE PHILLIPS, dated at Washington, D. C., August 5, 1943, entitled HENRY RHINE, wa., Custodial Detention - C.

Since 1943 the Philadelphia Division has been office of origin concerning HENRY RHINE.

With regards to JESSICA BUCK RHINE, aka., Mrs. HENRY RHINE, the files of this office reflect that she was the subject of an Internal Security -- Hatch Act investigation in 1941 and 1942. Inasmuch as an extra copy of the investigative report is not available for transmission to the New York Division, the following is a summary of her background:

JESSICA BUCK RHINE was born in Chicago, Illinois, and was graduated from the George Mason High School, Alexandria, Virginia, in 1931. Her legal residence was Brooklyn, New York. She was formerly employed as a Clerk by the Works Projects Administration, Washington, D. C., from November 23, 1933, until March 10, 1934; by the NRA as a Stenographer from March, 1934 until November, 1935; by the Railroad Retirement Board, Washington, D. C., from March 25, 1936, to October 1, 1936; by the National Reserve Project, WPA, from November, 1936 until April, 1937; by the Railroad Retirement Board as a Stenographer from October 3, 1937, until 1942, when she resigned. Her name was listed by the DIES Committee as a member of the Washington Committee for Democratic Action. Her name also appears on the active indices of the American Peace Mobilization. Several informants referred to Mrs. RHINE as being communistic in viewpoint, one informant noting that her

attitude since Russia was invaded in the last World War completely changed with her attitude prior to June 22, 1941. HELEN MILLER, a one time employee of the Department of Labor, who was dismissed from her position because of Communist activities, at one time lived with Mrs. RHINE and her family.

One informant declared that he had been asked to join the Communist Party by a sister of Mrs. RHINE, and further advised that HENRY RHINE was a Communist. Neighbors reported that the RHINE's apartment was often used as a meeting place for as many as forty people. The meetings were very mixed, many negroes being present.

One informant advised that Mrs. RHINE, prior to her marriage, had shared an apartment with ELEANOP MELSON. One informant advised that <u>HENRY RHINE's real name was AHINESTEIN</u>, and was alleged to be related to a Druggist in Buffalo, New York, who was or is a member of OGPU, or a Russian representative in America.

In 1943, Mrs. RHINE was employed as Assistant Research Director, United Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers of America of Denver, Colorado. While in Washington, Mrs. RHINE was constantly in contact with known members of the Communist Party.

A highly reliable confidential informant advised that HENRY RHINE may have used the party name of R. HARRISON, and was issued a 1943 Communist Party registration book, #37422. Since 1944, the subject has been residing in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The Philadelphia Division is requested to furnish either copies of investigative reports or pertinent information therefrom to the New York Division, indicating the activities, of HENRY RHINE and JESSICA BUCK RHINE, so that same can be transmitted to Special Attorney General THOMAS J. DONEGAN.

Reference is made to Bulet dated February 3, 1949, requesting investigation of ABRAHAM GEORGE SILVERMAN.

By letter on February 3, 1949, the Washington Field Office requested that the Philadelphia Office interview DONALD F. BLANKERTZ, who was associated with SILVERMAN during the latter's employment with the Analysis Reports Branch of the Army Air Force during the period 1942-1945. BLANKERTZ, an instructor at the University of Pennsylvania, was subsequently interviewed by the Philadelphia Office, and he recalled, among other things, that HELGA WOLSKI, now married to JACK DUDMAN, was employed in the same AAF office as SILVERMAN.

Washington Field Office files reflect that HELGA WOLSKI was a member of the Washington Bookshop Association during February, 1943. The C.P. indices of the Washington Field Office reflect that she was frequently in contact (1946) with RICHARD and ELIZABETH SASULY, subjects in the Silvermaster Case, and that she appeared to be a close friend of HELEN (Mrs. NATHAN GREGORY) SILVERMASTER. She invited both the SASULYs and HELEN SILVERMASTER to attend her wedding to JACK DUDMAN (March, 1946).

The Washington Field Office has attempted to locate and interview persons familiarly associated with SILVERMAN during the period he was employed by the Army Air Force. The WFO files indicate that HELGA WOLSKI DUDMAN-left Washington, D. C., during January, 1947, and moved to New York City where she and her husband rented an apartment at 56 West 70th Street. Apartment 4-A (Phone - Endicott 2-0215).

The New York Office will give consideration to a possible interview with HELGA WOLSKI DUDMAN for pertinent information concerning SILVERMAN, his activities and associations, during the period he was employed by the Army Air Force.

Reference is made to the Report of Special Agent JACK S. TURTON dated March 18, 1949 at Washington, D. C. and to the accompanying enclosures. One of the enclosures was a Physician's Certificate for sick leave taken by ALGER HISS in July, 1938 and signed by Dr. A. BARKLIE COULTER on July 30, 1938.

Dr. COULTER, Director of the Tuberculosis Service, District of Columbia Health Department, was interviewed in his office, Room 5150, Municipal Building, on April 22, 1949. Dr. COULTER stated he had seen ALGER HISS only twice to the best of his knowledge and this was in the period stated on the Certificate. He stated HISS came to see him in 1938 for a treatment or examination and Dr. COULTER thought it may have been because HISS had tubercular symptoms.

Dr. COULTER advised he was not able to recall who referred HISS to him and stated HISS'S Medical Record would not indicate this information. He further advised he does not know HISS socially and that he has never met Mrs. HISS or the two boys. Dr. COULTER advised he does not know any of HISSES acquaintances or associates.

Dr. COULTER stated that about four months ago he had received a letter from HISS asking him to make HISSES Medical Record available to the HISS Attorneys. Dr. COULTER stated HISS advised that the Attorneys' representative would contact him shortly to pick up the Medical Record but as yet no one has appeared. Dr. COULTER further advised that he knew of no reason why HISS would be interested in his Medical Record inasmuch as the record contained nothing that Dr. COULTER considers to be of any interest or importance in the present case.

Negative information pertaining to miscellaneous leads is as follows:

I. ROBLAT & LOLA HORTON, SUDLURY, VERMONT:

New York Teletype to Albany dated 3/11/49, requested the HORTONS be reinterviewed re their knowledge of ALGER or PRISCHLA, HISS visiting Long View Farm, Accokeek, Laryland, where LEAOLE STRAUS and SALLY RILUE resided.

This lead had also been forwarded to Albany on 3/10/49 by a letter from Boston to the Bureau, with copies for New York and Albany, which letter enclosed copies of misdirected teletypes to Boston, calling for the above interviews. The lead to interview the HOATONS re their acquaintanceship with ALGER and PAISCILLA MISS was also set out in the report of SA FRAME G. JOHNSTONE, at Baltimore, Maryland, dated 3/30/49. For reference purposes the HORTONS had been interviewed originally, and it was reported in the report of SA JOHN J. O'TOULE, JR., at Albany, N.Y., dated 1/28/49, and again in report of SA 0'TOOLE on 2/24/49. DEFERENCE PEGO

The following comments of the HORTONS, not previously reported are as follows:

ROBERT and LOLANDORTON were interviewed again on 3/14/49. The HORTONS stated they had visited Long View Farm at Accokeek, Maryland on a few occasions and that they were slightly acquainted with LENORE STRAUS and SALLY RINGE. The HORTONS stated they had never known the HISSES to visit the farm, nor could they state whether the HISSES were acquaintances of STRAUS or RIMGE. They offered no additional information.

Inasmuch as this was the third occasion that the HORTONS were interviewed, it is believed pertinent to remark that although they profess their sincere willingness to cooperate in instant investigation, they

are evasive, volunteer no information, and unless specifically questioned, on known points, offer nothing of value. They likewise express their belief in the complete innocence of ALGER and PRISCILLA HISS, and consequently, this may have a bearing upon their attitude.

II. THE OWNERSHIP OF 1934 FORD SEDAN, LOTOR NO. 18-1011772:

Report of SA FRANK G. JOHNSTONE, at Baltimore, Laryland, dated 3/30/49, contained a lead for Albany to attempt to check the car registration on that car, prior to August, 1937. This lead had been previously sent by Teletype on February 23, 1949.

The records of the Lotor Vehicle Bureau, State of New York, are not maintained prior to 1947, and consequently, this item could not be checked. This was reported on 3/3/49 by teletype from Albany to Bureau, New York and Philadelphia.

III. MAXIMLIEBER:

By letter dated 3/9/49 from New York to the Bureau and Albany a request was made to have Albany check appropriate State records and attempt to identify the full name of the girl, "CHARLOTTE", who was employed by MAXIM LIEBER, 545 Fifth Avenue, New York City, as his Secretary in approximately 1935.

The records of the New York State Division of Placement and Unemployment Insurance are not maintained for that period of time. Available records are only retained for approximately two years. Likewise, Resident Income Tax Returns for the State of New York are not maintained for a lengthy period of time, which would reach back to this date. They are customarily only retained for five years. There are no other known available sources in New York State where records would be maintained indicating the identity of "CHARLOTTE", as employed by LIEBER.

For possible assistance to the New York office in an attempt to identify "CHARLOTTE", reference is made to the report entitled, "Communist Infiltration of Yaddo, Saratoga Springs, New York, Internal Securityk", dated 3/31/49. The first lead in this report for the New York office suggests interviews of JALES T. FARRELL, EORACE GREGORY, and LARYA ZATURENSKA. Information in the report indicates all of these persons knew MAXIM LIBBER and it is believed they would advise the identity of LIEBLR'S girl, "CHARLOTTE", if same was known to them.

IV. ABRAHAM GEORGE SILVERMAN:

Letter dated 4/4/49, from Washington Field to the Bureau, with copies to New York and Albany, requested that SAMUEL S. MULLIN, an attorney in the State Tower Building, Syracuse, New York, home address 1364 South Salina Street, Syracuse, be interviewed. This letter states that MULLIN, who had been a Lieutenant Colonel, was the superior of ABRAHAMI GEORGE SILVERMAN while SILVERMAN was an employee of the Army Air Forces Material Command, Washington, D. C.

It was ascertained MULLIN is presently an officer of the Cleveland Pneumatic Tool Company, Cleveland, 5, Ohio.

The Cleveland office is thus requested to locate and interview LULLIN. Referenced letter states LULLIN had compiled the annual efficiency report for SILVERIAN for the period September, 1944 - March 31, 1945. SILVERIAN had been rated as excellent. SILVERIAN was employed as Chief Production Specialist, Analysis and Plans Branch or as Economist, Control Office, the Army Air Forces Laterial Command, from March 27, 1942 to August 18, 1945.

Reference letter also states SILVLE.IAN was mentioned by <u>ELIZABETH</u> TERRILL BENTLEY in recent HCUA Hearings as one of the persons who was supplying confidential information to unauthorized sources when he was employed by the Lar Department. SILVERMAN was also mentioned by

CHAMBERS concerning the same matter when he recently went before the HCUA. Reference letter requested MULLIN be interviewed regarding the activities of SILVERMAN during the period mentioned. Also that the associates of SILVERMAN, especially social and luncheon companions, be ascertained. It also requested MULLIN be asked if he ever suspected or knew of SILVERMAN'S supplying information of a confidential nature to unauthorized persons, and if he ever knew SILVERMAN to take confidential information from the office, and retain same over-night.

Inquiry should also be conducted to ascertain if SILVERMAN knew ALGER HISS or WHITTAKER CHAMBERS.

Mr. LESTER P. SCHOENE, attorney, 1625 - K Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., former General Counsel at the Railroad Retirement Board, upon interview advised that IRVING KAPIAN had formerly been in charge of a WPA project which was supervised by SILVERMAN during his tenure at the Railroad Retirement Board. SCHOENE pointed out that CHAMBERS was employed on this project as a writer but added that he did not know whether KAPLAN or SILVERMAN had been acquainted with CHAMBERS.

SCHOENE could offer no information as to who was instrumental in placing CHAMBERS in this position but recalled that DAVID WEINTRAUB was employed on the same project. He stated that probably either KAPLAN or WEINTRAUB would probably have had to place final approval on the appointment of CHAMBERS.

It may be noted that WEINTRAUB has been a close associate of SILVERMAN in the past.

The last known address of WEINTRAUB is Lake Success. New York, where he was employed as Director of the Division of Economic Stability and Development.

The New York Office is requested to interview WEINTRAUB along lines heretofore followed in this investigation.

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• CHASE, Circuit Judge:

The appellant was adjudged in contempt of court for refusing to obey an order of the court directing him to answer certain questions he had been asked when he appeared as a witness before a grand jury duly summoned and sitting in the Southern District of New York on March 2 and 3, 1949. He was sentenced to imprisonment for six months or until such time as he purged himself by answering the questions.

There were eleven questions which the appellant refused to answer after a hearing before the court had resulted in the order directing him to do so. His refusal to answer each question was for the claimed reason that his answers would tend to incriminate him and the order adjudging him in contempt is now attacked as erroneous in that it denied him the protection against self incrimination which the Fifth Amendment provides.

The questions which he refused, on the above ground, to answer are as follows:

"Q. * * * I show you Grand Jury Exhibit No. 103, which is a certificate of title of a motor vehicle issued by the Director of Vehicles & Traffic of the District of Columbia, for a Ford roadster, which certificate contains a purchase application for new certificate of title, bearing the name William Rosen, signature William Rosen, and an affidavit given before Notary Public Henry J. Gertler on July 23rd, 1936, and 1 ask you have you seen this document in any form, either the original or the copy, have you previously seen this document in any form either the original or the copy? * * * Prior to the time the committee or any representative of the Committee on Un-American Activities exhibited to you a copy of that document, had you ever seen the original or a copy of the document?

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Q. Mr. Rosen, Judge Rifkind instructed you in court on March 3rd that you were to answer the question that was asked you as to whether you desired to change your answer of 'No' to the question as to whether you knew Mr. Gertler, and that is what I am asking you, do you desire to change your answer of 'No' to the question as to whether you knew Mr. Gertler, as to whether you ever met or had any conversation with Mr. Gertler? * * * I again ask you the question as to whether you desire to change your answer before the grand jury on March 3rd when you said 'No' to the juror's question as to whether you had ever met or had any conversation with Mr. Gertler?

Q. Mr. Rosen, did you ever own a Ford roadster? That question was asked you on March 3rd in the grand jury room, and Judge Rifkind instructed you when you appeared before him to answer the question. What is your answer?

Q. Mr. Rosen. I am again asking you a question which you were asked in the grand jury on March 3rd, 1949, and which Judge Rifkind instructed you to answer: "Mr. Rosen did you ever own a Ford automobile?"

Q. I am now asking you a question which was asked you before the grand jury on March 3rd, 1949 and which Judge Rifkind instructed you to answer: 'Mr. Rosen, did you ever seek to obtain a certificate of title or to register a Ford automobile at any time?'

Q. Mr. Rosen, I am again asking you a question which was asked before the grand jury on March 3rd, 1949, and which Judge Rifkind on that same date instructed you to answer: 'Did you appear before a notary public, Henry J. Gertler, in Washington, D. C., on July 23rd, 1936?'

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Q. Mr. Rosen, I am again asking you a question which you were asked by a juror in the grand jury room on March 3rd, 1949 and which Judge Rifkind instructed you to answer on the same date when you appeared before him in court. Question by a juror: 'Well, if you were not in Washington, if it is true that you were not in Washington on that particular day, how could you possibly have had any connection with the signing of this document and, therefore, why can't you say that you did not sign that document or that you did not appear before Mr. Gertler?'

Q. Mr. Rosen, I am again asking you a question which you were asked before the grand jury on March 3rd, 1949 and which Judge Rifkind subsequently instructed you to answer: 'Did you ever purchase an automobile from any automobile dealer either in Washington or New York other than the Cherner Motor Company?'

Q. The next question was, 'I correct my question: What model of Ford car did you drive?'

Q. I am asking you a question, Mr. Rosen, which you were previously asked before the grand jury on March 3rd, 1949, and which question Judge Rifkind on that same date instructed you to answer: 'Mr. Rosen, were you ever on the premises of the Cherner Motor Company, 1781 Florida Avenue, N. Y., Washington, D. C.?'

Q. Did you ever purchase an automobile in Washington, D. C.?"

As they do not on their face appear to call for answers which would tend to incriminate the appellant, it was incumbent upon him to justify his refusal to answer on the ground claimed by making it appear that his assertion that they would was based upon substantial reason so to be-

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lieve and was not made merely to protect some other person or persons. Counselman v. Hitchcock, 142 U. S. 547; Broun v. Walker, 161 U. S. 591; Mason v. United States, 244 U. S. 362; United States v. Zwillman, 2 Cir., 108 F. 2d. 802; United States v. Weisman, 2 Cir., 111 F. 2d. 260; United States v. Cusson, 2 Cir., 132 F. 2d. 413.

In an effort to do that he introduced evidence at his hearing from which it appears that he had reasonable cause to believe that the "setting" in which he was asked the above questions was substantially as follows.

At a series of hearings in the summer of 1948 before a standing committee of the House of Representatives, and of sub-committees, a witness, Whittaker Chambers, had testified that both in 1935 and 1936, as well as for a period before and after those years, he had been acting as an agent of the so-called "underground" of the Communist Party which was engaged in behalf of Russia in espionage activities in this country. Later Chambers also had testified that he had received confidential information from public servants of the United States in Washington while he was an agent of the Communist "underground," which was the secret espionage branch of the Communist Party, and that some of this information was contained in confidential documents of the State Department which were delivered to him by Alger Hiss, an employee of that department, to be photostated or microfilmed. He had also testified that he had returned the originals to Hiss shortly after he had received them but after he had had them photostated or microfilmed. He had also testified that Hiss was a dues paying member of the Communist Party with whom he was well acquainted and with whom he had discussed at length the principles of Communism especially in its relation to this government. The import of his testimony was that Hiss had been a disloyal employee of the State Department engaged in espionage against his own

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country for the benefit of Soviet Russia and was so acting in furtherance of a conspiracy to overthrow this government by force and violence in which the members of the **underground** of the Communist Party in America were his co-conspirators.

Hiss, who was privately employed in New York when Chambers so testified, learned he had been so accused and denied emphatically any connection with such activities or with Chambers. He requested that he be permitted to appear before the committee to enable him to refute the charges without delay, and his request was granted. He testified positively that he was entirely innocent; that he did not know Chambers; and that he was unable to recognize a picture of Chambers which was shown to him as that of anyone he knew under any other name. He expressed disappointment that Chambers was not present so that he could see him and asked for that opportunity. Hiss subsequently appeared several times before the committee and its sub-committee and for a time was unable to suggest anyone he might have known who could have been Chambers under some other name. Chambers not only continued to maintain, after Hiss's denials, that he had testified truthfully but amplified his testimony as to his acquaintance and activities with Hiss. After hearings had been held on several days, Hiss stated that it had but recently occurred to him that Chambers might be a freelance writer who had visited him, when Hiss was attorney for the Nye Committee that was investigating the munitions industry, to get materials for articles he intended to write and hoped to sell to magazines. He described his recollection of him, said he had in 1935 sub-let his apartment to him and at first said he had then sold Crosley an old Ford Model A roadster which he had purchased shortly before he was married and which accordingly had a sentimental value but was otherwise of no particular use to him

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as he had a new car. He explained that the roadster had been turned over to Crosley as an incident of the subleasing of the apartment and that Crosley was to pay him only the same rent, while he occupied the apartment with his family, as would be payable under the lease by Hiss to his lessor. At a subsequent meeting of a sub-committee in New York Chambers and Hiss were both present. At first Hiss could not recognize Chambers but after he had looked at his teeth and had heard him answer some questions, Hiss did identify Chambers positively as the man he had known as Crosley. He persisted, however, in his denial that he was, or ever had been, a member of the Communist Party or that he had furnished any confidential State Department information to the man he had known as Crosley.

Chambers firmly maintained that he had never been known as George Crosley and that he had testified truthfully concerning his relations with Hiss and denied that he had ever sub-let an apartment from Hiss or bought a car from him or had received any car from him.

It had now become quite clear that either Hiss or Chambers was guilty of perjury. Chambers had testified at considerable length concerning espionage by a group of men, in which he placed Hiss, who he said were members of the Communist "underground" and formed what was called an "apparatus" for subversive operations. His credibility as well as that of Hiss was a material matter for the Committee to pass upon in making its finding of facts relating to the investigation it was conducting. And so the truth as to what Hiss had done with the car he said he had turned over to Chambers, whom he said he had known as Crosley, was investigated.

It turned out that the title to this particular roadster, as shown by the public records of the District of Columbia, had been transferred by Hiss on July 23, 1936, which was

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a year or more after the time when Hiss had testified that he had turned over the car to Chambers in connection with the sub-letting of the apartment. On that day, Hiss had signed a certificate of title, and acknowledged his signature before a notary public in Washington, transferring the title to the Cherner Motor Company of Washington, D. C. On the same day, so the record showed, the title had been transferred to one William Rosen whose Washington address was given. The application for that title was signed William Rosen and at Washington acknowledged by him before Henry J. Gertler, Notary Public.

If this were all there would be no sufficient showing of danger to Wilham Rosen, but additional circumstances require a contrary conclusion. It was shown that the Cherner Motor Co. was a dealer in new and second hand cars which customarily kept a record of all cars which passed through its hands. Although its records for that day and for a reasonable time before and after it were examined and found to show no inherent evidence of any abstraction, the company had no record concerning this car.

Moreover, Chambers had not only testified that Hiss had not turned the car over to him in 1935 but when asked what Hiss did with the car had testified as follows:

"The Communist Party had in Washington a service station—that is, the man in charge or owner of this station was a Communist—or it may have been a car lot.

Mr. Nixon: But the owner was a Communist?

Mr. Chambers: The owner was a Communist. 1 never knew who this was or where it was. It was against all the rules of underground organization for Hiss to do anything with his old car but trade it in, and 1 think this investigation has proved how right the Communists are in such matters, but Hiss insisted

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that he wanted that car turned over to the open party so it could be of use to some poor organizer in the West or somewhere.

Much against my better judgment and much against Peters' better judgment, he finally got us to permit him to do this thing. Peters knew where this lot was and he either took Hiss there, or he gave Hiss the address and Hiss went there, and to the best of my recollection of his description of that happening, he left the car there and simply went away and the man in charge of the station took care of the rest of it for him. I should think the records of that transfer would be traceable."

This appellant was then summoned to appear before the Committee and did so with his attorney on two occasions. At his first appearance, he refused on the ground of selfincrimination to answer any questions about this car or concerning the transfer of the title to this car. He also declined to answer some questions about automobiles he had owned and as to whether he had been in Washington in 1935.

His wife was then summoned to appear before the Committee and, though she refused to answer questions concerning this car, she did testify that her husband had never owned a Ford automobile and that he had not been in Washington in 1935.

Upon the appellant's second appearance before the Committee he again refused to answer any questions about this car but did testify somewhat more extensively than at first and, among other things, that he had not been in Washington in 1935. It was shown that the address given as that of William Rosen in Washington on the application

Peters was identified by Chambers as his superior and the man then at the head or the Commune (conduct) and a the United States.

for the certificate was not then that of the appellant and that it never had been his address.

Following these occurrences Alger Hiss testified before a special federal grand jury which was convened on June 16, 1947 in the Southern District of New York to investigate possible violations of the espionage laws of the United States and any other federal criminal statutes. Among other questions he was asked the following to which he gave the following answers.

"Q. Mr. Hiss you have probably been asked this question before, but I'd like to ask the question again. At any time did you, or Mrs. Hiss in your presence, turn any documents of the State Department or of any other Government organization, or copies of any other Government organization, over to Whittaker Chambers? A. Never. Excepting, I assume, the title certificate to the Ford.

Q. In order to clarify it, would that be the only exception? A. The only exception.

Juror: To nobody else did you turn over any documents, to any other person?

The Witness: And to no other unauthorized person. I certainly would have to other officials.

Q. Now, Mr. Hiss, Mr. Chambers says that he obtained typewritten copies of official State documents from you. A. 1 know he has.

Q. Did you ever see Mr. Chambers after you entered into the State Department? A. I do not believe I did. I cannot swear that I did not see him some time, say in the fall of '36. And I entered the State Department September 1, 1936.

Q. Nov, you say possibly in the fall of '36. A. That would be possible.

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Q. Can you say definitely with reference to the winter of '36. 1 mean, say, December '36? A. Yes 1 think 1 can say definitely 1 did not see him.

Q. Can you say definitely that you did not see him after January 1, 1937? A. Yes, I think I can definitely say that.

Mr. Whearty: Understanding, of course, exclusive of House hearings and exclusive of the Grand Jury. The Witness: Oh, yes."

As a result of this testimony, conflicting with that of Chambers, he was indicted for perjury. What had transpired as above outlined was known to the appellant when he refused to answer these questions when he appeared as a witness before the grand jury. He then knew that evidence had been produced which tended to show that in and after 1935 Hiss had been guilty of substantive federal crimes including among them violations of the laws relating to espionage and had been conspiring with others to violate such laws. He knew that the disposition by Hiss of this Ford car which he had used while engaged in such unlawful activities had become a matter material to the investigation being conducted by the grand jury. He knew that a certificate of title to that car had been recorded in Washington which purported to show that the title had been transferred to him upon his signed application for it and that his signature appeared to have been acknowledged by him before a notary public in Washington. He also knew that the Cherner Motor Company which appeared on the certificate as the transferor of the title to him had no record of this car although in the ordinary course of its business it did keep records of each car passing through its hands, and that it had been alleged that the car was to be transferred indirectly to the Communist party. He knew, therefore, that there were peculiar and

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unusual circumstances regarding his purported connection
with the car and that the grand jury was seeking evidence
to show just what they were and what they signified.

His relation to the activities of the other witnesses was one of those circumstances. Granted that the statute of limitations had already run on any substantive crime he may have committed in 1936 when the title to this car was of record transferred to him, he is nevertheless not immune from possible prosecution. The evidence which tends to show that Hiss was guilty of criminal conspiracy may also show, or be supplemented to show, that such conspiracy has continued to exist and to be carried out ever since or at least to a date not now affected by any statute of limitations. Such evidence may show that the appellant was, and perhaps is, a co-conspirator in that or related conspiracies for which he may be prosecuted.

While the case against Hiss involved charges which he has flatly denied and which have not yet been tried, the questions asked Rosen appear to involve him in these charges. Under these circumstances Rosen was justified in believing that he was in a precarious situation and in view of the authorities above cited he had the right to refuse to answer questions which might connect him with the Ford car, or might lead to the discovery of evidence connecting him with it, or otherwise link him up with any alleged conspiracy.

We have made no attempt to distinguish between the questions in the group. They obviously were all asked to elicit information concerning the appellant's connection, if any, with the disposition made of the Ford car and that was the only apparent basis of their materiality.

Order reversed.

Apartment #403, as reported in referenced letter. SPRATT stated that his wife ARLENE, deceased, had a financial interest in the apartment but that he was unable to recall the name of the real estate firm which had the controlling interest. He stated that this real estate firm had an office on 15th Street, N. W., near K Street, Washington, D. C. This firm handled all of the rentals and repair work for the apartment. Col. SPRATT suggested that a former janitor, a negro approximately 60 years old, first name unknown, last name STOCKLEY, be interviewed. He stated that STOCKLEY resided on the premises for several years prior to 1936, was conversant with many of the occupants, and would possibly recall SILVERMAN.

The above information was set forth by teletype to the Washington Field Office, requesting that STOCKLEY be interviewed, on March 29, 1949.

It should be noted that in the event it is necessary in the future to interview Colonel SPRATT, he can be located at the Hargrave Military Academy near Chatham, Virginia, at which Academy he is employed and also resides.

By letter dated March 15, 1949 to the Bureau, from the Washington Field Office, with copy to the Richmond Office, it was stated that DONALD R. RICHBERG, 815 - 15th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., was associated with the National Recovery Administration during the employment of SILVERMAN, from September 13, 1933 to July 12, 1934. SILVERMAN was reportedly employed by the National Recovery Administration in the Labor Advisory Board.

RICHBERG was interviewed at his residence on the grounds of the Farmington Country Club, Charlottesville, Virginia, on March 22, 1949. RICHBERG related that he did not recall SILVERMAN either by name or reputation. RICHBERG explained that he was former Chief Counsel for the National Recovery Administration and, as such, was engaged primarily in administrative procedures and formulation of policy, and thus had little personal contact with the various employees of the National Recovery Administration. RICHBERG stated that ELACKWELL SMITH, former Assistant General Counsel, National Recovery Administration, had extensive contact with employees and in many instances handled personnel matters. RICHBERG was unable to relate the address of SMITH but stated that the same could be secured from former Congressman JOSEPH E. CASEY, 1025 Connecticut Avenue, Washington, D. C.

The above information was set forth by teletype to the Bureau and the Washington Field Office, dated March 23, 1949, in which a request was made that CASEY be interviewed for the determination of the address of BLACKWELL SMITH.

By letter dated May 16, 1949, the Washington Field Division transmitted for examination a known specimen of typewriting obtained from one BERTHA HALL. It was requested that the known sample, which has been identified in the Laboratory as specimen K737, be compared with specimens Q6 through Q69 of the instant case.

It was not possible to reach a definite <u>conclusion</u> with regard to the comparison of specimen K737 with the questioned typewriting on specimens Q6 through Q69. It is pointed out that the known specimen of typewriting is limited to six lines of text and is in all "caps". Further, it was prepared a number of years subsequent to the preparation of specimens Q6 through Q69. However, <u>there are several similar characteristics appearing in both the</u> questioned and known specimens which, although insufficient for a definite conclusion, indicate the probability that the same typewriter was used.

RESULTS OF EXAMINATION:

An examination has been made of the paper making up 16 through Q69 and the results are set forth below. Physical measurements show that W6 through Q21, Q27 through Q29, Q31, Q38 through Q69 have the same approximate size and are thin white sheets of paper which contain no watermarks. Specimens Q23 through Q26, Q30, Q32 through Q57 have the same approximate measurements and are thin white sheets of paper and contain no watermarks but are of a different size than the above mentioned specimens. Specimen Q22 is a sheet of bond paper having no watermark and the size is different than either of the above two groups. The paper fiber analysis requested in your wire of Nay 18, 1949 was not made on specimens 66 through 69 because it would require cutting out pieces of paper from each document which would materially change the appearance of the original documents. A fiber analysis would require approximately five days to complete and the maximum results obtainable would be to state that possibly the thin white sheets could have come from one batch of paper or that the papers are from different batches of paper. The thin white paper making up specimens up through 421 and 423 through 469 has wide commercial distribution. In view of the amount of work involved in such an examination together with the limited results that might be obtained it is requested that the Laboratory be advised if a fiber examination is necessary.

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I thought that you would be interested in knowing that this Bureau has received information that charles Fdward Sysanski, United States flatrict Judge, Hoston, Sussachusetts, has agreed to take the stand as a character bitness in New York City on bubalf of Alger Hiss. He is alleged to have concented that his taking hisself available as a mitness would be reparded as unusual by many, particularly since he was to be a witness for the fefence in a criminal case. However, he felt he knew alger Hiss so well that there was no choice open to him.

You will recall that Judge Hyzanski has exhibited an unfriendly attitude toward this Furgau in the past. The unfriendly actions were called to your attention by my memorandar dated Jone 23, 1947, September 3, 1947 and March 27, 1948. In your memorandum dated June 26, 1947, you expressed a desire to be informed of my information received concerning Judge Symanski.

For your assistance a survey of the information contained in my provious memoranda pertaining to Judge Sysanski is hereinalter set forth. There is also included a brief sketch of his background obtained forting the course of this Sursau's investigation of Judge Sysanski before as becaus Judge.

charles Idward ; yzanski was born on May 27, 1906; at Foston, Lassachusetts. He attended Brookline High "chool, Brookline, Massachusetts, from potenbor 1918 until June 1928. He ottended hillips 'xeter ladery, Factor, New Hampshire, from Septembor 1922 to June 1923. He enterod Harvard college in September 1923 and gracuated Magna dum Faude in Jac 1927. Lyzanski entered Harvard Jaw (chool in September 1927, and graduated eighth in his class of 393, sagna cur Laude during June 1930.

After his graduation from Hervard Law School he was apployed as a law clerk in the firm of Poper, Gray, Coat, Coalidge and Mully 50 Federal "treat, Hoston, Massachusetts, off and on during the period of September 1931 to April 1933. Ge was Law Secretary to United States Circuit Court Judge, Second Circuit, August M. Hand from October 1930 to August 1931. He was also employed as Law Secretary to United States Circuit Court Judge Learned Hand, Second Circuit, in October 1932.

He left the apploy of the aforesentioned law firm in Poston when on May 23, 1933, he was appointed Solicitor for the Labor Department in Lashington, D. C. He held this position until November 25, 1935, when he transferred to the Department of Justice as Special Assistant to the Attorney General. He resigned this position on approximately August 1, 1937, and returned to private practice in Roston where he became a member of the aforementioned law firm. He is alleged to have subsequently left this firm when he became a member of the National Defense Mediation Hoard in approximately July 1941. However, a personal history statement referred to this Bureau by the Department in October 1941, reflects that Myzanski resided at 4 Northington Road, Brookline, Massachusetts, and had been a partner in the law firm of Popes, Gray, Boyden and Perkins since 1938.

Ayzanski was considered a brilliant student et Marvard Law School and he possessed an outstanding legal mind. Frofessor Felix Frankfurter is reported to have characterized him as one of the most brilliant law students he ever had.

Circuit Court Judge Augustus N. Hand advised that Ayzanski argued cases before the United States Supreme Court for the Government in which the constitutionality of the segner Act and the "ocial Security Act were involved. Both of these Acts were declared Constitutional and Judge Hand advised that subsequently Hyzanski was highly recommended to him by Justices Yan Tevanter, Trandeis, Stone and Cardozo for his excellent presentation and arguments on these cases.

On April 11, 12, 1944, the case of "Anthony John Gallo, et al, Theft from Interstate Shipment" was heard before Judge Symanski. In that case the Special Agents had invited the defendants to the Poston office of this Bareau for quostioning and subsequently obtained signed statements.

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Judge Wyzanski ruled that these statements were inadmissible inasmuch us the defendants did not know that they could refuse the "invitation", and that the Ments did not advise than of this right. Judge Syzanski stated that these distances ware inadmissible under the decision of the Supress Court in the FoNebb Case indicating at the same time that he had discussed the SoNebb decision with three Judges of the Supress Court. Judge Syzanski indicated to the Jary that the officers of the Federal Hureau of Invistigation had violated the law in taking the alleged confessions and that Grand Judges would someday take it upon thenselves to indict officers who had taken evidence illegally. However, he stated that in this instance he did not suggest that these particular officers should be indicted but that the confessions in question were obtained illegally and should be disregarded. (62-75474-2)

The "Roston Herald" for June 3, 1947, on page 5 carried a news story in which the first two paragraphs read as follows:

"Unless a group is found criminal or treasonable, it should be allowed freedom of association, Judge F. Syzanski, Jr., of the Federal Court, contended yesterday in defending the decision of Harvard University to presit within the college a branch of the 'scricza Youth for Femocracy.

"Speaking at the annual exercises of the Harvard Chapter of the Fhi Weta Kappa fociety, the jurist maintained, with respect to the organization which has been termed a member of the formunist Front, "You cannot be certain whether groups termed subversive are termed so in error or in truth."

A confidential source advised that on Vebruary 3, 1947, Judge Syzanski was contacted by Isador indur in order to secure the Judge's assistance in perfecting arrangements whereby Gregori Shayn, a Russian astronomer, would receive honorary membership in the American Academy of Arts and Colences at a dinner held on March 12, 1947, at Boston. Fean John Bunker of MIT had full that it was perhaps unwise to invite a Fursian into membership at this particular time. Judge yzanski permitted Amdur to quote him to the effect that because the organization was composed of scientists and did not have political significance that Sunker was specious. The Judge insisted that Thayn be invited. It may be noted that the membership of Amdur in the Communist Party had been established.

A confidential source advised on November 13, 1946, that Judge Symmaki counseled Fr. Harlow Shapley not to bring records with him in answer to a subposed instructing Shapley to do so, issued by the United States House Constitute on Un-American Activities. Judge Symmaki Author instructed that Chapley should compose a statement which he would read to the Congressional Committee. He Author advised that if Shapley were not permitted counsel during the Committee's hearing, he should not respond to any question until permission was granted to him to leave the constitues room in order to consult with counsel. Judge Symanski asserted that each time Shapley so left the room he should spend at least twenty minutes with downsel in the Congressional corridors. In this fashion the Constitute could not possibly ask Shapley more than three questions an hour and thus would soon tire of the interrogation.

Mr. Nease Mise Gandy A confidential source furnished the Boston office of this Pursau with the January 30, 1946 issue of "PAC-F T." This item was the official organ of the Exseachusette citizens Political Action Committee. The issue cited that Mrs. Charles T. Wymanski was a sponsor of the MCPAC. Confidential informants of the Poston office of this Tureau at that Mine were advising that the organization was subject to a heavy Communist infiltration in its lendership. It has alnos merged with ICCASP to become the Massachusette chapter of the Progressive Citizens of America.

A confidential informant advised on May 9, 1947, that Mrs. Mysanski was requested by Alice Andur, believed to be the wife of Isadoro Andur, to speak before a group on Palestine problems and the United Nations. The group was not identified but it was known at that time that Mrs. Andur had been very active in the Cambridge League of Homen Voters, and Mrs. Andur's membership in the Communist Party had been established. Mrs. Myzanski accepted the invitation for 3:00 PM on June 4, 1947.

The "Committee of One Thousand" was officially formed on January 19, 1948, under guidance of Fr. Harlow Shapley of Barvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts, and Hannah Forner, former Executive Vice Chairman of the Progressive Citizens of America in New York City. The express purpose of this organization was to accomplish the abolishment of the House of Pepresentatives Committee on Dn-Imerican Schwitzles. A confidential source advised that Fr. Shapley consulted with Judge Mysanski in Boston regarding the formation of this group. It appears that

Judge Uyzanski advised Dr. Shapley to continue to fight for the abolition of the House of Representatives Committee on Un-American Activities. He also advised Dr. Shapley that the fight should be continued with the idea in mind that if an effective demand for abolition were made, then certain regulations would be imposed on the committee.

A confidential source advised that on March 16, 1948, a meeting of the B ston Cambridge Chapter of the American Association of Scientific Workers and the Cambridge Association of Scientists, a local division of the Federation of American Scientists was held at the Littaeu Center, Harvard University. Isadcre Andur was one of the speakers at this meeting. Amdur stated that the American Academy of Arts and Sciences was initiating a committee to investigate the alloged violations of civil liberties similar to the Dr. Edward U. Condon case which resulted from the Loyalty Program. In order to obtain a specimen case for examination which would not touch on a Government employee, the committee of the AAAS had attempted to secure the House Committee file on Harlow Shapley. Unsuccessful in a direct approach, the committee nombers had contacted Federal Judge Charles Uyzanski of Boston, who is an AAAS member. Andur stated that Judge Uyzanski had successfully, through unnamed Uashington contacts, obtained a transcript of the House Committee record on Shapley on file in Uashington. (62-58854-239)

A confidential informant, considered roliable, advised this Eureau in 1943 that he had been introduced to one illiam Vard Pignan about 1936, at which time Pignan was employed by the Bureau of Standards. At the time of this introduction, the confidential informant alleges that he was a courier for the Communist Party underground apparatus, and that it was his understanding that "illiam Ward Pigman and his brother, George Pigman, were connected with an underground apparatus at this time. He stated that about 1936 ' ard Pigman began furnishing him documentary material from the Furdau of Standards. He continued to furnish material once a week until about April 1938.

The Tilliam Ward Pigman, referred to above, was bern March 5, 1910, at Chicago, Illinois. He was employed by the National Bureau of Standards from 1930 to 1938, when he resigned to accept a scholarship in Germany. He was reinstated at the Bureau of Standards in 1939 and resigned in 1944. In November 1948 he was employed as a Research Chemist at the American Foper Institute, Appleton, Misconsin, having been so employed for two years.

Lilliam hard Pignan was interviewed by representatives of this Sureau, at which time he denied being a Communist, and denied furnishing information of a confidential nature to anyone while he was employed by the Eureau of Standards. The associates of Pignan interviewed have been unable to furnish any information of Communist Farty underground activity on the part of Pignan.

Gentlemen:

Dr. W. Ward Pigman, now of the Institute of Paper Chemistry at Appleton, Wisconsin, has applied to this Institute for a position in biochemistry to study fundamental chemical mechanisms involved in the development of cancer.

Dr. Pigman volunteered the information that he was named by the House Committee on Un-American Activities in December, 1948, and that he was questioned by the grand jury in New York City during the same month. He states that he is anxious that we satisfy ourselves fully on his loyalty before considering employing him.

Although, in general, there is little likelihood that the members of our staff would have any opportunity to engage in disloyal acts affecting the security of the country, we would not wish to be known as a haven for such persons and, indeed, to have such individuals on the staff might jeopardize the public support which we need so badly.

Furthermore, the Institute is presently being considered for a contract with the Atomic Energy Commission. This contract would not involve access to restricted information but it is possible and we hope that it may work out, that the facilities of the Institute will be useful to the Atomic Energy Commission for any type of work in the event of a national emergency. With this in mind there is further reason for our sincere wish to exercise extreme care in the selection and appointment of personnel.

If you can give us any assistance with regard to our decision on Dr. Pigman, we shall be most grateful. Such information would, of course, be held in confidence if it is the wish of the department to do so.

If it would be preferable that this matter be discussed personally, we shall be pleased to receive your representative or to call at the offices of the Bureau either in Detroit or in Washington.

Rerep, dated April 6, 1949 entitled JAY DAVID WHITTAKER CHAMBERS, WAS, ET AL; INTERNAL SECURITY - R, ESPIONAGE - R, PERJURY.

A lead was set out in this report at Aberdeen, Maryland to further review the 201 file for any recently executed affidávits regarding advocating the overthrow of the Government by force or violence. The only recently executed form in the file was dated, November 15, 1948. A photographic copy of this form is being submitted herewith to the Bureau and the New York Division.

It is to be noted Item 2 on this form deals with nicknames and aliases, and RENO indicated he had none. Item 33 deals with employment and RENO does not show the Communist Party as an employer. Item 32 should reflect organizations to which RENO belonged but the CP is not listed. Item 55 should reflect any data unfavorable to employee, and RENO does not include in this section his membership in the CP.

HARRY MENCKE, Intelligence Officer at the Aberdeen Proving Ground, on May 10, 1949 furnished SA JESSE F. FARR with a photostatic copy of a personal history statement for RENO, dated November 26, 1943. This copy is being forwarded to the New York Office herewith.

No other forms except the two mentioned in this letter, and those previously mentioned, as reviewed by the Washington Field Office, were observed in either the intelligence file at the Aberdeen Proving Ground or RENO'S 201 file.

Copies of this letter are being submitted to the Denver and El Paso Offices inasmuch as RENO apparently is spending his time either at Albuquerque, New Mexico or Denver, Colorado.

At 5:40 P.M. April 20, 1949, <u>Lr. R. L. Bannerman</u>, Assistant Chief, Security Office, CIA, telephonically contacted Supervisor DeLoach and advised that he had in his possession the original and one thin white of FBI communication to Assistant Attorney General Alexander <u>M. Campbell</u>, relating to the captioned matter. Bannerman explained the communication had apparently been lost, however, he was of the opinion the contents were highly classified and should be brought to the attention of the Bureau.

Mr. Bannerman further stated that the document in question was found at 7:15 A.M. April 20, 1949, near Gate No. 4, between Wings 1 and 2 at the rear of Temporary "J" Building by one Mrs. Pauline A. Phillips, an employee of the Veterans Administration who has offices in the lower end of Temporary "J" Building. Mrs. Phillips reportedly turned the document in question over to a business associate, Mr. D. H. Rhodes. Mr. Rhodes then contacted the CIA Receptionist in Temporary "L" Building and turned this document over to her. Hiss Marguerite Ray, the Receptionist in question, forwarded the document to Mr. Bannerman's Office at CIA at 9:15 A.M. the same day. Bannerman explained he did not call this matter 😋 to the Bureau's attention sooner because of being out of his office all morning and afternoon up until 5:15 P.M. With reference again to the location where the document was found, you will recall that Temporary ". " Building, parallel to the Reflecting Pool located in front of the Lincoln Memorial, quarters "J", "K", and "I" are assigned to the V.A., War Assets, and CIA. The document was found, as mentioned above, between Wings 1 and 2 near the proximity of the Veterans Administration offices which border the busy 17th Street thoroughfare. The entire temporary quarters are enclosed by a high wire fence.

According to Bannerman, Mrs. Phillips, Mr. Rhodes, Miss Ray and himself are the only individuals who have reviewed the document. All of the above facts were immediately called to your attention. At your instructions, the document was immediately obtained from Mr. Bannerman at 6:15 P.M. immediately following this call.

As previously explained by Banherman, referenced document consisted of two thin white copies of the first page of a memorandum from the Bureau to Mr. Alexander M. Campbell, Assistant Attorney General, dated April 19, 1949, entitled "Jay David Whittaker Chambers, was., etal, Perjury, Espionage - R, Internal Security - R". This was the first page of a three page memorandum. It contained in substance information furnished by Chambers concerning the procedure of the Defense Attorneys for Alger Hiss. Only a portion of the defense was contained on page one. The recovered two thin white copies are attached hereto.

Supervisor Floyd L. Jones handling the Chambers case has advised that the memorandum was typed on April 15, 1949, by stenographer Mrs. Josephine Arruda of the Espionage Section. The memorandum under that date contained typographical errors on page two, which was returned to the Stenographic Pool for correction and the memorandum was then redated April 19. The memorandum was again returned for correction because of a missgelling of the word "explained" which had two d's in it. This word was in the first paragraph, line four of page one. The memorandum was returned for this correction at approximately 1:30 P.M. on April 19; therefore, one of the d's in the word "explained" was changed to an e. The yellow of the memorandum was initialed by the Supervisor who dictated it with the instructions that it should be sent in to the Section ^Chief after the word ^Rexplained" had been corrected. It should be noted that the second typing was done by Ethel M. Dillon, a typist.

At approximately 4:00 P.M. on the afternoon of Aoril 20, Miss Martha Dunaway, a typist in the Espionage Section, returned the memorandum to Supervisor Floyd Jones with an entire new first page having been typed. At this time it was redated April 21. Miss Dunaway explained that the reason she typed a new first page was that the girl who was making the correction on the first page had made numerous errors and she said something to the effect that it was necessary for her to retype the whole page. The yellow copy was initialed through the Espionage Section and therefore the memorandum was sent to Mr. Ladd's Office.

It is noted that the copies of the first page which were found had the last five lines missing from the final paragraph on the page which would indicate that whoever typed it had removed the paper from her typewriter and started a new page.

A check has been made in the Stenographic Pool in the Espionage Section and it was found that the room contains eight wastebaskets, two of which are confidential baskets with the white rim around the top which should be used for the disposal of confidential material. As you know, the material from the confidential baskets is burned here in the building, thereas the material from the other baskets is carried out of the building by the Trash Collector. It is possible, therefore, that the unfinished copies of this page could have blown off the Trash Collector's receptacle if ne were in the vicinity of the place where it was found.

Memorandum

The attached document classified confidential, addressed to Alexander M. Campbell, Asst. Atty. General, dated 19 April 1949 (carbon copy in duplicate), was turned over to our receptionist in "L" Building, at my suggestion, by a Mr. D. H. Rhodes, at 8:50 a.m., this date. I received the document from Miss Marguerite Ray, receptionist, "L" Building, at 9:15 a.m., this date.

I interviewed Mr. D. H. Rhodes at 9:35 a.m., this date. He is an administrative employee of the Veterans' Administration, with offices in Room 1006, Temporary "J" Building; V.A. phone extension 5598. According to Rhodes, the document was found at about 7:15 a.m., today, near gate #4, between wings 1 & 2, at the rear of Tempo "J" Building, by Mrs. Pauline A. Phillips, an employee in his office, who immediately gave the paper to him. After the paper was found, Mrs. Phillips and Mr. Rhodes were the only persons having an opportunity to read it.

Mr. Rhodes stated that he contacted this office because of the close proximity of a building of this agency to the spot in which the document was found. I thanked him for his prompt action, advised him that he had done his patriotic duty, and told him that the matter would be placed in the proper hands.

Thought you would be interested in the following information which was furnished by Whittaker Chambers on March 16, 1949s

Chambers stated that he had visited Isaac Don Levine on the evening of March 15, 1949, at which time the latter made available for Chamber's perusal a letter which Levine had received from one Kurt Singer. Levine explained to Chambers that he had heard that Kurt Singer was traveling throughout the country on a lecture tour and that during the course of his tour he made reference to the Hiss-Chambers situation and his remarks were reportedly pro-Hiss. Levine stated that he had known Kurt Singer because the latter had written several articles for the publication "Plain Talk" with which Levine is connected. He further stated that he took the occasion to write to Singer and question him as to the basis of his pro-Hiss remarks and as a result he received the letter which was shown to Chambers.

Prior to discussing the contents of this communication, Mr. Chambers requested that for the present time no attempt be made to interview Murt Singer, and further that the source of this information be protected as much as possible. He explained that he understood from Levine that the latter and Singer were not on especially good terms and for that reason Levine did not desire that it be known that he was the one who had divulged the contents of Singer's letter.- Chambers stated that according to Singer's letter, the Hiss defense will proceed along the following lines:

> 1. That Whittaker Chamber's had received mental treatment and was temporarily under observation. An employee or and executive of the publishing firm of Houghton-Mifflin in Boston will testify as to the institution and its location and as to the doctors who treated Chambers.

Chambers and Levine believe that Dale Warren and employee of Houghton-Mifflin in the New york office is the individual referred to above. Chambers recalls that he had only seen Warren on one or two occasions when he had only

Report of SA CHAPMAN FLETCHER at St. Paul, Minnesota, dated April 29, 1949, instant matter, reflected interview of MERTON B. TICE, a former resident at 2138 California Street, N. W., Apt. 410, Washington, D. C. It may be noted that SILVERMAN occupied Apt. 409 at that address from approximately December, 1934, until September, 1937. TICE could offer nothing pertinent to instant investigation, but suggested that the persons who occupied apartment 310, just underneath him, were most observant of everything that was going on in the building, and would no doubt have observed anything out of the ordinary that had taken place in the apartment occupied by SILVERMAN. TICE could not recall the names of the persons residing in Apt. 310.

A review of the city directories of Washington, D. C., reflects the names of FREDERICK W. WILLNER and wife ELEANOR, in Apt. 310, 2138 California Street, N. W., from 1935 to 1939. Subsequent investigation disclosed the present residence of the WILLINERS to be Herald Harbor, Maryland. It may be noted that Herald Harbor, Maryland is covered by . the postal station located at Crownsville, Anne Arundel County, Maryland.

The Baltimore Office is requested to interview Mr. and Mrs. FREDERICK W. WILLINER at Herald Harbor, Maryland, concerning their knowledge as to the activities and associates of SILVERMAN.

Reference Washington Field Office letter to the Director, dated March 11, 1949, which letter requested the interview of THOMAS SMITH, aka. "BIG TOM", at Trappe, Talbot County, Maryland, by the Baltimore Office. Mr. MAXWELL MC GAUGHEY HAMILTON, Far Eastern Division, State Department, was interviewed by Special Agent VAN ETTEN regarding the initials on page 16618 of the document designated Q-5. The initials "MS" are those of MYRL S. MEYERS, who in January of 1938 was an officer in the Far Eastern Division, State Department, Chinese Affairs. under HAMILTON. MEYERS' present address is 902 Euclid Avenue, Berkeley, California. He is a retired State employee.

The initial "H" is that of HAMILTON himself who at that time was Chief of the Far Eastern Affairs Division.

The initials "DT" are those of a DOROTHY TUGGLE who at that time was a clerk in Far Eastern Affairs. DOROTHY TUGGLE died some five years ago according to Mrs. R. DAVIDSON, Division of Central Services, Transportation Branch, State Department.

BALLANTINE is retired from the State Department and is presently with the Brookings Institute in Washington, D. C.

In the absence of further instructions, as to additional investigation desired, no further action in this regard is being undertaken.

In the course of the interview with HAMILTON, he indicated that he frequently came in contact with ALGER HISS at the State Department, but that they did not mix socially. Prior to the testimony of ELIZABETH BENTLEY, nothing had ever come to HAMILTON's attention which would give him reason to question the activities or associates of ALGER HISS. He has never been in receipt of correspondence from ALGER HISS, and never had any real personal discussions or relations with him.

WALTER H. ANDERSON requests the following information be furnished to USA THOMAS MURPHY. During ANDERSON's recent visit to New York he furnished MURPHY with a list of 7 or 8 telegrams. ANDERSON advises that the telegrams and their contents were made available to the House Committee on Un-American A_c tivities, but have not been made public. Referenced Bulet requested interviews of former neighbors and coemployees of ABRAHAM GEORGE SILVERMAN. It was pointed out that, according to WHITTAKER CHAMBERS, during the latter part of December, 1936 or the first part of January, 1937, three Persian rugs were shipped to SILVERMAN in Washington, D. C. from New York City. Thereafter, SILVERMAN delivered one rug to the late HARRY DEXTER WHITE, and subsequently, delivered a second rug to ALGER HISS at a pre-arranged meeting on the outskirts of Washington, D. C. in the vicinity of Maryland University. CHAMBERS advised that SILVERMAN put the rug in his car and drove to the pre-arranged meeting place and that he, CHAMBERS, accompanied by AIGER HISS in the latter's automobile, met SILVERMAN where the transfer of the rug was made.

FLORENCE TOMPKINS, former maid of SILVERMAN, has advised that SILVERMAN received three rugs from New York City and that one rug was given to WHITE, one to ALGER HISS, and that SILVERMAN kept the third. The method of delivery of rugs to WHITE and HISS was not known by TOMPKINS. DEDEDTIE 121:JNG

ELIZABETH TERRILL RENTLEY has described SILVERMAN as a Communist who furnished her, through NATHAN GREGORY SLIVERMASTER and his wife, HELEN VILVERMASTER, voluminous information concerning materiel data of the U.S. Army Air Force where SILVERMAN was employed from 1942 to 1945. This information included considerable data regarding the B-29 Bomber. According to BENTLEY, SILVERMAN also furnished her information relayed to him by other highly placed government officials.

SILVERMAN formerly resided at 2325 - 15th Street, N. W., apartment 311, Washington, D. C., from approximately October, 1937 until June 26, 1947.

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CHARLES L.XING and wife, CATHERINE, resided at 2325 - 15th Street, N. W. in apartment 209 during 1939 and apartment 14 in 1940 and 1941. It is noted that SILVERMAN occupied apartment 311, at that address from 1937 to June, 1947. Mrs. DAVIES could not recall the name of SILVERMAN, in any regard, and attributed this to the fact that she spent a small amount of time in her apartment.

She said that she first obtained the apartment about November, 1940, and added that during the summer of 1942, she had sub-let the apartment to a Captain in the United States Army, but that she could not recall his name, and had no idea as to his present whereabouts.

She further stated that she had left Washington in December, 1942. and in March, 1943, had gone overseas with the American Red Cross. She was later informed by her daughter, Mrs. ROY J. MONNER (then Miss JOAN RIDDICK) that she, Mrs. MONNER, had sub-let the apartment. It is recalled that CHAMBERS has stated he remembers a wingback chair in the AIGER HISS home and CLAUDIE CATLETT states that she received a wingback chair from the HISS family when the HISS family moved from 2905 - P Street, N. W.

If this chair is the same one which WHITTAKER CHAMBERS recalls, it would tend to discount his statements that he recalls it appearing in the home of AIGER HISS on 30th Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.

Transmitted herewith to the ^Bureau and the New York ^Division are six photographs showing three views of a wingback chair presently located at 2728 - P Street, N. W., which residence is occupied by the CATLETT family.

GILEERT KILPAK, Pendle Hill, Wallingford, Pennsylvania, has advised that although he knew WHALBERS slightly, prior to his discussion with him concerning the HISS matter, he did not have much contact with him until he was instructed to approach CHALBERS in an attempt to have the HISS matter settled out of court. KILPAK pointed out that the Quaker religion does not approve of having its members take their grievances into court and has a committee to handle matters of this nature which come to its attention.

According to KILPAK, CHAIBERS was entirely agreeable to such a meeting but HISS declined to accept the suggestion. At one time it was thought that the wives of HISS and CHALBERS might be able to settle matters since they were acquainted with each other, however, HISS declined to such a meeting also.

KILPAK advised that an additional purpose in contacting CHAIBERS was that the Friends Society desired to convince itself that CHAIBERS was entirely rational in his disclosures. He said that as a result of having talked with CHAIBERS he is convinced and the Society is convinced, that CHAIBERS is perfectly normal. He added that the only criticism the Society has to offer concerning CHAIBERS is the manner in which he is attempting to fight Communism, not in the fact that he is fighting it.

He continued that he felt the necessity of clearing the matter up to the satis-) faction of the members of the Friends Society and as a result had prepared an open letter to CHALBERS which he had sent to two Friends publications, "The Friends Intelligencer" and "The Friend." He said that the letter was not published by the Intelligencer since it had already recently published an editorial concerning CHALBERS and the "Friend" simply declined to publish the letter without explanation. He said that in his opinion, the latter publication was prejudiced in favor of HISS.

As a result, KILPAK sent the letter directly to CHAMBERS and received a reply dated January 24, 1949. A copy of the open letter is set forth herewith:

"AN OPEN LETTER TO WHITTAKER CHAIDERS"

"I address this letter to you and to your family, but I make no pretence, I address it also to <u>Alger</u> and <u>Priscilla Hiss</u>, to Richard Nixon, and still more to the whole Society of Friends. We are all one in the bond of Christ, all members of His body--that, we seem to have forgotten. In Him, what touchest one touches all.

"Believe me, though quite unworthy of such a ministry, I write to you in tears, feeling how cruelly we all have violated His unity. You must feel as I do, that in the minds of thousands of Americans your troubles have become a symbol of the tragedy that lies just beneath the surface of the sea of our contemporary life. Someone lights a match and the oil-slick surface is aflame and monsters rise from the depths. It is not surprising that in such a struggle the children of this world accuse, judge, lie and hate. Then these things happen within the body of Christ, the results are too awful to contemplate.

"You fled the violence and deceit of atheist communism and you believed that in the holy tradition of Quakerism you would find a truth and peace which the children of this world could not offer. You thought to find a comradeship to hold you steady in the growth of that truth and peace. Forgive us where we have betrayed that trust. To have torn and beaten the body of Christ. We have taken sides. We have divided again the garment of Him who said, 'Judge not.' He who said 'Judge not' know how deeply hidden each soul is from each other soul on earth. 'The soul of thy brother is as a dark forest.' We pass those nearest to us as strangers and it often comes about that the less we know the more we If we must judge, the Scriptures tell us, let it be righteous judge. judgment, in fear and trembling. Is there a mother's son among us who would willingly stand before His Creator to be judged upon his merits? No, His gaze upon us is all charity and mercy, and only thus could we bear it. As God has looked upon us, so are we to look upon our brothers. Christ forgive us all! Blind in the darkness of our souls we have taken the sword, cutting off ears right and left, and He stands by in silence, His hand stretched forth in healing pity.

> "You have, dear Whittaker, done and said in recent months things difficult for all of us to understand; that is inevitable--how little can any of us understand even ourselves. As God grants us grace we suspend our judgment. Here is the heart of the matter: guilty or not guilty misses the point; only the shameless pride of millions of souls could bring forth a civilization such as ours--we are all guilty, all stand bound together in need; only penitence and charity can save us. Surely every man is but a hair's breadth from Christ and the devil, and only the final revealings will show to whom each of us belongs. It is for this that I cry aloud: Friends, stand still in the Lord, judge not.

> "You will remember, Whittaker, one beautiful morning last spring in Maryland we found ourselves, along with others, climbing a hill to an old country meeting house. The oak trees murmured with the new season and we who gathered there were enveloped in the stainless silence, baptised by that Spirit which is able to make all things pure. In the midst of whatever trials may await you, hold that day as a symbol up to your inward eye and know that we are all one because He has made us one and that every half truth, every judgment, strikes at every heart, rolls up on every shore.

"My prayers and yours join with those of all men everywhere, uniting us in that Inward Kingdom where all stands firm and whole in the midst of this shaken, broken world.

"I remain ever your friend,

KILPAK declined to release the original of CHAMBERS reply but permitted a copy to be made which is as follows. The letter is handwritten.

"Testminster, 1d. Jan. 24, 1949

"Dear Gilbert Kilpak:

"Thank thee for thy letter in which I apprehend the whole spirit better sometimes than particular phrases.

"God has given me a work to do. He has said that I must stand up in confessing my own sin to the ears of the world. I must lay bare the sin of the world and the century. In my person I must take up all sin and I must especially do this in an age which carnot endure truth - an age in which the one thing man cannot do is to speak God's truth because to do so would be to reveal man's lie.

"Perfidy and terror are the works (?) of the age which has resolved to live without God - therefore, the confession that I have to make is a confession of perfidy and terror. But this ordeal (for the confessor and for all who must share knowledge of the confession) is raised up by two powers - courage and compassion.

"Thee prays for all - and thy prayer is better than my prayers, but thee prays in the peace of the meeting or its spirit. I too pray for all; but I prayed for Alger Hiss at the moment when he was insulting me in the Hotel Commodore. I prayed for him before hundreds of people in Congress when he charged me with insanity. I pray for him, and I pray for them all, each day.

"If I could fight communism without injuring one of them, I would do so. I tried to disclose the conspiracy without unduly injuring the conspirators. In fact, I shielded them for nine years - shielded them in the end at great, perhaps irreparable risk to myself, that is to say, to my family, which chiefly must suffer my sufferings.

"I do not judge Alger Hiss, and I do not hate him. At his indictment, the press asked me for comment. I said: 'I should be inhuman if I could take any pleasure in Mr. Hiss's troubles.' If I could help him, I would help him. And I would help all the others. But if I could

"help them, we should not be in this terrifying tragedy. We should be confessing together: 'Thus it was, and thus we acted. None of us is less guilty than the other. He only is more guilty who, in his blindness, nevertheless felt the stimrings of God - but did not then feel them enough.' I mean myself.

"In essence, under the trappings of horror, this is a great religious testimony. God has given me strength for this ordeal - and, without the immediate, (illegible word) presence of God, I would have been unable to do this. The burden is to heavy for one man to bear. At times it has been too heavy for me. Each time I sank, God raised me up. God sought a man who was capable of giving his living life, of dying while living, that (illegible word) might suffer one faction less for the universal sin. My problem has been not to fail God in my crushing leading (?) and not to condem men.

"This is written hastily and badly. I need thy prayers and thy counsel.

(signed) "Thittaker Chambers"

KILPAK stated that his entire connection with CHAMBERS had been as a member of the Friends Society and consisted of the attempt to obtain settlement of the dispute outside a court of law and that he had no information concerning the actual underground activities of CHAMBERS other than in a general sense as has already been set forth in the public press. He said that he had no specific information concerning the nature of CHAMBERS testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION CONCERNING TYPEWRITER

You will recall that Whittaker Chambers produced 65 pages of typewritten documents at a pretrial deposition hearing in connection with a civil action in Baltimore, Maryland on November 17, 1948. He alleged that these documents were copies of, or excerpts from original State Department documents which were made available to him by Alger Hiss for delivery to Colonel ^Bykov, his superior in Soviet espionage operations. These documents were dated variously from January to April, 1938.

The FBI Laboratory examined the typewriting on these documents and concluded that the typewriting appearing on the documents compared most closely to standards for a Woodstock Pica type, spaced ten letters to the inch. The FBI Laboratory's files reflect that this style of type was made by the Woodstock Company in 1929. These documents, which have been commonly referred to as the "Chambers" documents, have been designated by the FBI Laboratory as Q-6 through Q-69.

Whittaker Chambers alleged that the "Chambers" documents were typed by either Alger Hiss or his wife, Priscilla, at the Hiss residence and the typed copies were then made available to Chambers.

Alger Hiss when interviewed concerning the typewriter, advised in a signed statement as follows:

"During the period from 1936 to some time after 1938 we had a typewriter in our home in Washington. This was an old-fashioned machine, possibly an Underwood, but I am not at all certain regarding the make. Mrs. Hiss, who is not a typist, used this machine somewhat as an amateur typist, but I never recall having used it. Possibly samples of Mrs. Hiss' typing on this machine are in existence, but F have not located any to date, but will endeavor to do so. Mrs. Hiss disposed of this typewriter to either a secondhand typewriter /-/

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time subsequent to 1938, exact date or place unknown. The whereabouts of this typewriter is presently unknown to me. Prior to this typewriter coming into the possession of my immediate family it was the property of Mr. Thomas Fansler, Mrs. Hiss father, who was in the insurance business in Philadelphia. Mr. Fansler lived the latter years of his life on Walnut Street in Philadelphia, but is now deceased, having died in the early 1940's." (74-1333-418, P.10)

Mrs. Alger (Priscilla) Hiss in a signed statement dated December 7, 1948 furnished the following information concerning her knowledge of instant typewriter:

"I have been asked to recall all of the facts concerning a typewriter which was in my possession. Some time in 1932 or 1933, as far as I can recall, my father, Mr. Thomas L. Fansler, who was in the insurance business in Philadelphia (he was connected with the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, for which company he acted as a General Agent), had in his possession a typewriter which he gave to me. I do not recall whether I had this typewriter while I was residing in New York City. I do not recall the make of this typewriter. I do not recall now, how I disposed of it. I myself am not a proficient typist, but I have typed several things on this typewriter which my father gave to me." (74-1333-1147, P.12)

INVESTIGATION CONDUCTED BY THE BUREAU TO LOCATE HISS' TYPEWRITER

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Investigation conducted in connection with this matter has revealed that a Woodstock standard typewriter was purchased by a partnership consisting of Mr. Harry L. Martin and Thomas L. Fansler, the latter being the father-in-law of Alger Hiss, at the inception of the partnership in 1927. This partnership was the Philadelphia agency for the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company. The partnership was dissolved in the latter part of 1930. Since this was a partnership in name only, no records were kept and the only thing carrying the partnership name consisted of letterheads used in the course of the business. There was no record, therefore, of the serial number of the Woodstock typewriter used by the partnership.

Exhaustive efforts have been made to locate the sales record which reflects the sale of the Woodstock typewriter to the Fansler-Martin partnership in Fhiladelphia. This investigation was negative since the records for that period are no longer in existence, either in Philadelphia . or at the Woodstock factory in Woodstock, Illinois.

When the partnership was dissolved in the latter part of 1930 the Woodstock typewriter was taken by Mr. Fansler to his Philadelphia apartment where he resided with his daughter, Daisy Fansler. Daisy Fansler wrote a letter on this typewriter dated December 6, 1931 which has been identified by the FBI Laboratory as being identical with the typewriting appearing on the "Chambers" documents.

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The next document which was identified as being written on this typewriter was dated January 30, 1933. This was a letter addressed to an insurance agency in Boston, Massachusetts concerning an insurance policy allegedly issued to Alger Hiss. It is known that the Hisses were residing in New York City on that date. Therefore, it appears that the typewriter was in their possession in New York City at that time.

An identification was made of another document by the FBI Laboratory, dated February 17, 1933, which was signed by Alger Hiss. The Hisses were residing in New York City on that date.

The FBI Laboratory has identified two other documents as having been written on this typewriter, one of which was signed by Alger Hiss, dated September 1, 1936, and the other, dated May 25, 1937, was signed by Priscilla Fansler Hiss. At this time the Hisses were residing in Washington D. C.

Exhaustive efforts have been made to locate the typewriter through secondhand dealers, pawn shops, Police Department records and interviews with business and personal associates of the Hisses, with negative results.

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DEFENSE KNOWLEDGE OF SPECIMENS IDENTIFIED BY THE FBI LABORATORY

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On February 24, 1949 Mr. Whearty presented to the Court and the defense a written answer in which it was agreed generally that the Government would furnish much of the material requested by the defense. Various items were discussed and passed upon by the Court, or agreed to by the Government as to whether they would furnish same to the defense.

Mr. Whearty stated that the Government's position is, or was that under Rule 16, the defense is not entitled to anything but it would be prejudicial and unreasonable to the defendant to deny them access to certain material. Mr. Whearty agreed to furnish the defense specimens as collected by the Government which have been identified as typed on the same typewriter as the documents produced at Baltimore, Maryland ("Chambers" documents). Mr. Whearty indicated that they were giving these to the defense without waiving the point that the defense is not entitled to anything. As to this, the Court said, "I think the Government is surprisingly liberal and technically I do not know whether he would have to give you all of that."

The Departmental attorneys subsequently advised the defense counsel of the identities and addresses of the persons who have in their possession those documents identified as having been written on the same typewriter on which Q-6 through Q-69 were prepared.

DEFENSE KNOWLEDGE THAT GOVERNMENT FAILED TO LOCATE HISS' TYPEWRITER

During the course of the above disclosures and concessions to the Court by Mr. Whearty, of the Department, on February 24, 1949, he admitted that the Government definitely did not have the typewriter upon which the documents were typed; that he believed "this was a thing they were entitled to and when and if we find it, they would be given access to it."



It is of interest to note that at the time of the above hearing, Judge Bondy stated with reference to what had been agreed upon by the Government to be furnished to the defense, "Mr. Whearty was quite liberal," and he again repeated the statement with another statement, "I think the Government has been quite liberal. Technically, you may not have been entitled to anything."

As can be seen from the above, the defense now has the advantage of knowing in substance what some of the proof, if not all of the proof, is as will be presented by the Government and they will undoubtedly prepare their defense accordingly, based upon the information and material furnished to them.

CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING THE REPORTED RECOVERY OF THE HISS TYPEWRITER BY THE DEFENSE ATTORNEYS

Mrs. Claudie Catlett, colored, a former maid of Alger and Priscilla Hiss in Washington from 1935 to the latter part of 1938, has been interviewed on a number of occasions by the Washington Field Office. She was re-interviewed on May 12 and 13, 1949. She advised she had been interviewed recently by attorneys for Alger Hiss, at which time many things that she had forgotten were brought to her attention. She stated that the attorneys some time in April, 1949 had shown her an old typewriter which she identified as a Woodstock typewriter, and she identified it as a typewriter which was given to her family by Alger Hiss. As to the date when this typewriter was given to her family, she advised it must have been when they were cleaning out one of the houses in which the Hisses lived, not being certain as to which house but she thought it was the one at 2905 P Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. This would have been approximately June, 1936. She said she identified the typewriter solely on the basis of the fact that the attorneys had told her it was the same machine.

Mrs. Catlett when interviewed by Agents on other occasions was shown full-sized photographs of various old standard makes of typewriters, with the identities of the typewriters concealed. Among those was a picture of an old type Woodstock. However, she was unable to pick out any one typewriter as being anything like the typewriter she had seen in the Hiss home while working there.

When re-interviewed on May 13, 1949 she was again shown photographs of various old standard make typewriters and from this group she picked out a photograph of a Woodstock as being like the typewriter shown to her by the attorneys for Hiss. Mrs. Catlett has three sons, namely, Perry, Raymond and James. The mother and the three sons have been very close to the families of Alger and Donald Hiss for some time, all of them having done various odd jobs for the Hiss families. It is not clear through interviews with them as to how or when the typewriter came into their possession originally. The typewriter was recovered by Mr. McLean, attorney for Alger Hiss, and Charles E. Houston, a local colored attorney, from Ira Lockey, Sr., colored, Washington, D. C. on April 16, 1949. It was thereafter displayed to Mrs. Catlett and her sons at one of the son's home on P Street, N.W., and thereafter crated and delivered to New York City by Mr. McLean. The following pertinent statements as to the possession of the typewriter have been made by the sons of Mrs. Catlett:

Perry Catlett when interviewed on May 13, 1949, stated that Alger Hiss had given him, among other things, a typewriter when the Hiss family resided on 30th Street, N.W. and were preparing to move to 3415 Volta Place, N.W. This would be approximately January 1, 1938. He said he could not recall whether it was Mr. or Mrs. Hiss who gave him the typewriter. He also does not recall whether the typewriter had originally been given to him or his mother, or if he, Perry, merely transported it home. He denied that he had had any conversation with Alger or Donald Hiss or any of the attorneys for Hiss concerning any typewriter. However, when again interviewed on May 16, 1949 he admitted that he had discussed the matter of the typewriter with members of his family and with an attorney for Alger Hiss. He admitted that he had viewed the Woodstock typewriter recently obtained by Alger Hiss! attorney and said that he could identify the typewriter as being the one formerly in his possession. However, he was unable to state how he would be able to make this identification.

James Catlett stated that he recalls a typewriter being brought to his home at 2728 P Street, N.W. and, as he recalls, it was brought there by his mother, but he is not sure of this. He did not know where she got the typewriter, but stated that she used to work for the Hisses and he never asked any questions. He did not state when this typewriter was brought to his home. He could not recall the make of the typewriter, but felt that it was an old typewriter. He further stated that a typewriter was recently brought to his home on P Street, N.W. by a lawyer, and he was asked if he recognized it as being the typewriter his brother once had. He told them he thought it was the same. He based his

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identification on the fact that the line spacer on the typewriter was broken in a certain way. He advised he would not get on a witness stand and state under oath that this was the same typewriter that was once in his home on P Street, N.W., but he thinks it is the same typewriter.

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Raymond Catlett advised on May 13, 1949 that he had received a typewriter from Mr. Alger Hiss, exact date unknown but that it was some time in the 1930's, and that Alger Hiss at that time was living either on P Street, N.W., or on 30th Street, N.W. (May 1, 1935 to January 1, 1938). He advised that he believes the typewriter, which was recently procured by Mr. Hiss' attorney, is the same one that was given to his family by Alger Hiss. He based this conclusion upon his familiarity with the machine and the various imperfections that he recalls it had. He admitted that he had assisted Alger Hiss' attorneys in locating this machine and that he had received \$40 from Donald Hiss, brother of Alger Hiss, for this assistance.

Raymond Catlett, when re-interviewed on May 15, 1949, stated that immediately after he was interviewed by Bureau Agents in January, 1949 concerning his knowledge of a Woodstock typewriter allegedly owned by the Hiss family, that he contacted Donald Hiss and told Donald Hiss of the Bureau's inquiry concerning the typewriter. Raymond Catlett told Donald Hiss that he and his brother had obtained an old Woodstock typewriter from the Alger Hiss family and he felt he could possibly locate it. Donald Hiss was skeptical and did not believe him, but finally agreed to assist Raymond Catlett in locating the machine. Donald Hiss gave him \$40 for expenses which Raymond claims he spent in taxicab fares.

Raymond Catlett stated that the typewriter was recovered by Hiss' attorneys and was brought to the Catlett residence at 2728 P Street, N.W. some time in April, 1949, where the members of the Catlett family, namely, Claudie, his mother; Perry, his brother; James, his brother; and Mary, his sister, examined it and concluded that it was the typewriter formerly in their possession which they had secured from the Alger Hiss family. Raymond said that he even packed it in a box for Mr. McLean.

Raymond Catlett advised that there were a number of reasons why he had not mentioned the typewriter to Bureau Agents when he was previously

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interviewed. He stated that one of the reasons was that he feels a man is innocent until proven guilty; another is that he does not believe that Alger Hiss is guilty. He said that he had received the typewriter from Alger Hiss and that if it is important to the case against Hiss, he believes that Mr. Hiss should have the benefit of receiving the typewriter. He said, further, that Alger Hiss had been good to him; that Alger and his wife had provided odd jobs for him; had furnished clothing to him and had afforded employment for his mother when she needed it badly.

During the course of another interview with Raymond Catlett on May 17, 1949 he maintained that he believes that his family received the typewriter prior to the time the Hiss family moved to Volta Place, N. W., Washington, D. C. (January 1, 1938). However, he did state that both he and his brother, Perry, had done odd jobs for the Hiss family while they resided on Volta Place but this would be subsequent to January 1, 1938 and during the period when the "Chambers" documents were typed.

SERIAL NUMBER OF TYPEWRITER RECOVERED BY HISS ATTORNEYS

Ira W. Lockey, Sr., colored, turned over a typewriter to Edward C. McLean, attorney for Alger Hiss, on April 16, 1949. Lockey has in his possession a receipt obtained from McLean which described the typewriter as a Woodstock typewriter, Model 5 N, Serial Number 230099. Lockey received \$15 for the typewriter.

As previously stated, the Bureau has not been able to obtain the serial number of the typewriter which originated with the Fansler-Martin partnership in Philadelphia, on which the "Chambers" documents were typed. Through information received from the Woodstock factory it was determined that the serial numbers of the typewriters manufactured during the year 1927, the year it was believed the Woodstock typewriter was purchased by the Fansler-Martin partnership, fell within 160,000 to 177,000. However, the search for a Woodstock typewriter was not limited to the serial numbers covering the year 1927, but included those typewriters manufactured from 1926 to 1929. This range in serial numbers was from 145,000 to 204,000.

There is no record available of the sale or subsequent history of the Woodstock typewriter bearing serial number 230099 and it was never returned to the factory for rebuilding.

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POSSIBLE USE OF TYPEWRITER BY DEFENSE ATTORNEYS AT TRIAL

It is possible that since the Hiss attorneys were notified by the Government that the Government does not have possession of the Hiss typewriter, that the defense decided to increase its efforts to locate the typewriter and alter its characteristics.

From interviews with the various Negroes who had the recently recovered typewriter in their possession, it appears that they have been well coached by the Hiss attorneys as to what answers they should give to Bureau Agents when interviewed concerning the recovered typewriter.

These Negroes conveniently have a loss of memory as to exactly how they obtained possession of the typewriter; on the other hand, they have a distinct memory that the typewriter came into their possession some time prior to January 1, 1938. (The "Chambers" documents were typed in January, February, March and April, 1938). It would appear, therefore, that the Hiss defense is going to be that neither Alger or Priscilla Hiss had possession of the Woodstock typewriter at the time the documents were alleged to have been typed by them. The Negroes who had possession of the typewriter will possibly claim that the typewriter was in an inoperative condition during the period in which they had it in their possession.

SPECIMEN DATED JULY 26, 1947 IDENTIFIED WITH "CHAMBERS" DOCUMENTS

The defense attorneys obtained an old Woodstock typewriter from Ira Lockey, Sr., on April 16, 1949, in Washington, D. C. Lockey advised that sometime in 1945, he moved some household furnishings for a Negro, Vernon Marlow. Upon delivery of these furnishings, Marlow's wife did not have sufficient funds to pay him for the transportation and, therefore, he, Lockey, requested payment in the form of an old typewriter which was lying in the back yard. He said this typewriter had been outside in the weather for some time and was in "bad shape". Lockey took this typewriter to his home and endeavored to clean it up and make it usable for his daughter, Margaret Lockey, who was then attending high school. He said the typewriter remained at his residence until approximately the last of January, 1949, when he gave it to his son, Ira, Jr., for the amusement of his children.

Mrs. James McQueen, nee Margaret Lockey, colored, was interviewed in the presence of her husband in Brooklyn, New York, on May 16, 1949. She said that her father, Ira Lockey, Sr., got a typewriter for her sometime in

1945. She believed it was a Woodstock or an Underwood. Her husband, James McQueen, said he recalled it was and Underwood. Mrs. McQueen said she was married in May, 1947, and took this typewriter from the home of Ira Lockey, Sr., to her new residence at 3742 Hayes Street, N.E., Washington, D. C. When she and her husband moved to New York City in about January, 1948, they returned the typewriter to Ira Lockey, Sr., home.

Mrs. McQueen said that two weeks after her father gave her the typewriter in 1945, she cleaned it with kerosene and changed the ribbon on it. She said the typewriter was in very bad condition when she got it and that after she fixed it as best she could, it was still not a good typewriter but it was in better condition then when she received it. She said the letter "A" would stick when pressed down and that you had to manually turn the machine to go from one line to another. She said that she used the typewriter most of the time and it was the only typewriter that was ever in the home of her father, Ira Lockey, Sr., in Washington, D. C.

Her husband advised that there was in the home of his father-inlaw, Ira Lockey, Sr., in Washington, D. C., a leatherette chest in a second floor hall closet in which he believed there were many typewritten papers and he thought perhaps some of these papers were typed by him on the Woodstock typewriter.

As a result of the above information, a search was made at the home of Ira Lockey, Sr., and some typewriting specimens were located one of which was an application for Federal employment dated July 26, 1947, bearing the name Stafford Jimmy McQueen, 1207 Park Road, N.W., Apartment 101, Washington 10, D. C. This was an application for employment filed with the Civil Service Commission and contained a considerable amount of typewriting. The FBI Laboratory examined the typewriting on this specimen (K740) and it was concluded that the machine which was used to type the "Chambers" documents (Q-6 through Q-69) was the same machine which typed K740. The FBI Laboratory advised that the characters appearing on specimen K740 corresponded most closely to the typewriting standards in the Laboratory for Woodstock, pica type, spaced ten letters to the inch.

The New York Office has been advised of this identification by FBI Laboratory report dated May 23, 1949.

OBSERVATIONS

It would appear from the report that the defense attorneys have in fact recovered the typewriter which was originally in the possession of Alger and Priscilla Hiss. The identification of the specimen taken from this

typewriter in 1947 will materially effect any defense that the typewriter was in an inoperative condition during the entire time subsequent to its being turned over to the Catlett Negroes on or about January 1, 1938, as reflected in the interviews with them and other negroes. The Hisses will undoubtedly claim that they did not have access to the typewriter after January 1, 1938, and further that they had no knowledge of the whereabouts of the typewriter, and did not associate with the Catlett family after 1938. However, it is of interest to note that Perry Catlett when interviewed advised that Alger Hiss attended his wedding in 1941. It is recalled that Perry Catlett is a son of Claudie Catlett who worked as a maid for the Hisses from approximately 1935 to the fall of 1938.

ACTION

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The foregoing is submitted for your information. The facts concerning the recovery of the Woodstock typewriter by the Hiss attorneys were made available to the Attorney General and the Criminal Division of the Department on May 16, 1949 in order that they might take any appropriate action to obtain the possession of the typewriter or specimens therefrom for examination by the FBI Laboratory.

The facts surrounding the recovery of the typewriter by the Hiss attorneys were also made available to the Criminal Division of the Department and to the Departmental attorneys in New York City on May 18, 1949, in an investigative report prepared by the Washington Field Office.

There is attached hereto for your approval a memorandum to the Attorney General with copies for Mr. Alexander M. Campbell advising of the typwriting identification of the speciment dated July 26, 1947 with the "Chambers" documents.

ASAC Belmont, New York, called at 10:55 a.m. today and stated that the Government and counsel for Hiss appeared before Judge Kauffman, SDNY, this morning and advised that both were ready to go to trial. Judge Kauffman remarked that he wanted to hear this case, but because of his commitments could not hear it this week and accordingly set it over to 11:30 a.m., May 31, 1949. Judge Kauffman stated the case would go to trial at that time.

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
