(9) To establish emergency succession of the Commander-in-Chief, Strategic Air Command, to insure continuous execution and direction of vital SAC EMO functions.

Two situations were visualized under which alternate/succession requirements would exist, with the addition between the previous plan and the new one being underlined:

- (B) Condition Alfa When Headquarters SAC has been destroyed and this fact confirmed through visual or radar inspection by the Airborne Command Post or when specific communications with SAC Headquarters have been lost. This condition requires immediate reaction by a responsible senior officer, acting as CINCSAC Airborne, in order to enhance survivability of the SAC force. This condition would be of relatively short duration.
- Condition Brave When it has been positively determined that the command of SAC units and direction of SAC EWO forces cannot emanate from General Ryan, CINCSAC, or Lt Gen Nazarro, the Vice CINCSAC and initial emergency actions required for survival of the SAC force have been completed. This condition permits extensive and time comsuming efforts prior to succession of Command.
- Ms) If Condition Alfa existed, 1.e., loss of communications and/or knowledge of destruction of the headquarters, the Airborne Emergency Action Officer (AEAO) would carry out emergency actions for survival of the strategic force by (1) placing the alert forces in minimum reaction posture, (2) launching the force under positive control, or (3) directing execution of the force. In this situation the Alternate AEAO would be the second in succession of command. Once such emergency

actions were completed, steps would be taken to determine the succession of command through ascertaining the availability of the numbered air force commanders, with the most senior commander available assuming command. After that the precedence would follow that established by the Air Force regulations concerning precedence.*

Under Condition Bravo the numbered air force (NAF) Commanders would take command upon determination that either CINCSAC or VCINCSAC were no longer in circumstances that permitted them to issue orders, with seniority being the determing factor. They would then have at their disposal the airborne command post. Loss of these three Commanders would then necessitate following the Air Force regulation on precedence, as in Condition Alfa.

As mentioned earlier there were seven annexes to the 1 July 1966 plan, as opposed to one for the earlier issue. Annex "A" dealt with the actions required under the various alert situations and with succession of command. The new ones, were lettered B through G, and outlined the requirements and responsibilities for specific functions.

This included the National Military Command Center; Air Force Command Post; ANMCC, Fort Ritchie, Maryland; Alternate Chief of Staff, USAF (REAR), Maxwell AFB, Ala.; Other ZI Numbered Air Force and Overseas Air Division Commanders; Commanders of all advanced command elements of SAC; all USAF Major Commands, All JCS Commanders, Unified and Specified Commands; JCC - Europe and JCC - Far Fast.
