- 1. In response to reference, an inventory of current DTLIMM assets and activities has been compiled---please see paragraph 1 of Attachment A. Attachment A also reviews various possibilities as to the transfer or continuation of individual BTLIMM activities per paragraph 1 of reference.
- 2. While the matters reised by reference are discussed at some length in Attachment A, the following constitute our summary replice to paragraphs 1-a, 1-b and 1-a of reference:
- a. <u>Phoning of termination</u> (paragraph 1-a of reference): To ensure everity phase-out, we believe a stx-aunth period will be required from initiation of termination to the constantion (see paragraph 4 of Attachment A) We assume all are agreed that termination, barring unforceson factors and developments, should not be initiated until we have assurance that the outstanding legal charges involving DYLIMME percental will be quashed. Additionally, coordination of the decision to terminate with CAMASS would seem to be prerequisite.
 - h. Transfer of sativities to other organizations (paragraph 1-b of reference): Except for STLIGHT's Rest Genum propagation entivities and control flice, the enter to the question of that senets and sativities should be transferred and to them would appear to rest in the first instance aimest excinaively on German views and desires. Himself procumbly has no operational interest in continuing, either under its own ampions or in conjunction with HIGHOFING, singleten STLIGHT entivities ather than those indicated shows. We consequently see no alternative to discussing such activities of STLIGHT as the search service with HIGHOFING/GAMANN in order to determine their interest and wishes as conserve the estivity and to reach an agreement with these as to disposition, whether such disposition be termination or take-over of the sativity by an organization nominated by HIGHOFING. Various possibilities as to transfer, dependent on HIGHOFING views, are discussed in paragraph 2 of Attachment A. As conserve those other activities which do lie within the area of HIMANN interest, our views are as follows:
 - (1) DYLINEN's balloom distribution capability: We believe that our interim decision, subject to later review against the background of the everall operational situation then existing, should be to attempt he salvage this supubility, either by organizing the believe team on an independent basis (perhaps in the logal form of a private entrapreneurable) or by tying it into an existing project whether CADORY or MENNOOD. (See paragraph 2-b-(1) of Attachment A.)

(2) DTLINEN's mailing capacity: We see no pressing operational grounds to attempt to maintain DTLINEN's mailing apparat as an organized unit, particularly since we presumably will be able to tie into individual mailers at will and as desired. We should of source attempt to salvage a maximum in terms of existing DTLIMES smiling lists. (See paragraph 2-5-(2) of Attachment A.)

- (3) DTLIMEN's propaganda production team: We do not deem it feasible to attempt to salvage DELIMM's propagands writers as a group. Individual writers can of course be picked up by KUBARK or non-KUBARK activities as required or desirable. (See paragraph 2-a of Attachment A.)
- (4) DTLINEN's central files: While there is a KURANK interest in maintaining Dillies's central file in some memor which would provide ready EMBARK assess, it does not appear feasible for EURARK itself to take ever the files. Discussions with MEGROFIES with a view temeria securing telesover of the files by a responsible German organization which would undertake service of KURARK trace requests appear indicated. (See paragraph 2-d of Attackment A.)
- e. <u>Possible continuation of some activities under DTLDESS name</u> (peragraph le of reference): On this point we believe the terms of reference relating to CAMASH involvement are all important.

 (2) If CAMARN seed-(1) If CAWARR is unwilling to change its past attitude toward and relationship with DTLIMEN, then we believe KURANK abould not continue
 - (2) If CAMABH desires continuation, either under the DILLES name or under smother name, of any combination of DYLIED activities but less DYLLMEN's East German propaganda activities, then we believe KURARK should attempt to mass to MEGEOFIEC complete fiscal and operating responsibility for the scutimular activities. If HEGEOFIEC/CAVASE please inability to assume complete fiscal responsibility, we believe KUBARK should be prepered to make a fineal contribution for a period of a year or two (the general amount of the submidy to depend on the activities continued and their value to us, on the intengible value to us of a continuation of DTLIMEN's name, and on political factors relating to the overall KNDARK-HEGROFING liminon relationship) but KUEARK should remist any CAMASH attempt to maintain KUBARK in a position of day-to-day operating responsibility for the centimum activities of the organization.
 - (3) If CAMASH is agreeable to or easires continuation of DYLLEGE activities, under the DILIMEN name and substantially as communitated at present (i.e., including East Gorman propagamia activity), them we believe DELIMIN should be continued for the time being, provided the degree of initial CAMASH participation --- in terms of MNGROPING political backstopping and fiscal involvement --- fits KUSARK's view of the minimum HEGEOFIEC participation required to make continued KUBARK operation of the project tenable. If HEGROPING should not be prepared, as seems probable, to take over at an early date more or less complete operating and fineal responsibility for the project, we should have assequate asserumes that A. their fiscal and operating participation gradually will be increased. Alternatively, we abould explore the possibility of passing operating responsibility for the project to HEGROPING while continuing for a year or two a large measure of our subsidy. Paragraph 3-s of Attachment A outlines our views as to what additional tightening up steps we should take relative to DTLIMEN if DTLIMEN should be sontinued with NEGROPING participation but under primary KUBARK operating involvement.

Beriew of DELDER Operations and Disposal Possibilities

Summery:

In the following paper we have attempted to provide a pisture of the various orgaminational elements which make up the DYLIMEN project complex. We have followed up our expository treatment with a review of possibilities for the transfer of various operating units of the DILIMM organisation to other existing erganisations. We have also reviewed the possibilities of continuing DELEMEN, in whole or in part, and with or without German participation. The paper includes a section on plans for terminating the project if this becomes our final decision.

1. Beview of Correct Activities:

- a. <u>Propaganda Production</u>: Although the explosive operational reverses encountered by Dillinia during the past ten months have shaham the project to its bease, surprisingly enough the hard PP care of the project remains pretty much unchanged, and the organization is still producing brochures and leaflets for East Gurmen consumption as follows:
 - (1) <u>Periodic production</u>: The project currently is producing each mouth neven Din A 5 produces—one, produced in 100,000 copies, is targeted at the general population while the other six, each produced in 25,000 acpins, are each aimed at a special group: SED members, the technical, literary and propaganda point of view appear to be as well or better propered them other similar items which we have seen. Those publications have a total nouthly production of over 200,000 copies and are distributed into the Econe through uniling from West Germany and via ballooming. Dillies also continues to produce two periodic items for West German consumption. The Dillies Archiv, which may be described as a collection of DTLIMEN editorial comment on specific current developments in East Germany, is published approximately ten times a year and has a distribution of between 2,000 and 2,500 copies for each insue. The DYLINES Mount, which is a museury of developments in the Soviet orbit with emphasis upon conditions in East Germany, is published once monthly with a press run of about 700 copies. Both of these latter items are distributed to West Berlin and West German governmental agamaies, the West Berlin and West German press, and to other persons in a position to influence developments relating to the cold war. Furticular attention is given to getting these publications to people who are thought to believe in the objectives and goals of the DELIMEN effort.
 - (2) <u>Special production</u>: DFLIME's shility to produce and distribute, by balloon or mailing, special leaflets and possiblets for East German consumption has not been significantly affected by resent developments and remains limited only by the funds available for such publications and our declaions as to what Zonel developments and/or intrinsis weeknesses of the Communist system in East Germany should be exploited by this method. In 1958 DELINES continued to produce a variety of special leaflets and pamphlets ettacking specific manifestations and developments in East Germany and to distribute these liens into all areas of the DER. DILIBER's severage of the SED Y Parteites in July again illustrated rather

effort against a single political event in the Zone. In this operation, DTLIMEN bellaced over one million copies of a leaflet into the confines of East Berlin, the site of the Parteitag, alone. DTLIMEN also falsified and distributed in over 20,000 copies cash two 'interis' Parteitag reports, i.e., Inimumabarishte. DTLIMEN finished its Y Parteitag program with the falsification of a final report, i.e., Absolutestammentage, of the results of the Parteitag and distributed it in over 40,000 copies. It is our opinion that DTLIMEN's Y Parteitag program constituted an effective, well-belanced and summendable propagants operation.

b. Distribution Activities:

- (1) Mailing apparet: Although DYLIMEN's mass distribution capability obviously rusts with ballooming, DTLIMEN has a well-organized and smoothly functioning mailing apparat commisting of a headquarters element and 12 to 15 persons strategically dispersed throughout Vest Germany who mail DILINES's propagands letters from a great variety of locations each month. These individuals are paid on a piece-work basis and receive between MMW 20 and 50 worthly, depending on the number of items which they mail. The letters are prepared for sailing under the direct supervision of the DTLINES Headquarters in West Borlin. The letters are addressed (the addresses are taken from DTLIMEN's special card files) and them stamped and emsembled into packages of 50 to 100. The packages are then airmailed to the mailers in West Germany, who then enter the letters into West Garman postal shammels at various eitles in the neighborhood of their homes. DYLINEN's mailing apparet usually handles between 16,000 and 20,000 envelopes monthly although, in special diremmetamess, it can be pushed upwards to over 30,000 separate pieces. It is difficult to estimate the value of salveging this sailing espability in the event of project termination. Possibly its salvage value is nugligible, since one would presume that a new organization of this type sould be established without too much difficulty. It is, however, surely also true that the building of any kind of new organization often brings unautisipated problems of induterwinable dimensions.
- (2) Ballooning apparat: Apart from the inactive Berlin balloon teem, DTLINEW excreatly has two functioning balloom teams in Vest Germany which are operating from two heating gas besen, one in Department, Lower Sammy, and one in Coburg, Bavaria. A new hane in Rackwage, House, which has been under construction for some time, should be operational within the next few weeks. Dillimit's belloomers also have seems to the TROPE belloom base at Koenigalustter, Lower Samony. In a remomably good month, i.e., when the wind direction is right at least half of the time, DILIMIN's West German balloom team numbers can laumah at least 500 hallooms from each of DELIMES's bases and an additional 500 from the . THOSE base. Thus, when the DILLING base at Esshwege becomes operational, DYLLMME should have a West German belleon espability of 2,000 bellooms a munth. Although DYLINEN's West German ballooming facilities can provide coverage of most East German areas, they cannot provide the magaire East Berlin coverage that can be obtained by ballooming from West Berlin, e.g., it would have been impossible to put a million sopies of BELIEM's Y Parteltag leaflet into East Berlin had it not been possible at that time to balloom from West Berlin.

e. Search Service and Social Melfere Activities:

(1) Search service: Since the founding of the DTLIMEN organization by Faml V. Bondreau in late fall 1948, search service activities have been a fundamental part of DILIMEN activities. From the very outset, DILIMEN economization of information regarding missing and/or imprisoned persons and, over the years, has assembled a great deal of

SECRET

source material in this field. The organization, through experience, has developed an admirable professional 'know-how' in this field and quite likely has the most effective search service capability as concerns East Germany to be found in Nest Germany. DTLIMEN, for example, has carded references to 146,083 persons reportedly imprisoned at one time or another in East Germany. Over the years, DTLIMEN has accepted 38,541 search service requests, of which 18,532 have been clarified. This capability on the part of DTLIMEN, however, appears to have little meaning for KUBARK from an operational point of view. We have viewed this work, together with the social service work, simply as a part of DTLIMEN's formal raison d'etre. Regardless of the future of the DTLIMEN organization, however, it appears that this aspect of DTLIMEN's activity probably is in the Germans' own interest to continue. Additional information conserming the file data built up by the DTLIMEN search service unit will be found in paragraph II of Appendix I.

- (2) Social service: DTLIMEN's small social service section, although laudatory from a humanitarian point of view, also has little or no operational utility for KMEARK. The social welfare services provided by the DTLIMEN organization are handled at present almost exclusively by the wife of _______. She makes the decisions regarding whether or not DTLIMEN funds should be expended for needed items of slothing, medicine, food, etc., to be presented to refugees and other visitors to DTLIMEN who appear in need. She also handles the distribution of CARE packages, old clothing, and other material of this type which is given to the DTLIMEN organization for distribution to needly refugees.
- d. Central Card Piles: During its ten years of existence, the DILIMEN organization has built up a sentral files section of messive proportions which is controlled by a central card file containing 546,000 separate entries. These earded references lead back to approximately 320,000 separate files which are maintained by the organization. DTLDEN's cards and files are broken down into special categories in typical IS fashion, and the subject headings included probably equal those found in a major KUBARK operating base as far as diversity is concerned. Of particular interest to ROBARE are DYLDEN's files and cards pertaining to the MfS. DYLDEN has 8.976 sarded references to staff employees of the Mf8 and an additional 322 corded refereness to MS secret informats; there are also special sections pertaining to MfS offices, meeting places, safe spartments, telephone numbers, vehicles, etc. Also of interest to KNEANK are the DYLLHEN cord files occurring East German governmental, military, political, mass organization and other personalities. These eard files are the besis for DYLIMM's specialized mailing lists, the accuracy of which plays a major role in any mailing operation. The sophistication of DTLIMM's personality card files perhaps can be demonstrated by the fact that their earded references to members of the East German Peoples Army are additionally broken down on the besis of grade, e.g., a special category for the grades esptain to lieutenant colonel, another entegory for the grades first and second lieutenant, etc. Approximately a year age, at our request, DTLIMM established a sard file on license plates of Yest Berlin and West Govern vehicles eighted in East Berlin and East Gerumny. At the present time this particular card file boasts 1,266 entries. we plate eard file has not yet produced any information of Although the lies special value, BGB's Soviet Section has considerable interest in this activity and periodically reviews the results of DELINER's efforts. A detailed breakdown of the central files section of DELIMI, prepared by the DELIMIN orgamization, is forwarded as Attachment β for your information.
- e. Refugee and Visitor Debriefing Activities: DELIMM emistains a reception office at the Mariemfelde Refugee Comp which is staffed by one full-time refugee debriefer who is afforded accretarial assistance as required. Depending upon refugee flow, this individual interviews between 10 and 30 refugees daily. Refugees who appear to possess information of value are

referred to DELINE's bendmarters where they are further debriefed by DELINE's East Corman specialists, i.e., DELINES's heferentin for the Vope, Volksarance, SED, Kampfgruppen, etc. Visitors to the DELINES headquarters building are hundled in a similar fashion; they are afforded a preliminary interview by a receptionist and thus, if indicated, they are referred to a specialist for further debriefing. DELINES currently is visited by between 700 and 1,000 persons mentally and properts 50 or more reports each mental based upon information provided by the visitors. Although many of these reports are of value to DELINES's search service activity, not more than 10 or 15 in any one mental are of interest to EUSAHK and two thirds of these usually contain information on the MES.

f. Press and Radio Home Releases: Although DTLIMEN case had fairly good commentions in press and radio circles (particularly when Manne CRAF was the press officer) and was able to secure good pick-up of its information releases, current press and radio pick-up of DTLIMEN information is low and when pick-up does occur it is normally without attribution to DTLIMEN. It is possible that a rehabilitation of DTLIMEN could overcome the current shy-away attitude of press and radio circles.

2. Peanible Transfer of Current DELIMI Activities to other Graniantions:

a. <u>Preparation Productions:</u> The various individuals who greate DELIMEN's propagands sould be rewtilized as individuals by EMBANK, German governmental agencies or other groups involved with propagands production. It is not believed, however, that it would be feasible to attempt to exame the propagands writers from PATIMEN as a group and reestablish them either as an independent unit or within another existing organization. We don't see that KURANK sould absorb them as an independent group without building up a whole new apparatus including administrative, support and distribution elements. Nor sould the writers be seved as a group into another organization since all the groups that sould case into question presumably would have to fire their own writers to make reen for them.

b. Distribution America

- (1) Balloaning apparet: In paragraph 1 above we described the balloon and smil distribution assets surrently smintained by the DYLIMEN organisation. Of these two units, the balloom apparat appears of the greatest salvage interest. The West Berlin bellooming teem equaists of two members supervised by CERTERS. The leaders of the two balloom teams in West Germany also are under CERTERS' control. These two letter individuals utilise friends and acquaintances to accist them in their belloom launching activities. Although the security weeknesses of such a system are obvious, it is to be noted that to the heat of our knowledge both of those individuals have performed officiently and have corried out their believe learnshing activities as reported. If the BELIEF balloomers are to be restilized by another group or independently, we feel certain that CERTERS could recetablish the unit quickly and effectively. Since we don't see any indications that CAMASH upuld be willing to take over and run anch a unit, for practical purposes we are probably dealing here with only two alternatives: (1) DELIME's believing assets seed be transferred intest to another existing CARRY or PERMICE organization under the leadership of WHIRES or souther individual with the testmical knowledge and experience required, or (2) KOBANK could recetablish the balloaming assets on an independent basis with an appropriate cover organization and/or story.
- (2) <u>Mailing apparet</u>: The West German sailing apparet presents a semantat different problem. The DILLEGA West German sailors have been

sentacted and developed by DTLIMER over the years on an individual basis. The only thing that combines them into an apparet is the controlined direction of the uniling operation which is exercised by DYLLESS from Berlin. Thus, the reutilization of these individuals for the smiling of agunda material would require that each of the 12 to 15 mailers involved be contacted individually and asked whether except he would be willing to conduct sailing setivities for another organization. Presumably an appropriate PELINE staffer sould undertake to talk with each of the individuals and determine their sentiments, if we so desire. Since idealistic metivation probably doom't play a great role as far as the mailers themselves are comercied, i.e., they sail their 1,000 to 2,000 letters a month because of the payments that they receive and not because they believe in DTLIMM's propaganta setivity, resutshishment of the sailing apparet within emother existing organization probably sould be carried out without a great deal of difficulty. Utilization of the unilers on an independent KURAEK basis, however, probably would present some difficulties, e.g., some of them quite probably would be gamely of uniling propagands destined for East Gormany if they were not smare of the identity of the organization directing the activity. Once again. as with the ballocaing assets, CAMASH or other elements of the German government probably would not be interested in taking over the mailers directly and thus the shedoes prehably would be the same as in (1) above, i.e., reutilization by another existing organization or, possibly, utilization by KURARK on an independent besis.

- c. The Search Service: The search service, as already meted in paragraph 1 above, is a homenitaries facility which should murit continuouse in ne form. If DTLIME is terminated, we meggest that there are neveral ways through which the search service capabilities could be continued:
 - (1) If the German government is interested in establishing as organization specifically designed to meet search service meets, DTLINER's mearch service section, along with its files and reference material, could be moved into or become the base for such a unit.
 - (2) DILIMEN's search service section possibly could be absorbed by a similar existing unit in another erganization (such a move to be onordinated with and approved by the Gere MILETONES AND umt), e.g., the German organization.
 - (3) The DTLINEN search service sould be terminated and its existing eards and files transferred to another existing organization selected by the German government or to the German government

MOTE: The files of the search service are interlocked with DTLIMEN's central files (see below) and the search service relies heavily upon the comtrol files in order to perform its function. Thus, may now organizational form set up for the meanth service function would have to include the central files section.

d. Central Piles Section: As a neuros of biographic, reference and support material, DTLIMES central files section undembtedly has continuing value as far as KERARK is concerned. To be of value to us, becover, the files must be secsesible to us and probably directly so, 1.e., their value would diminish radically if we were required to pass along name trace requests through a variety of channels. The question arises as to whether or not this file amterial can be transferred in tote to another existing ergenization end at the same time be readily accessible to us.

- (1) Transfer of the files along with key file personnel to is perhaps the only solution that would meet the above condition of direct accombility, but it is not at all certain that would be capable of aboveing all of this material in a unsable condition, i.e., so that name traces still could be conducted accurately and andfily. Her is it certain that introducing a DTLINES activity into would be a desirable solution from the viewpoint of the operation.
- (2) An obvious solution of the central files transfer problem would appear to be simply to transfer the cards and files in tota to UPSMING, assuming that such a solution would be acceptable to UPSMING. We have, however, certain reservations shout such a course of action, e.g., it is surely not beyond the reals of possibility that UPSMING would simply pack the DYLINGS file actorial every in come dusty old vanit where it would be of no service to aspens. Additionally, transfer to UPSMING quite probably would reduce our ready access to the material, possibly to the degree that it so larger would be practical for us to attempt to stiling it. It is possible that a solution could be found whereby MCEVID could have direct access to the files, thus continuing ready NURANK access to the material.
- (3) Another possibility would be to establish the sentral files section, perhaps in conjunction with the search service, on a separate basis with a new name.
- (4) Transferring the central files section to the IME or one of the Farty East Bureaus also appear to be possibilities which might merit investigation at the appropriate time.
- e. Refuges/Visitor Debriating and Press/Redio Releases: There is no basis for the existence of those estivities as separate erganisational entities.

3. Continention under the DTLINE Label:

comments in paragraph 6 of Reference B that has suggested that perhaps some DILIMM functions could be continued under the DILIMM label. Assuming for the memost the breadest construction of on a streamlined basis. Such a streamlined DELDER would continue to include propagands producing and distributing elements, a central files section and bined search service/secial welfare section. The streamlined orga mination would also continue to maintain offices at Marienfelde and would continue to employ people as refugee and visitor debriefors in order to provide the erexcitation with at least a medicum of the ourrest information required to produce effective propaganda material. There would, of course, b German comerkers of any kind nor, with the exception of the distribution apparet, would the organization have any elastectine everture e materer, e.s., DYLINES would get completely out of the CALL business. DYLINES would continue to produce periodic publications and special leaflets designed to emploit targets of opportunity. DILIMN's tendencies to encreash upon Nest Garana politics would be suppressed and any residual international overtones still remaining within the organization would be purged out. Streamlining of the organisation would entail a significant budget reduction (perhaps from \$285,000 annually down to loss than \$200,000 for a starter), further reduction in perseemel (DTLIMEN ourvently has circs 50 employees as against circa 75 in the spring of this year; we feel that a streamlined organization probably could rum with eirem 35 employees), and a tightening up of the organization all around. If the Germon were interested in such a solution, KIRARK of course

would have to decide as to just exactly what minimum participation in addition to political backstapping would be required on the part of the German in order that KHARK could maintain a tenship position in the venture. We would, of source, favor more or loss complete German tabsover of the project or partial KHARK fiscal support with complete German operational responsibility, but if moither of these solutions would be forthcoming from the German side and KHARK in effect retained specuting and primary fiscal responsibility, we feel that KHARK should continue to have a fairly free day-to-day hand, i.e., we don't believe KHARK's position would be tenshie if every restine decision regarding FELIMEN activities required engless limited consultations begand down by reass of Fedhep official red tape. We suggest that an attempt to run the project on a constitute basic might bring forward limited difficulties were even than these heretofers encountered. Ferhaps, the introduction of a German-nominated staffer, along the lines proposed for usuald be part of the answer here also.

- b. As an Emerically West German Activity, with or without EMBAK
 Participation: Assuming a relatively merrow construction of Cremerica, CAMASH may be willing to see DELIMEN continued less versum expectionable or politically delicate sativities. Such objectionable or delicate
 activities presumably would include in the first instance the predection and
 distribution of East German propagands, since there is at present little other
 activity which can be objected to in its east right. Essentially them,
 CAMAICATS may envisage a runp DELIMEN engaged substantially in search service/
 welfare sativities and perhaps including the present Next German publications
 activity, press and radio placement activity, and its visitor/refugue debriefing activity. In such an event, no particular problems are presented for
 KERMEN (beyond quantions relating to whether or not to salvage the project's
 editorial and/or distribution capabilities) if CAMASH is willing to assume
 complete operational and fiscal respectibility for the revenued organization.

 If, however, CAMASH should desire to retain KREARK fiscal—or operational and
 fiscal—involvement, we obviously would have to weigh the cost in manuscry
 and personnal terms of such involvement against the value to us of mentiountion
 of the BELIMEN same give whatever CARCAY-type activities (e.g., West German
 publications and press and radio placement) CAMASH may envisage for retention.
- Tormination Plan: In the foregoing paragraphs, we have attempted to outline was possible sethede of sentiming DTLIMM in one form or other. The other side of the soin is total and complete termination. Upon my guirus susionese surrum the past for months we have discussed termination with the DTLIMEN principals and, after receipt of Reference C, we requested I to prepare a detailed termina-tion plan for the project which would be genred to a six-month time period and would include plans for the phasing out of the organization's employees and the are ferenting as Appendix II. His report covers the legal aspects of termination, lists the organization's outstanding obligations, i.e., employer incurance payments, rent, cost of repairing the DILIMM presiess prior to return to the landlerd, etc., and a list of the employees of the organization showing the payments Gurman law entitles them to in the event of termination. The paper size includes a complete inventory of all preperty held by DTLIMEN and an estimate of its current value. It also provides financial data regarding the probable overall cost of maintaining the project over the six-month termination period. It is our feeling that there isn't prommption that a six-month phase-out paried will be available after notification of termination has been received. It is our strong feeling that we should not attempt to phase out the project in a shorter period of time.
