#### FBI FOIPA Addendum

As referenced in our letter responding to your Freedom of Information/Privacy Acts (FOIPA) request, the FBI FOIPA Addendum provides information applicable to your request. Part 1 of the Addendum includes standard responses that apply to all requests. Part 2 includes standard responses that apply to requests for records about individuals to the extent your request seeks the listed information. Part 3 includes general information about FBI records, searches, and programs.

#### Part 1: The standard responses below apply to all requests:

- (i) **5 U.S.C. § 552(c).** Congress excluded three categories of law enforcement and national security records from the requirements of the FOIPA [5 U.S.C. § 552(c)]. FBI responses are limited to those records subject to the requirements of the FOIPA. Additional information about the FBI and the FOIPA can be found on the www.fbi.gov/foia website.
- (ii) Intelligence Records. To the extent your request seeks records of intelligence sources, methods, or activities, the FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), and as applicable to requests for records about individuals, PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(1), (b)(3), and (j)(2)]. The mere acknowledgment of the existence or nonexistence of such records is itself a classified fact protected by FOIA exemption (b)(1) and/or would reveal intelligence sources, methods, or activities protected by exemption (b)(3) [50 USC § 3024(i)(1)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that any such records do or do not exist.

#### Part 2: The standard responses below apply to all requests for records on individuals:

- (i) Requests for Records about any Individual—Watch Lists. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of any individual's name on a watch list pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(7)(E) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that watch list records do or do not exist.
- (ii) Requests for Records about any Individual—Witness Security Program Records. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could identify any participant in the Witness Security Program pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(3) and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(3), 18 U.S.C. 3521, and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.
- (iii) Requests for Records for Incarcerated Individuals. The FBI can neither confirm nor deny the existence of records which could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any incarcerated individual pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(7)(E), (b)(7)(F), and PA exemption (j)(2) [5 U.S.C. §§ 552/552a (b)(7)(E), (b)(7)(F), and (j)(2)]. This is a standard response and should not be read to indicate that such records do or do not exist.

#### Part 3: General Information:

- (i) Record Searches. The Record/Information Dissemination Section (RIDS) searches for reasonably described records by searching systems or locations where responsive records would reasonably be found. A standard search normally consists of a search for main files in the Central Records System (CRS), an extensive system of records consisting of applicant, investigative, intelligence, personnel, administrative, and general files compiled by the FBI per its law enforcement, intelligence, and administrative functions. The CRS spans the entire FBI organization, comprising records of FBI Headquarters, FBI Field Offices, and FBI Legal Attaché Offices (Legats) worldwide; Electronic Surveillance (ELSUR) records are included in the CRS. Unless specifically requested, a standard search does not include references, administrative records of previous FOIPA requests, or civil litigation files. - (ii) **FBI Records.** Founded in 1908, the FBI carries out a dual law enforcement and national security mission. As part of this dual mission, the FBI creates and maintains records on various subjects; however, the FBI does not maintain records on every person, subject, or entity.
- (iii) Requests for Criminal History Records or Rap Sheets. The Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Division provides Identity History Summary Checks often referred to as a criminal history record or rap sheet. These criminal history records are not the same as material in an investigative "FBI file." An Identity History Summary Check is a listing of information taken from fingerprint cards and documents submitted to the FBI in connection with arrests, federal employment, naturalization, or military service. For a fee, individuals can request a copy of their Identity History Summary Check. - (iv) National Name Check Program (NNCP). The mission of NNCP is to analyze and report information in response to name check requests received from federal agencies, for the purpose of protecting the United States from foreign and domestic threats to national security. Please be advised that this is a service provided to other federal agencies. Private Citizens cannot request a name check.

#### EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

#### SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552

- (b)(1) (A) specifically authorized under criteria established by an Executive order to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and (B) are in fact properly classified to such Executive order;
- (b)(2) related solely to the internal personnel rules and practices of an agency;
- (b)(3) specifically exempted from disclosure by statute (other than section 552b of this title), provided that such statute (A) requires that the matters be withheld from the public in such a manner as to leave no discretion on issue, or (B) establishes particular criteria for withholding or refers to particular types of matters to be withheld;
- (b)(4) trade secrets and commercial or financial information obtained from a person and privileged or confidential;
- (b)(5) inter-agency or intra-agency memorandums or letters which would not be available by law to a party other than an agency in litigation with the agency;
- (b)(6) personnel and medical files and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such law enforcement records or information (A) could reasonably be expected to interfere with enforcement proceedings, (B) would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication, (C) could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy, (D) could reasonably be expected to disclose the identity of confidential source, including a State, local, or foreign agency or authority or any private institution which furnished information on a confidential basis, and, in the case of record or information compiled by a criminal law enforcement authority in the course of a criminal investigation, or by an agency conducting a lawful national security intelligence investigation, information furnished by a confidential source, (E) would disclose techniques and procedures for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions, or would disclose guidelines for law enforcement investigations or prosecutions if such disclosure could reasonably be expected to risk circumvention of the law, or (F) could reasonably be expected to endanger the life or physical safety of any individual;
- (b)(8) contained in or related to examination, operating, or condition reports prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of an agency responsible for the regulation or supervision of financial institutions; or
- (b)(9) geological and geophysical information and data, including maps, concerning wells.

#### SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552a

- (d)(5) information compiled in reasonable anticipation of a civil action proceeding;
- (j)(2) material reporting investigative efforts pertaining to the enforcement of criminal law including efforts to prevent, control, or reduce crime or apprehend criminals;
- (k)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to an Executive order in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy, for example, information involving intelligence sources or methods;
- (k)(2) investigatory material compiled for law enforcement purposes, other than criminal, which did not result in loss of a right, benefit or privilege under Federal programs, or which would identify a source who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence:
- (k)(3) material maintained in connection with providing protective services to the President of the United States or any other individual pursuant to the authority of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3056;
- (k)(4) required by statute to be maintained and used solely as statistical records;
- (k)(5) investigatory material compiled solely for the purpose of determining suitability, eligibility, or qualifications for Federal civilian employment or for access to classified information, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished information pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence;
- (k)(6) testing or examination material used to determine individual qualifications for appointment or promotion in Federal Government service the release of which would compromise the testing or examination process;
- (k)(7) material used to determine potential for promotion in the armed services, the disclosure of which would reveal the identity of the person who furnished the material pursuant to a promise that his/her identity would be held in confidence.



It should also be mentioned that one of the addresses used in captioned case, 215 Beverly Hill Road, was also used in the GROSSMAN case.

U.S. Secret Service, advised that their organization has maintained files on GROSSMAN for some time and is classified as a "nut" caller. advised that a check of U.S. Secret Service records reflect that GROSSMAN was last arrested on March 16, 1977, by Nassau County Police, for threatening a hostage who was released from the Hanafi takeover in WDC.



# New Small Hotels Thrive Among Giants in Cities By Emphasizing Personal Service and Intimacy

A Chicago executive found himself in a mob of convention goers at an 1.800-room New York hotel. It took him 90 minutes to check in, he says, and 10 minutes to squeeze into a crowded elevator, only to find then that his room wasn't ready.

"After a hard day and a rough trip, who needs that?" he asks. So newadays when he is in New York, the executive stays at a much smaller hotel, where he gets much better service.

It's for the likes of the Chicago executive that elegant small hotels are enjoying a rabirth in the U.S., as an alternative to the big chain establishments. Small hotels traditionally flourished outside the big cities, and the 1936 Rodgers and Harl song "There's a Small Hotel" helped to remanticize them. (Although an inn in New Jersey says it was the one lyricist Lorenz Hart had in mind, Richard Rodgers's autobiography, "Easy Stages," says the hotel in the song was just "an idealized country inn.")

Today's new, small hotels, however, are being opened in major cities, sometimes right in the midsts of their giant competitors. Owners of the new hotels say they are seeking to emulate the fine little hotels of Europe, and they often advertise the "European style" of their places.

An Acquired Teste

A few small hotels like the Algoriquin in New York have long been preferred by many travelers, including celebrities such as actors and authors. As the taste is being sequired by business executives and others tired of the busile and impersonality of many big hotels, the new genre is benefiting.

The better little hotels can provide the intimacy and decor that usually aren't practical for most large hotels. If properly located, a small hotel can make up for the lack of shops or other conveniences of a large one. The main selling point of most small hotels is the personal attention they give to guests at prices competitive with the

befor large-botels.

If go out of my way to get into a small lotel," says Z. T. Collinsworth Jr., president of Bliss & Loughlin Industries, a Chicago steel-products company. "I like the personal feeling of having the hotel manager or other employes call me by name." A Chicago hotelman suggests that executives like the one-to-one relationship they can have with the manager of a small hotel. "That's the way they're used to doing business."

By and large, the new little hotels seem included to the hotels with 200 miles of less latter, with the large new hotels, their ewners say. It is hard to document the trend, as industry statistics don't distinguish one hotel from amother. But examples abound of entrepretieurs who are providing the trend.

Among the Giants

Consider Chicago's plush North Michigan Avenue area, which is dotted with such fine luxury hotels as the Drake, the Ritz-Carlton and the Astor Tower, into their midst came John B. Coleman, a ti year-aid real-estate developer. Three years ago he opened the 200-room. Whitchall Hotel and keased it to Los Group Services Lid. of London. Last full, he opened the adjeining 140-room Tremost Hotel, which is managed, by Trusi Houses Forte Lid. of London Both intels. Were renovated from old remiential hotels.

"Converting old buildings costs about half what new construction would be," Mr. Coleman says, and he adds he is considering similar ventures in Washington, D.C., and other large cities.

Whitehall's amenities rank the place among better hotels. There's a concierge to fetch theater tickets and perform other chores for guests, an unpacking service and hair dryers for women: A history is kept on the eather, has a typewriter in his room, or that an entertainer has his favorite brand of Scotch whisky awaiting his arrival. One executive insists on a bed board for his aching back. The Whitehall provides strict privacy upon request (callers are told the guest isn't registered). The Tremont is operated similarly, but with fewer flourishes—and a starting room rate that's \$17 under the Whitehall's \$59 minimum.

Mr. Coleman isn't alone in converting older properties. Two such conversions have been masterminded by Philip Pistilli, president of the Alameda Plaza, a 400-room luxury hotel in Kansas City. "We're looking at properties in other cities; I'm negotiating now to buy one," Mr. Pistilli says.

A Rechristening

Six years ago, Mr. Pistilli's company acquired the aging Fielding Hotel in San Francisco, next door to the Hotel St. Francis. Once renovated, the Fielding was rechristened the Raphael, after a Peris hotel, and set up with European-type services. The 130-room Raphael has been profitable the past four years, and occupancy has been averaging above 50%.

The Alameda, which is owned by J. C. Nichols Co., later acquired an apartment building across the street in Kansas City, renovated it and opened it as a 120-room Raphael Hotel in September 1975. Both Raphaels use the slogan, "A Little Elegant Hotel." The Kansas City Raphaels became profitable within a year, Mr. Pistilli produces copies of fetters from newspaper and television executives, lavishly praising the Kansas City Raphael for the way they were treated during the Republican National Convention last summer.

In Philadelphia's Rittenhouse Square area, a 50-year-old luxury apartment building was overhauled and opened five years ago as the Latham Hotel. Stressing personal service and a home-like atmosphere, the Latham has achieved the highest occupancy rate of Philadelphia downtown hotels, E. Barnett Steinmetz, managing director,

In Beverly Hills, Calif., Max H. Baril has succeeded with a new, small hold, the Reverly Well-known luxury holes as the Esperly Hills, the Beverly Wilshire and the Hel-Air. The 100-room Beverly Rodeo was opened four years ago after Mr. Baril took over a faltering hotel and refurbished it.

"A Little Gem"

"We've put a lot of effort into greeting people by name and making them feel at home," says Mr. Harti. His advertising slogun: "Among the riches of Beverly Hills is a little gem of a hotel."

Preferring to build from scratch is Morris G. Levy Jr., a Minnespolis hotel operator. Two years ago. Mr. Levy opened L'hotel Solitel in a Minneapolis suburb not far from the airport. The 300-room Solitel, Mr. Levy basats, is the "first French hotel" in the U.S., with such touches as a French-speaking telephone operator, an excellent restate rant and perhaps the only hideta to Minnespolis.

Mr. Livy has a franchise agreement with the Sofitel hotel chain in Europe authorizing him to seek franchisees in other U.S. cities. Mr. Lovy would participate in any franchise less paid to Sofitel. The chain apparently hopes to capitalize on increasing travel by Europeans in the U.S. Operators of other little hotels believe they also are benefiting from more travel by foreigners accustomed to staying in small hotels. One large hotel chain, Hyatt International Corp., last year made a bid for this market by opening the elegant 225-room United Nations Plaza Hotel in New York. A Hyatt official says business is excellent.

The Lure of Fine Food

Fine cuisine is often an aitraction at small hotels. At the 100-room Pontchartrain, Hotel in New Griening's Chicago executive says he keeps coming back for such dishes as trout veronique, which is lightly posched and covered with grapes and the Pontchartrain's cwn glozed hollandaise sauce. Lyste Aschaffenburg, the owner, says food-and-beverage business is about double rentainevenue. He says the hotel's accommodations compare favorably with the best hotels, and the Pontchartrain's rooms are filled most week nights.

Mr. Coleman of Chicago has been fortunate because the Whitehall purchase included the highly regarded Whitehall Club-Restaurant. At the Tremont, he teamed unwith operators of New York's 21 Club, in opening Crickets, the hotel's restaurant Crickets has helped Mr. Coleman make the Tremont a focal point for Chicago social tife.

Hoteimen generally agree the success of a small luxury hotel can be promoted by the support of the unper-class residents of the area. They can influence, through both personal and business contacts, where a lot of travelers will stay. Word-of-mouth advertising by satisfied guests is perhaps even more important. Small hotels need it because they can't come close to matching the advertising budgets of big hotel chains.

RICHARD LEE SCHULTZE, also known as R. LEE SCHULTZE, white male, date of birth January 17, 1899, was interviewed at his residence, 401 Russell Road, Alexandria, Virginia, telephone TE6-4171.

On May 22, 1977, at approximately 10:00 p.m., he received a telephone call from an unknown person who used the following language to the best of his recollection:

"Are you the Schultze who worked for the government under Eisenhower?"

Mr. SCHULTZE replied:

"No, I don't, but I have a who does."

The unknown caller then said:

"Well, get a pencil and paper and write my name down."

This person gave his name as ALEX NORTH. This person then said:

"Well, you tell him that I'm going to call him in a week or so and if he doesn't do as I tell him to do, I'm going to kill you, your wife, his wife, and his children. You can also tell him I've had his house cased and I know where it is."

The caller then hung up.

From the voice, SCHULTZE estimates the person to have to have been a white male, probably about 60 years of age, with no noticeable accent. There was no background noise in the call and the call would have lasted approximately two minutes.


